



A FULL CITY COUNCIL MEETS FOR LAST TIME. ELECTION CHANGES ARE DUE TOMORROW

Housewife Faces Charge Of Recognizance Breach

Normally a mother who allows the family oven to cool only when she is out making her rounds of delivery of the baked goods her home industry produces would be greeted with nods of approbation by an admiring community.

In the case of Mrs. Phyllis Dickieson, however, County Judge C. St. Clair Traitor of Charlottetown is going to have to decide whether her similar activities as described by witnesses in County Criminal Court yesterday actually constitute breach of terms of a two-year suspended sentence the woman was given following her conviction of a theft charge.

For stealing \$15,000 from the New Glasgow Dairy Company in her home community, Mrs. Dickieson was sentenced to two years in prison but had the sentence suspended under certain conditions. She was enjoined from taking any employment outside her home for the two years, and in that time was to remain at home and attend to the special needs of her children.

The breach of recognizance charge has brought the home baker back into a courtroom, where she is represented by Kenneth MacDohald and Gerald Foster, QC, as defence counsel. Alan Scales called five witnesses for the Crown yesterday in opening his case that Mrs. Dickieson has been too busy baking and making her baked goods delivery rounds to provide for her children as the suspended sentence recognizance bond required her to do.

CHILDREN DIDN'T PROTEST

Mrs. H.H. Pierce and Mrs. Margaret Thompson, both of Charlottetown, put it on the record they had bought baked goods from Mrs. Dickieson both at their cottages at Stanhope and at their city homes. Anita Marie Dolron testified she had worked as help in the Dickieson home for two months last summer. She had done the dishes, tidied up the home, as well as doing other housework chores and even had helped out at that busy oven. She said the Dickieson children were well looked after and had never made any particular protest or showed a need for their mother when she was absent from the house.

Roland Larkin, an employee of the New Glasgow Dairy Company, gave evidence he was also

treasurer of the New Glasgow Junior Farmers organization and on their behalf had bought homebaked rolls and fresh bread from the accused for the lobster suppers put on by the Junior Farmers. He said he had some qualms about these transactions involving a breach of the recognizance but had done nothing about it. In his opinion the Dickieson children were well-mannered youngsters.

RCMP Sgt. Elliot testified he had, on instructions of the Attorney-General's Department, investigated the oven activities, following Mrs. Dickieson on her delivery rounds. He had visited her home and did not consider it or the only child present on his visit to be in a clean condition.

CASE ADJOURNED

Summing up for the Crown, Mr. Scales said the accused had not abided by the conditions of her bond but had spent nearly all the week either baking or out selling, as well as making quite

regular delivery rounds. He said he considered her to be solely in the baking business instead of taking care of her children at home.

For the defence, Mr. Foster argued the bond said the children had special needs but not that they needed special care. He also pointed out that his client was not a slave to a hot stove the year around but baked heavily only during the summer tourist and cottage season. He said the Crown has not proved that Mrs. Dickieson did work outside her home that prevented her from attending to the special needs of her children as the bond demands.

The hearing was adjourned until Feb. 18.

Ferry Traffic Continues On Upswing

Figures released by government transportation officials show a continuing upward trend for ferry travel at Borden.

In January, 1965, CNR ferries carried 15,379 passengers, 8,287 vehicles and 2,841 train passengers.

Canadian National says the number of cars and trucks carried increased during the month although the ferries handled a smaller number of tractor trailers. Passenger automobiles showed an increase of 722 while five more trucks were carried. However, the number of tractor trailers dropped from 1,090 in January 1964 to 969 last month.

Two vessels, the Abegweit and the Confederation, handled all the traffic during the month. They made a total of 415 crossings with Abegweit completing 346 crossings and the Confederation
