### THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Told Down For More Easy Reading.

A Washington despatch says the ratification of the Hawaiian annexation treaty by the United States Senate is assured. Bank of Chili has raised a loan of £300,000 gold in London, to redeem its bills, as required by new conversion law.

President Zelaya, of Nicaragua, is sending a commissioner to the United States and to Europe who will try to sell Nicaragua's national railroad and steamboats.

Owing to sudden frosts the ports in the Sea of Azof are freezing, and consequently a considerable quantity of grain which was prepared for export cannot be shipped.

The Viceroy of India has ordered a Court of Enquiry to investigate the disastrous reconnaissance of Gen. Westmacott to the summit of Saran-Sar mountain last Wednesday.

King Oscar and a number of private persons have contributed sufficient sums of money to insure the despatch of a Swedish polar expedition in 1898 which will be led by Prof. Nathorst.

The eruption of Mount Vesuvius, which began last week is increasing in activity. Columns of smoke and tongues of flame are belching from the central crater, while showers of cinder are falling around.

A petition of two million, seven hundred thousand names is a monster—but that is the size of one which an Englishman will bring to the United States from English working people asking for international arbitration between Great Britain and the United States.

New Zealand proposes to follow the example of Canada, and give a preference to British goods. It is to be hoped that the New Zealand Government will not afterwards be obliged to extend the preference to all the European nations and then propose to take in the United States.

The contract has been signed for the building of a new railway from Windsor to Truro. The Nova Scotia and Federal Governments subsidize the road to the extent of \$3,200 a mile. The road is to be 50 miles in length, and passes through one of the most fertile sections of the province of Nova Scotia.

The Austrian Archduke Otto, nephew of Emperor Francis Joseph, had a narrow escape during a bear hunt at Dobchnitz, Hungary, recently. The hunt was given in his honor. Court Pappenheim wounded the bear, and the animal made for a huntsman who was watching near the Archduke, and tore the man to pieces.

Alaska is probably the most austere and inaccessible country in the world. It is a perfect sea of mountains. Travel two hundred miles in one direction and your eye will never rest on anything but mountains. The Lynn Canal is about one hundred miles long and perhaps a mile broad. There is a continuous chain of mountains on either side every foot of the way. It is a common sight here to stand in the sunshine under a mountain and look up and see a snowstorm beating furiously over the peak five or six thousand feet above you.

### RECIPROCITY.

From the United States Point of View.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The attitude of the administration towards the subject of reciprocity with Canada is probably disclosed in the following statement of a government official:

"The task of the government would be made easier if the statesmen in congress would be controlled by the interest of the country at large. Some of them, unfortunately, confine their views to a particular concession to be obtained from a foreign country for a local interest, and then desire our compensatory concession to be made not by their own but by some other locality. They make reciprocity a series of questions to be settled in the interest of particular districts. We may be able to secure arrangements which will add millions to our national export trade and yet it might be defeated by a combination of a few minor local interests not amounting to a million. Yet a reciprocity means mutual concession; without this nothing can be accomplished. We must give a market if we acquire one—not necessarily a free market, but an accessible one. Take coal for an illustration. By giving access to the N-w England coast we might gain access (per haps control) in the coal markets of all central Canada with mutual advantages by reason of geographical and transport facilities. Would it be wise for coal producers to antagonize these as a condition? It is the same with other articles of commerce where the large winter transportation is launched against short railway carriages. In some things we can acquire almost exclusive market, greatly increasing our exports, in exchange for a market open only to the competition of the other party. So it is with some phases of the transportation of logs and coarse lumber against manufactures of wood. Whenever we enlarge the market of manufactures we inevitably enlarge the demand for our raw material from which they are made, and this tends to increase the price paid to the original producer. The advantages of increased trade are widely distributed.

"In the major portion of commercial exchange this course is in the exceptional condition of producing a surplus both of our raw material and of the manufactured products. Our policy must take into view the situation, although it increases our difficulty in negotiations which shall satisfy every interest. All that can be hoped for is a result which in the aggregate shall be clearly advantageous to the nation as a unit. All producers are also consumers, and they often gain on one side as much as they lose on the other.

