Saint John Budget

SAINT JOHN, N. B., March 1—(CP) — A 1950 budget calling for the expenditure of \$1,063,000 was approved by the Common Council last week. Last year's estimate called for spending of \$2,871,300. This year's tax rate will not be set for several weeks but may be higher than 1949's 44 levy. Major items which showed increases in the new budget were board of school trustees, \$1,016,213, up \$70,201; vocational school, \$131,000, up \$38,113; county warrant, \$997,000, an increase of \$68,240.
