Lobster Packers in Council.

The meeting of the Lobster Packers and Fishermen held in Norton & Co.'s Hall last night, was a large and representative gathering of all those engaged in that important industry. Among the number present were Honorable Senator Prowse, Hon. James Clow, Hon. Jos. O. Arsenault, Hon. D. Davies, I. C. Hall, U. S. Consul; Edmund Hackett, Esq., Inspector of Fisheries; David Rogers, M. P.; Donald Farquison, M. P.; Hon. G. H. Haszard, G. D. Longworth, A. McFarquison, A. F. Larkin, Benj. Rogers, Alex. McLeod, W. Grant, Daniel McKinnon, —Thompson, Gallant and Tidmarsh Esquires.

The following Resolutions were put, and after careful discussion, were unanimously carried:—

Whereas the change proposed by the Government, of seven days' fishing before and after the 15th of July, is so small, that in our opinion it would be of no material benefit.

Therefore Resolved, That the Province remain one district, as heretofore.

Whereas the Government propose June 5th as a starting for Spring Lobster fishing, and to close July the 15th; and whereas, in the opinion of this meeting, the change would lead to the complete destruction of the business, for in the experience, it is of the utmost importance to set traps just as soon as ice admits, which is usually from 1st to 20th May, and we find in most localities, the fish are on the fishing grounds as soon as ice leaves, and half of the pack is made previous to June 5th, and it has been proved under the present short seasons the fish have improved in both quantity and size, and also that the early fish are better in quality than later.

Therefore Resolved, That the open fishing season remain as under present regulations.

Whereas the Resolutions of size and number of Lobsters, as now in force, leads to trouble between fishermen, packers and wardens, and are impossible to be complied with or enforced, and in our opinion the present short season is ample for the preservation of the fish; therefore Resolved, that all restrictions as to the regulations of size and spawn fish be cancelled.

Whereas, the artificial propagation of the lobster at Newfoundland is proving successful and whereas we are informed that the Government intend experimenting in this direction in this Province.

Therefore Resolved, that we pledge ourselves to extend to the Department all possible assistance in securing and furnishing spawn and in assisting them in the proper protection of such localities as they may select for the purpose.

The discussion of the different resolutions elicited a great deal of information of a practical nature. The speeches of Hon. Senator Prowse, Hon. Daniel Davies, and others, representing the interests of the packers, and Daniel MacKinnon and Wm. Grant representing the lobster fishers, showed that while they were perfectly satisfied with the present arrangements as regards a close season, they were satisfied that if the time was any further restricted they would be forced to go entirely out of the business.

The restriction as regards size came in for a great deal of criticism, the discussion, and especially the speeches of M. Messrs. Grant and McKinnon the fishermen's representatives, making it very plain that this restriction, although extremely harassing to fishermen and packers, was absolutely worthless as a protection to the lobster.

The following resolution in recognition of Hon. Senator Prowse's services was unanimously and heartily passed:—

Recognizing the services of the Hon. Senator Prowse in the interest of the packers and lobster fishermen of this Province in presenting our case to the Department at Ottawa, working indefatigably to have the Government recognize the reasonable demands of the packers and fishermen.

Therefore resolved that a vote of thanks be tendered to him of this meeting.

Room for Chinamen.

OTTAWA, Dec. 30.—The Canada Pacific authorities are urging the Government to amend the regulation by which steamers in the China Canada trade can only carry a limited number of Chinese. It is contended that this restriction is unnecessary when the other existing regulations are enforced.

Therefore Resolved, That we condemn their action as expressed in their letters as being unworthy of the representatives of the people of Prince County who have again and again declared against a license system.

Resolved, that we commend the outspoken and candid words of Messrs. Nicholson, Murphy, Rogers, Ross, Poole, McKenzie.

SCOTT ACT CASES.—We are unable to find room to-day for the evidence in the Scott Act cases which came before the Magistrate this morning. Two cases were dismissed, five adjourned, and judgement in a third reserved. The McVay was found guilty of a first offence. In the hearing of this case one of the most brutal acts ever perpetrated to defeat justice came to light. A youth named Art White, about 17 years of age came to the stand under the influence of liquor. The Stipendiary declared in summing up the case, that this was one of the most notorious cases that had ever come before him, as it was plain that the boy had been filled with liquor by the defendant and sent in that condition to the stand. And can any one think of licensing men like that?
