THE DOVER accommodation train on the 2nd inst. struck a carriage, at the crossing between Chatham, N. J., and the summit, instantly killing Mrs. Edward J. Brown, Miss Mary Brown, and an infant child of Mrs. Irving Brown. The latter lies in a critical condition. The infant's nurse had her skull crushed, and was probably fatally injured.

A GOOD-HEARTED ATHLETE.—Mr. Wallace Ross has donated to a New York ragged school the sum of \$150. The Sporting Journal calls him the "prince of givers" and editorially states that Wallace's heart "beats for everyone" whom he knows is in want. The Journal is of the opinion that Ross will yet connect himself with some religious work, where his "noble heart" and many qualities will be of a benefit to his fellow man.

THE IRISHMEN who are coming to the Canadian athletic championship meeting have been encouraged to take the trip to Canada by their recent successes at English championship meetings, and by splendid records made upon the "old sod." W. J. M. Barry, of the Queen's College, Cork, holds the Irish and English champion for hammer throwing; J. Purcell is Irish and English champion long distance jumper; G. D. Christian, Dublin, is champion quarter-mile runner of Ireland; K. P. J. Kelly holds the English championship for high jumping, and his record of 5 ft 9 in. has recently been tied by E. W. Walsh, another of the chosen for Canada. The party will be accompanied to this country by Mr. Fred Gallagher, editor of the Dublin Sport.

AS THE complement of the presentation of a residence made by her husband's friends on Thursday night, a deputation representing the contributors to the fund raised among the Irish Catholics of all branches of the civil service for the purpose of helping to furnish the servant's villa presented by other friends, waited on Mrs. Costigan on the 1st of August and made the formal presentation of the furniture already purchased, together with the balance of cash remaining over. The presentation was conveyed in a short but very expressive letter, which was signed by Messrs. John Bowes, Thomas McAfee, Chairman; J. Hardy, Treasurer, and J. P. Dunn, Secretary of the Committee. Mrs. Costigan, it is understood, has returned her thanks in a letter addressed to the Chairman.

THE STIPENDIARY Magistrate this morning gave his decision in the McInnis case, and decided that under the Summary Trial by Consent Act, no appeal is given from the Justice trying a case, and therefore the order given by Mr. Hayden liberating McInnis from jail was illegal and unauthorized by-law. Upon the view of the law, Mr. Fitzgerald held that McInnis was an escaped prisoner, and it was his duty to commit him for trial to the Supreme Court for an escape. This the Magistrate did, but because of the special circumstances, and as the defendant was already under heavy recognisance to appear at the Supreme Court at the next Term of the Supreme Court to stand his trial for an escape.

THE CUSTOMS Department has issued the following circular: "Invoices of goods purchased in bond in the United States require to be accompanied by a certificate from the Collector of Customs at the port of export certifying that the document is a correct extract from the invoice on file at his port; and giving date of import and export, marks and invoice value, and to such value there should be added the costs of freight, transhipment and all other expenses and charges in connection therewith, together with the probable profit of the United States importer, and in cases where invoices are not accompanied by such certificate, the value on which duty is to be collected shall be the value in the open market at the time of shipment, and in all cases where doubt exists as to such value, the usual course prescribed by the appraisement section of the Customs Act should be taken and applied to the case."

DROWNED.—A son of Samuel Bishop, Esq., of Rockland, aged 14 years, and a son of Alfred Taylor, Esq., of the same place, aged 15 years, who were spending a few days with their uncle, Hiram Trenholm, Esq., at Point de Bute, N. B., were drowned while bathing on Monday last. A 14 year old son of Joseph McLaughlan, of Lower Steviacke, Colchester Co., N. S., was drowned while bathing in the river at that place on Friday evening last. Joseph Fellows, father of Mrs. D. M. Diekie, of Canning, N. S., and who has lived with his daughter for years, came to his death on Tuesday night last in a most shocking manner. It seems that the deceased went to his room early in the evening, where his daughter had placed a light for him previously, but upon retiring herself she found that her father was not, and had not been in bed that night, as the bed was unmade. A search was at once made, resulting in his being found head down in a water barrel at the end of the house quite dead. It is supposed that he went out as usual before going to bed, and as it looked like rain he went to fix the barrel as it would catch the water. The barrel was at the end of the platform at the back of the house, the top of it being about six inches lower than the platform. It is supposed that he knelt down to reach the top of the barrel, lost his balance and fell in. He would have been 93 years old the next day. Mr. Fellows was a native of Annapolis County, where he reared his family. His wife died a good many years ago, and Mr. Fellows has been living with his daughter. He was a member of the Baptist Church, and was a man highly respected for his goodness and christianity.—Western Chronicle.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

News Items.

