TO SUM UP.

The short discussion permitted before the general election is about closed. It has been carried on in the dark as to the government's proceedings and expenditures in the past year. Indeed we shall not know the true financial state of the province until a new government shall have carefully investigated the public accounts.

But it has been clearly proved, and it is admitted that the following is a correct comparative statement of the expenditures in past years:

When it is remembered that the present Government obtained power by denouncing the "scandalous extravagance" of their predecessors, the above statement of expenditures, alone, ought to be sufficient ground upon which to drive them from office; for they either obtained power on the strength of a lie or else they are using their power to spend much more extravagantly than their condemned predecessors did.

It is not denied, indeed it is notorious, that the party now in office came in under a distinct pledge to "make ends meet." The following is their admitted record of DEFICITS.

It is admitted that when they gained office, the present party represented the day of taxation as far off. Their record shows that their borrowings by debentures and otherwise have been supplemented by the following:—

All these facts and figures have not been denied—they are admitted by those who are conducting the discussion on the part of the Government. Then, we submit, the Government ought to be voted out. But the Premier has issued a

manifesto, in which he has the audacity to claim a surplus as between the ordinary revenue and the ordinary expenditures of last year;—and in these ordinary expenditures are included "debentures sold \$17,089.50"! Here is a deliberate attempt to deceive the people; for the \$17,089.50 raised by "debentures sold" is a debt incurred. For issuing this false statement, if there were no other reason, the Premier and his government ought to be voted out by a people who regard "honesty as the best policy."

In his manifesto the Premier declares that "I have done my best." If he has done his best he cannot do better! Are the electors satisfied with the existing conditions of public affairs? Unless they are, it is their duty to vote down the Government of a Premier who openly admits and declares that he has done his best.

On the other hand the Hon Daniel Gordon has issued, on behalf of the Opposition which he leads, a manifesto in which he indicates and sets forth a number of reforms which he and his party will institute if given a working majority in the Legislature. The corrupt road system will be remodeled, our financial conditions will be ascertained and readjusted, our claims upon the Dominion Government will be vigorously pressed, absentee representation—as in the case of Mr. Fred Peters and Fort Augustus—will not be permitted, agriculture will be encouraged and the stock farm placed under improved management, the Public Works Department will be reformed, economy will be carried out in every department, and the resources of the Province safe-guarded and husbanded. This is the policy, the promises, of the gentlemen who have been selected as candidates to oppose the Government.

A BIG SURPLUS.

As one of the notable products of the extraordinary commercial activity of the fiscal year ended 30th June last, the Government of the United States exhibits a surplus of \$79,527,000.

This big surplus is due to the same causes as the little one of which we have heard so much boasting in Canada.

In Canada the increased revenue has led to increased expenditures notwithstanding pledges of economy on the part of the Government party. But the policy of the United States Government is to guard against extravagance. President McKinley says:—

"In our great prosperity we must guard against the danger it invites of extravagance in Government expenditures and appropriations; and the chosen representatives of the people will, I doubt not, furnish an example in their legislation of that wise economy which in a season of plenty husbands for the future."

This hint to the politicians is a good one. But, Quebec being master, it will be thrown away in so far as Canada is concerned.
