## Hawks Break 9-Game Losing Streak With 4-2 Victory Over Beavers

MONCTON, N.B., Jan. 20—(CP)—Moncton Hawks broke a nine-game losing streak Saturday night with a convincing 4-3 win over third-place Saint John Beavers in a Maritime Senior League fixture.

Displaying an unusual amount of close checking and bodying, Hawks went in front with the only goal of the first period and stayed there, adding a pair in the second as Beavers shot one and splitting a pair in the third period.

Tommy Brennan of Beavers provided the fireworks for the evening, collecting an astounding \$35 in fines by drawing a misconduct and match misconduct in the second period when he stepped into referee Cy Taylor and then went into the crowd after a tormentor.

He was followed into the box seats by some of his teammates, and the cooler-headed customers and players were busy trying to aid police to restore order.

No one was injured in the incident, liveliest seen here for some time, but it set fire to the teams and the tempo of bumping and roughing it up increased for the rest of the game.

Dennis Brodeur in the Saint John cage was kept busy, especially in the first and third periods and he robbed Hawks of several chances to increase their edge by his brilliant saves.

**New Moncton Combinations**

Coach Doggie Kuhn came up with some new combinations up front, and one of them showed promise of becoming a strong unit. Mousie Dewling, Lou Milani and Marcel Bessette, with the latter at centre, accounted for a pair of goals, Dewling and Bessette shooting them Milani, although he only picked one assist, was strong on defence for the line, throwing his weight around more than he has in any previous game here.

Joe Delmonte and Dalt Barkwell accounted for the other Moncton goals with Lorne Smith pecking up a pair of assists during the evening in addition to turning in lengthy service on the blueline.

Larry Blackburn and Jack Thaler shot the two Saint John goals, with Buck Whitlock drawing a pair of assists.

Of the 11 penalties dished out

Beavers drew eight, four of them going to Brennan in the second period.

### Big Blow Up

His big blow up occurred when Brennan fell on the puck behind the Moncton net and drew a minor from Cy Taylor for handling the puck. He charged at Taylor immediately and had a misconduct tacked on. Brennan then charged at the referee again and hecked him to the ice.

Thumbed out of the game, Brennan climbed into the penalty box and soon became entangled with the spectators behind the box. After words he leaped into the crowd and a general melee followed with other Beavers trying to aid Brennan and everyone in the vicinity crowding around. League rules call for fines of \$10 and \$25 for the misconduct and ratchet misconduct respectively.

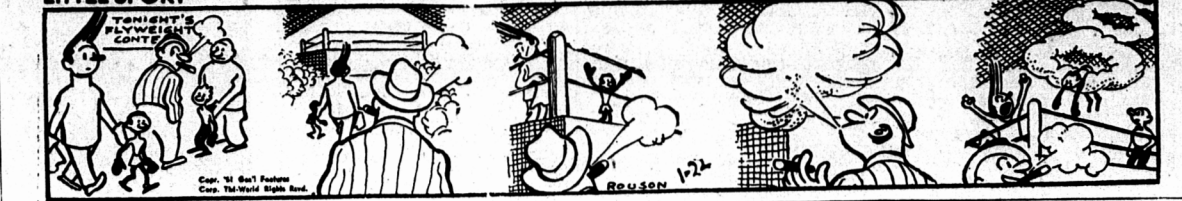

Once again Islanders and Saint Mary's apparently put up a powerful and exciting battle for Halifax fans at the Nova Scotia Capital on Saturday night when the Santamarians topped out the league leaders by a 3-1 margin. After deadlock they played to a roaring scoreless second session and hammered away at one another for 16 minutes of the third period before the tie was broken. At that point Bill Dugier got the winning goal for Saints, while Hughie Campbell fired home the insurance marker with only two seconds left in the game. It gave the Halifaxians their first victory over Islanders since January 11th, which was also played over Halifax ice, and their fourth win over them this season.

It was a game that packed everything in the way of smart hockey, that saw both goalies D'Aoust and Hailan and Gordon of Islanders come up with some outstanding saves during the night's play to frustrate many dangerous scoring efforts by attacking forwards. There were a few skirmishes between players too, that added zest to the encounter, with a clash between two husky rearguards, Johnny Myketyk and Phil Vitale being the most noteworthy when they swapped a few punches and went to the ice in a pile-up on the ice that cost them both major penalties.

Islanders also suffered a couple of tough breaks during the encounter that might have made a different story in the final scoring, when they had two goals called back during the fray. The final one would have been the tie-breaking tally when Walter Pawlyshyn scored on a nice solo effort in the third frame. The play took place at the same time that Vitale and Myketyk decided to mix it, causing the play to be blown down and the goal disallowed. The other disallowed tally was earlier in the game when the goal was scored while an Islanders player was inside the goal crease.

Thirteen penalties were handed out during the high-powered battle, eight of the awards going to the Islanders while the other five were picked up by Halifax. All were for minor infractions except the majors going to the two big rearguards for their third period outbreak. The victory for Saints still left them trailing in second place behind the Islanders by a long margin of 21 points. Had Islanders come through it would have put them to a new high in that department, a total of 25 points.

The Halifax-Islanders clash wasn't the only upset on the Big Four hockey front over the weekend. The cellar dwelling Moncton Hawks hung a 4-2 defeat on the Saint John Beavers over Hub City ice that ended a long nine-game losing slump for the Hawks. It was apparently another contest that produced plenty of rugged action and saw 11 penalties being handed out during the fray.

Saint John forward Tommy Brennan was the big collector of misdemeanors, and became the second player to be hit in the pocket since the league introduced fines in their effort to curb mounting penalties a few weeks ago. Brennan picked up a misconduct and a match-misconduct that will cost him a total of \$35. He also picked up two minors during the same session. Phil Vitale of Islanders was the first to pay a fine, which came to the same amount as Brennan's Saturday night outbreak. That fine was also in a game over Moncton ice — the much-talked about game on January 5th when Islanders scored a 5-3 victory over Hawks.

Speaking of Hawks—they will be the visiting team over Forum ice against Islanders tonight—and in view of their recent strengthened showings in recent games, should make it a stout battle here tonight. The two newest additions to the Moncton Club, defenceman Lorne Smith and forward Marcel Bessette, will be making their

The idea of the exchange is to give the respective arbiters a change of scenery, and at the same time will give the fans of both circuits a chance to see how the "whistle blowing" is done in the opposite camps.
