# India's Economic Problems Called Serious, Fascinating

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — India's economic problems are so serious and so fascinating that they have become a topic of conversation in the United States, according to a Canadian-born Harvard economist.  
"The fascination of India to an economist is that the problems are so stubborn and serious. They're going ahead. It's a slow, hard struggle, but they're going ahead," he said.  
Fascination with the struggle of the Indians to get ahead economically brought him here as the United States ambassador. Now, after more than two years, Galbraith is returning to Harvard seminars and writings that have made him one of the best known modern economists.  
Galbraith who leaves today for the U.S. reflected in a recent interview on the problems of India's 481,000,000 people. The average person has an income of \$75 a year.  
**OUTLINES PROBLEMS**  
Galbraith listed the basic factors as an uncontrolled increase in population, insufficient progress in raising agricultural production, low industrial efficiency and competitiveness of exports and lack of jobs.  
He said reporting the problems in the ambassador's big office in the U.S. embassy. His sport shirt, with tail out, indicated a casual form of diplomacy.  
Galbraith, a native of Iowa Station, Iowa, first came to India for three months in 1956 studying and offering advice to Prime Minister Nehru's government, that controls the economy in a loosely socialistic way.  
After helping John P. Kennedy win the 1960 U.S. presidential election, Galbraith asked for and got the ambassador's job here.  
"In the last two years I've become aware of a variety of problems that neither were not fully appreciated before," he said.  
**POPULATION ROOMS**  
The greatest problem was the increase in population by about 10,000,000 a year. The Indian economy had to run hard just to keep up with this rising demand and even harder to improve low living standards.  
"They've got to cut the birth rate drastically," Galbraith said. But present birth-control efforts are not really touching the problem.  
On agriculture, "various ministries create the impression of dispersion of energies. They should concentrate massive energy on fertilizer, water, plant protection and possibly also improved varieties of plants. The capacity of the Indian government to receive new ideas should be overestimated," he said.  
Galbraith rejected the idea that India will reach the take-off stage of economic growth, a feat within the foreseeable future.  
"India will have in one form or another to import capital, by grant or loan, for some time to come, as growing countries have always had to do. Savings in the United States or Europe are abundant and should come here where they are scarce."  
India "can only nibble away at" the problem of unemployment. "The sad prospect is that it faces very substantial amount of unemployment for a very long time," because there is not enough equipment or resources to put everyone to work.

Members are preparing a series of questions for the government.  
**CHANGE IDENTITY?**  
There was speculation, meanwhile, that British experts were working out a new identity for Dolyntsin for the Russian's own protection.  
It was believed the Soviet spy would undergo plastic surgery to make him unrecognizable even to those who knew him during the eight months or so that he was on a tour of duty in London.  
Labor MPs in Parliament expressed belief that the closure of Dolyntsin's defecion and his name was an attempt by the government to improve the tarnished image of British intelligence in the wake of a rash of security scares.  
British Security agents were said to be sure that Soviet agents were trying to trace Dolyntsin to his carefully-guarded hideout.  
The Daily Express said Saturday an attempt already may have been made on Dolyntsin's life. His defecion deft a severe blow to Soviet intelligence operations in the West, it was eliminated for revenge and as a warning to others, informants said.

### PUBLISHES PHOTOGRAPH

The Evening News published Saturday a two-column photograph which it said was the first picture of "a Russian agent" since he fled from the top of the plane proclaimed "the faceless man."  
The picture showed a man walking a city street. His face was blanketed by a white patch. The News said the picture of the man, in a winter overcoat, was taken behind the Iron Curtain. The paper said there was no official objection in London to it being printed with the face made unrecognizable.  
The Soviet defector was reported to have given Russian military secrets and details of spy networks and undercover agents working for the Soviet Union to both the U.S. and British governments.  
Some reports credit him with taking the witness stand in the disclosure that Harold (Kim) Philby was the "third man" who tipped off diplomat Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean that they were about to be arrested. Burgess and Maclean fled to the Soviet Union more than a decade ago.  
Dolyntsin was understood to have played a role in the break-up of other spy rings in recent months in the West.
