## \$100 Fine Is Levied

GLASGOW (Reuters) — Police have arrested a second man sought in a nationwide manhunt following the shooting of three London detectives. The arrest was made in this Scottish capital Wednesday within 50 yards of a major police station.

Police had warned that John Duddy, 37, was dangerous and believed armed. But when two carloads of detectives descended on a tenement building in the working-class district of Calton, they found him unarmed and unresisting.

Duddy and Harry Roberts, 30, were named and described in nationwide radio and television broadcasts Tuesday and everyone in Britain was urged to turn detective to find them.
