Ch'town Guardian Subscription Dept.

In view of the interest manifested in the early events of our city and the lecture recently delivered by Mr. Henry Smith, the following sent the Guardian for publication by one of Charlottetown's oldest citizens will be found interesting: Mr. Henry Smith in his very interesting lecture on old Charlottetown is slightly astray in regard to the Post office. For many years after the office left the Chapel building it was held in the building still standing on Water Street just in the rear of Carvell Bros. brief building, corner of Queen and Water Streets. The writer remembers it there in 1851. The session of the Legislature for that year was remarkable for two important events in Island history, namely, the introduction of Responsible Government, and the reduction of letter postage from one shilling and six pence to three pence, or from twenty-four cents to four cents per letter. Just across the street on the site of the building lately occupied by DeBlois Bros. stood the Victoria Hotel, the leading hostelry for many years. It was a large wooden structure owned by the Peake estate and was burned down about sixty years ago. Much more might be written about "Old Charlottetown" and the old days. The first steam driven machinery in Charlottetown was the steam fanney of the late W. B. Dawson, located on Grafton street west. Some of the residents in the vicinity objected to the shrill sound of the whistle, it disturbed their morning nap, and the grievance was ventilated by a letter to the press. The "Islander" accordingly published an article saying it was a pity Charlottetown did not have more steam whistles, and more industries and there the matter ended.

The first peddles on a ferry boat that ever disturbed the placid waters of the Hill-borough were on a small boat owned and operated by the late Thomas Boggs Tremaine. The place of arrival and departure was in the dock below the coal office of C. Lyons & Co., and the propulsive power that turned the peddles was a horse on the deck of the boat. The writer does not know how many years that boat was in the ferry service, but the service ended on the arrival of the two small steamers, "Ira" and "Ino" in the early fifties. The Tremaine building stood on the site of the present coal offices. It was a fairly large building, painted red, and in it the late J. S. Carvell commenced his business career in Charlottetown.

Speaking of the "Cross Keys" tavern, the writer remembers the old house well. It was a long low structure with dormer windows on the roof, and in the rear the roof sloped down for some distance back of the main building. In the old days in Charlottetown lived Paul Mabey. In his active days Mr. Mabey was a good business man. He was a large property owner, and a prominent and rather eccentric citizen.