QUEBEC, Aug. 6.

Archbishop Taschereau, of Quebec, leaves for Charlottetown on the 11th to attend the anniversary services of the consecration of the Bishops of Chatham and Charlottetown. The customs authorities are now engaged in making up the amount that Ayer & Co. will have to pay for undervaluation for custom purposes of their medicines. The undervaluation has been going on for years. The medicine men will have to pay a good many thousands of dollars in duties and in fines. The heaviest fines allowed will be levied.

The Egyptian Policy.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

Henry Labouchere (Radical) in the Commons this afternoon moved, and Sir Wilfred Lawson (Radical) member for Carlisle, and Sir George Campbell (Liberal), member for Kircaldy, seconded a motion that the House reject the appropriation bill until the present Government explain their Egyptian policy. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach stated in general terms that the Government's policy is to put Egypt on a solid footing with regard to external defence, finance and internal administration.

Trying Half-breed Rebels.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.

Yesterday twenty-seven half-breed prisoners who participated in the troubles at Batouche, were arraigned at Regina on a charge of treason-felony. All pleaded guilty and were held for sentence. It is believed they will be sentenced to short terms of imprisonment. To-day three more half-breed prisoners were arraigned. They pleaded guilty and were held for sentence. There is very little interest now manifested in these trials.

Dominion Political Notes.

OTTAWA, Aug. 6.

Thomas White was sworn in Minister of the Interior at Toronto.

Writs were issued to-day for the elections in East Durham and Cardwell. The election day in East Durham will be on the 24th inst., and in Cardwell the 27th inst.

Ward, Mayor of Port Hope, is the Conservative candidate in Durham.

Prosten has been put up by the Opposition.

There is no word of any opposition to Thomas White in Cardwell.

European Troubles.

BERLIN, Aug. 6.

An article in North German Gazette yesterday, attacked France in connection with the advice of Paris Temps, that French cavalry on the frontier be reinforced, has affected Berlin and Frankfurt bourses. All German newspapers following the Gazette, dwell upon the fact that the approach of France and Russia toward each other is coincident with an increasing good will between England and Germany.

Riel Retracts His Declaration Against Rome.

REGINA, Aug. 6.

Riel has retracted his declaration against the Church of Rome which he made during the course of the rebellion, and once more submitted himself to its authority. He has signed and written a retraction which Rev. Father Fortier, of St. Boniface Cathedral, brought down with him to Regina yesterday.

Eastern Notes.

TEHERAN, July 6.

The Russians are planning a new town at Merv including a citadel, barracks, gardens and bazaars. Owing to rumors that the Afghans are massing near Pandjeh, strong Russian reinforcements have been despatched to that place. A letter says that the Afghan garrisons at Zulicair Pass have been reinforced.

Complaints are made that Cossacks have robbed Armenian traders who were on their way to Meshed.

Picked up at Sea.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 6.

The bark Wyoming from Sheet Harbor reports having found the dory Neptune unoccupied off Cape Clear. The canoe decked boat Neptune sailed from Penzance some time ago for New York. A Norwegian named Johnson was the only person on board.

Excitement in Zanzibar.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

Despatches received this afternoon state that considerable excitement exists in Zanzibar owing to a conflict being imminent between German colonists and natives.

Rebels Taking Dongola.

CAIRO, Aug. 6.

It is reported that rebel emissaries have arrived at Dongola and that they are preparing to take possession of the place, which is without any means of defence.

Cholera in Spain.

MADRID, Aug. 6.

Throughout Spain yesterday 4,282 new cases of cholera were reported, and 1,570 deaths.
