Island potatoes have been shipped to all parts of the world. However, they are encountering heavy competition at present and Mr. Peppin felt that the only way to combat the growing rivalry is by correct grading and proper marketing. He stated that this year there is a crop of 10,000 carloads, biggest in the history of the Province, and many farmers were obtaining from

400 to 500 bushels per acre.

Shows Slides

Mr. Henry MacLaren, District Inspector of the Seed Potato Service, showed the audience a large number of slides illustrating the various diseases to which potatoes are subject.

Mr. Peppin also reminded his hearers that there was a time about 1917, when terrific efforts were being made to control late blight. That year the Southern States were trying to obtain a type of potato which would give a continuous yield. The following year the Island sent three samples which suited. They gave a better yield and were free of disease and this led to the visit of the representative attempting to buy the entire crop.

Mr. Gallant, president of the Board, first introduced Mr. Bruce Stewart who spoke on the development of the Souris Board of Trade over the years. Mr. Stewart reminded his hearers of the many things aiding Kings County in which the Board had taken an active part.
