Emerald Branch, B. I. S., County Line.

As referred to in THE EXAMINER a few days ago, the above Society held a Tea and demonstration at County Line on the 6th inst. Last Monday evening the regular meeting was held in the Schoolhouse, and the President of the Tea, who was Secretary of the Tea, handed in his report. It is gratifying to learn that over seven hundred dollars were taken as a result of the enterprise of the committee, and that over three hundred dollars of that amount stands to the benefit of the Branch.

Close on four hundred dollars are now in the hands of the Treasurer, and the members have decided to commence at an early date the erection of a commodious Hall, for which tenders are called. It is generally understood that the Hall will be erected right in the village, as Mr. J. H. Haslam, of the firm of Craig & Haslam, who is a member of the Branch, has presented a free site.

The members desire to return their hearty thanks to the many strangers and non-members who willingly and graciously gave their assistance in making the late demonstration such a success—a success which, no doubt, would have been greater had not other Teas on the same date, and the disastrous fire in Charlottetown, and the excitement caused by the frightful murder of the unfortunate Mary Tuplin, kept many from the County Line Tea, who would have otherwise been present. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the press, the President particularly mentioning THE EXAMINER, which generously advanced the interests of the Branch without cost.

As is the case in all communities, the Branch has been touched by sorrow in the death of one of its most earnest members, Brother Daniel Whelan, while in the bloom of youth and manhood. He was buried two weeks ago, and at their first opportunity—the meeting of Monday—the Branch passed a tribute to his memory, and a vote of condolence with his bereaved parents and relations.

Heavy rain, accompanied by thunder and lightning, visited County Line and the district generally for about ten hours of Monday, and many a farmer raised his heart in thankfulness to the Giver of All Good therefor. The ground was parched, growth of crops seemed at a standstill, some ready to droop and die, and seed waiting to be sown was hurried in under the showers with a will. Now everything looks fresh and green, touched with the bloom of new life, bounding into growth. The thirsty ground embraced the welcome draught, and spoke the accents of gratified nature. It is one of those cases when "daisies shine forth in smiling beauty, and the hills sing psalms of joy," while, as Thomson says—

"Man superior walks
Amid the glad creation, musing praise
And looking lively gratitude."

"Ye chief, for whom the whole creation
smiles;
At once the head, the heart, the tongue of all,
Crown the great hymn!"

Cardigan Notes.

The crops in this part of the Island are looking fairly good, and the welcome rain on Monday will increase the hay crop very materially.

Cardigan River has become a great fishing ground, and some fine trout have been taken with the fly. At low water on the outer end of some of the points along the river, fine salmon trout, weighing from one half to two pounds can be taken, and the fisherman has not the disadvantage of catching his lines in the trees on the bank, or of being eaten with flies that he so often endures while fishing at many other streams.

Mackerel have struck in and some catches have been made, but this fish does not come up the river until about the 20th of July.

We understood that salmon and oyster spawn were to be placed in the Cardigan River this season, and it is to be hoped that the Inspector of Fisheries will not forget to pay us a visit. No finer river can be found on the Island, and its waters, if properly looked after, would teem with fish of all kinds. By the way we have not seen the appointment gazetted of a fishery warden in place of the late Mr. Robert Quinn.

Complaint is made that the mills do not take proper precautions to prevent sawdust getting into the river. We, therefore, trust that an efficient official will be appointed at once, and that no more netting of trout at Alley's mill will be allowed.

Trade at the stores continues brisk, and our merchants report larger sales than last year. The egg business shows a great increase, and the number of cases shipped each week is surprising.

Politics are very quiet, even the M. L. C. and his deputy at Lorne Valley have "nothing to say." Some enquiry about the meeting of the Liberal Conservative Association at Georgetown on the third Tuesday of July is made, and it has been suggested that it would be a good idea to invite the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries to attend.

The Bulgarian Question

DISCUSSED BY THE BRITISH CABINET—THE ELECTION OF PRINCE FERDINAND LIKELY TO CAUSE COMPLICATIONS.

It is stated that the British Cabinet, at its meeting on the 8th inst., spent three hours discussing the Bulgarian question in the aspect it has assumed since the election by the Sobranje of Prince Ferdinand. England, for various and obvious reasons, has been anxious to keep out of the Bulgarian muddle, and the election of Prince Ferdinand is undoubtedly an incubus, and the Government cannot refuse to accept his election and still be consistent, while to accept it would still further complicate other questions which still remain open between Great Britain and Russia. Of course, if pressed to the necessity of definitely endorsing the action of the Bulgarian Assembly, or of rejecting Prince Ferdinand's claim to the Bulgarian rulership, England would decide in favor of the former course, but she would rather not be forced to do either. It is announced that Prince Ferdinand intends to pay a visit to London immediately, and the character of his reception will go a long way towards committing England in the eyes of the powers to one position or the other. The fact that Prince Ferdinand is a Catholic would, under any circumstance, militate against the chance of Russia's recognition of his claim, since their orthodoxy is insisted upon as an essential qualification in the estimation of the Czar's Government for the occupation of the Bulgarian throne. But there is a lurking threat, were his Austrian friends less strong, and his relationship to the reigning family of England less close, the peculiarities of his religious faith might be overlooked. The Pall Mall Gazette, which paper takes the gloomiest views of the situation of any of the great journals, declared that the ascension of Prince Ferdinand to the throne of Bulgaria will be productive of the direst results.

The Duke of Saxe-Coburg is reported to have consented to Prince Ferdinand's assuming the Bulgarian throne. Prince Ferdinand has had an interview with Prince Alexander, the former ruler of Bulgaria. All the Bulgarian towns were illuminated on the night of the 8th inst., in honor of Prince Ferdinand's election.

A Bit of Persian Advice.

A father, on the occasion of his son's marriage, gave him a little special advice. "You are going to be married, my son; and you will wish that your wife should be quiet and submissive to you in all matters. Follow the advice which I now give you.