### AGRICULTURAL NOTES.

There has been a sort of "of and on" discussing going on in agricultural papers for several months on the question whether a breeding sow should have two litters of pigs in a year or only one. The question is considered from two different standpoints. For the man who is breeding pigs to sell for breeders and wants to keep up the reputation of his stock and get prices that will pay him for keeping the sow idle half the year, the one litter plan may be better. There is nothing in the nature of the animal nor in the uses for which they are designed, to conflict with more frequent returns. The fact that a sow will breed again when the pigs are but a few days old shows that the system is in proper condition, and when we consider that the most profitable method is to fatten and sell the pigs at six or eight months of age, we see no objection to breeding for longevity or any thing beyond the tendency to eat and grow. There is no objection to breeding a mare every year, with a gestation period of eleven months, and a sow would have more time to rest and recuperate from raising two litters in a year.

### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

THE WEATHER.—Fresh north westerly and westerly winds, fair and considerably colder to day and Thursday, local snow flurries.

FOR MONTREAL.—The steamer Campana left this morning at five o'clock on return to Montreal via Picton and Summerside. Her outward cargo consisted of 2800 boxes cheese, 700 bbls oysters, 133 bbls pork, 200 cases lobsters, 137 carcasses pork, 12 tons starch, 200 cases eggs, 100 packages sundries.

FOR THE YUKON COUNTRY.—Next spring will witness a great rush to the Yukon gold fields. Already one line of steamers from San Francisco has booked eighty thousand passengers for Klondike and the demand for accommodation still continues. The transportation of all these people and their effects from the coast to the gold fields will be a prize worth striving for and the company that first establishes steam communication will do a profitable business.

FUNERAL THIS MORNING.—The disagreeable weather of this morning did not interfere with the attendance at the funeral of Mrs. B. O'Callaghan, which took place at nine o'clock. The pall bearers were L. E. Prowse, M. P. Hogan, M. Blake, James Barret, James Eden, and N. Rattenbury. The funeral Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral was celebrated by Dr. Morrison. The interment was in the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The deceased was well and favorably known, and her bereaved husband and family have the sympathy of all.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL.—This forenoon William Welsh, better known as "Smiler" Welsh, was arraigned on four separate charges of assaulting females on the streets, all four offences having been committed on Saturday night last. Four ladies swore that they had been attacked by Welsh on that evening, one of the number being knocked down and somewhat seriously injured. The Magistrate said the case against Welsh was not one with which he thought proper to deal summarily, as it was a matter that should be prosecuted by indictment. He accordingly sent Welsh up for trial to the Supreme Court on all four charges. Welsh was asked the usual questions by the Court, and had no explanation to offer or no witnesses to call. Welsh comes from the several districts which is not of the best. The maximum penalty for each of the offences with which Welsh is charged is one year's imprisonment or a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

LAST EVENING.—The concert in St. Peter's Hall last evening was a decided success, as far as merit is concerned, and the audience, although not so large as the programme deserved, evidenced their high appreciation of the different numbers by hearty applause. Many of the selections were encored, and the evening's entertainment will be remembered as one most enjoyable spent in St. Peter's Schoolroom. Rev. Geo. Manifold, who was down on the programme for a vocal solo was unable, through sickness, to attend. The readings by Miss Lefurgey, Miss Kathleen Fitzgerald and Mr. Ernest Peake were all in excellent manner, and those of the former at least exhibited much elocutionary power. Miss Helen McDonald was very graceful in her pantomime and had to repeat several of her postures. Mr. Charles Earle excelled himself in his vocal solo and Miss Benoit sang very sweetly. Miss Russell and Prof. Earle's piano duet, Mr. Jas. Hyndman's violin solo and Mr. Hill's cello solo were played in their usual good style, while the ladies' part song, the men's part song and Mrs. Hodgson and Rev. T. H. Hunt's vocal duet were exceptionally well rendered. Before the singing of God Save the Queen, Rev. T. H. Hunt thanked the performers and all present for assisting in making the concert a success and announced that Rev. J. T. Bryan would deliver his lecture on "Things which interested our forefathers" next Monday night.

LONDON Nov. 15.—The St. James Gazette says that negotiations are on foot between Austria, France and Germany, in regard to the opportunity of convening an international conference to secure a general agreement for the diminution or abolition of the sugar duties.
