THE WHELAN MONUMENT.

REVERENCE for the dead, and particularly for the dead who have done great things for their country, is the feeling of generous hearts. It is creditable to the Irishmen of this province that they have kept alive the idea of erecting a suitable monument to their great compatriot, Edward Whelan. We regret that the same idea with respect to George Coles is not equally in evidence. The names of Coles and Whelan must ever be linked together in the history of this Province as those of the men chiefly instrumental in obtaining for the people, *en masse*, Responsible Government and Free Education; and we should be delighted if the names of these two, foremost among the true Liberals of Prince Edward Island, were linked together in a movement for the erection of a monument to each.

Excellent portraits of each, by Harris, adorn the walls of our Legislative Chamber, and loving hands have erected for each a stone to mark the place where the honored dust lies entombed. But the public upon which these two patriots conferred their boons has yet to supply the fitting public monument which each deserves, and which it should be the pleasure of a generous and thankful people to supply.

Those who have for thirty odd years kept alive the idea of a monument to Whelan are now, again, about to make an effort to obtain sufficient means to effect their purpose; and we hope that men of good will in every part of the province will unite with them, and that the "grand demonstration," on the 27th instant, will be a distinct success in every respect.

FORESTRY.

High Court Now Being Held at Souris

The High Court of the Independent Order of Foresters began its session at Souris yesterday afternoon. About a hundred officers and delegates are in attendance. The High Court Degree was conferred on about fifty persons, and the High Court was reduced to a Subordinate Court so that all members of the Order might take a seat.

The report of High Chief Ranger Dr. H. W. Robertson mentioned the fact that the increase in membership had been 189. It referred in feeling terms to the deaths of Brothers Geo. F. Owen, P. H. V. C. Ranger, Malcolm McLeod, Roland Taylor, Alfred Riggs, Geo. D. Davison, Craig, Vessey, Covey and Seaman. Allusion was made to the work of organization. An organizer is wanted, not so much for starting new Courts as looking after the old Courts and getting members to take more interest in the Order, and in their own Courts particularly. In that way a large number of suspended members could be saved.

In regard to bonus to members the report stated that at the next meeting of the Supreme Court the surplus will have reached twenty-five dollars per capita, and that it would be well for the Courts here to discuss whether section fifty-five of the Constitution be acted upon and a bonus given all members of seven years' standing or not.

The Foresters' Ward in the new P. E. Island Hospital was mentioned. The committee could not secure a ward on the terms given at last session, and it was thought best to refer the whole question to the High Court.

One paragraph of the report referred to the "enemies" of the Order, and stated: "But there are some who, if it were in their power, would stop the progress of our noble Order. Notably among these are a few pastors of churches who would give their blessing to some small sectarian society rather than to a noble institution like the Independent Order of Foresters, which admits all worthy men and women regardless of where they worship."

"I am not aware that these efforts have prevented any desirable men from joining our Order, but if such spiritual advisers think they are helping the cause of justice by endeavoring to pull down our society to build up another they have much to learn of true fraternity."

The High Secretary's report showed total number of courts to be 37 and the present membership 1614. The High Treasurer's report showed cash on hand from last year \$401.95; receipts during the year \$987.34; expenditure \$1,018.00; cash on hand and in bank \$371.29.

ROCKY POINT.—There was a large and interesting meeting of Elliott Division, Sons of Temperance, on Wednesday evening. The resident clergyman, Rev. G. McIvor, and the Provincial Deputy, Mr. J. J. Chappell, were present and spoke words of encouragement to the members, urging them as good soldiers to move steadily forward until their purposes are accomplished, namely the total and entire prohibition of the iniquitous liquor traffic, that is causing so much suffering and desolation in our midst. Next Wednesday evening there will be a free meeting open to the public. An excellent programme assisted by city talent is being arranged. The meeting will open at sharp 8 o'clock.
