

Hughes Leads Scoring Race

BYC And Parkdale Play For 2nd Place Tonight

It will be a battle for second place in the Island Senior "B" League tonight when the Parkdale Flyers are at home to the Basilica Youth Club.

Both teams have identical 1-2 records in league play to date. The lone Parkdale victory came at the expense of the B.Y.C. and the youth clubbers earned a 5-5 decision over S.D.U. in their initial outing of the year.

Besides their loss to the Flyers the B.Y.C. were edged 7-6 by the Summerside Aces. Both of the Flyers' defeats have been at the hands of the league-leading Montague Primroses.

The last time B.Y.C. and Parkdale met it was a nip and tuck battle with the Flyers having to come from behind an early first-period 2-0 deficit to earn their victory.

Unofficial league statistics compiled by the Guardian Sports Department show the Montague Primroses dominating the scoring race. Smooth-skating centreman Billy Hughes is currently the league's leading scorer with 10 points made up of 4 goals and 6 assists. Dick Carroll and Phil McGee of Montague are tied with Willie Dunn of the Flyers and Brian Lewis of B.Y.C. for third and Apps Arsenault

and MacLeod of Montague are stalemated for fourth position. Summerside ace of the Aces Paul Schurman holds down the runner-up spot with 5 goals and 4 assists.

Arsenault is the top goal getter in the league with 7 goals and linemate Dick Carroll leads in assists with 7.

Ron MacArthur of Summerside has the doubtful privilege of leading the badmen with 35 minutes spent in the box. Included in this total are a misconduct and a major penalty.

Carroll of Montague is runner-up to MacArthur with 29 minutes, including a match-misconduct and a major.

Three Fast Goals Give Bruins Tie With Rangers

NEW YORK (AP) — Boston Bruins spotted New York Rangers three goals in the first two periods Wednesday night then roared back with three tallies of their own in the last 21 minutes to earn a 3-3 tie in a rough National Hockey League game at Madison Square Garden.

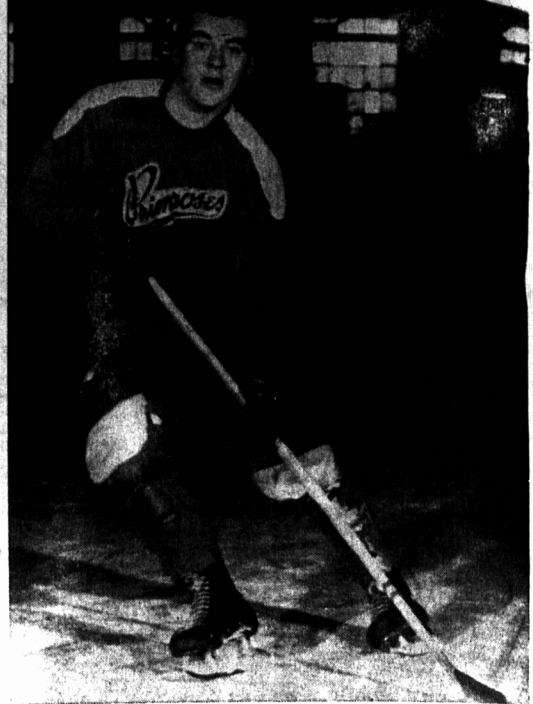
Trailing 3-0 and apparently en route to their third straight defeat by the Rangers the aroused Bruins finally got their first goal with less than a minute to go in the second period on a shot by Murray Costello.

Boston, encouraged by their first goal against New York in more than 139 minutes, then ripped in two more in the first three minutes of the final period.

Leo Labine scored the equalizer at 2:51 after Flemming Mackell had netted Boston's second goal only 41 seconds after the start of the third period.

A gathering of 8,582 sent up the biggest cheer of the night when Wally Hergesheimer scored at 16:33 of the second period to put New York in front 3-0. The tally, a 45-footer, was the veteran wingman's 100th major league goal, all with the Rangers.

Dave Creighton scored New York's first goal at 3:19 of the first period and Andy Hebenton made it 2-0 in 5:41 of the second.

Beavers Continue Streak With 6-3 Win Over Caps

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Saint John Beavers continued their winning streak in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League when they trounced third-place Fredericton Capitals 6-3 before a typically small pre-Christmas crowd Wednesday night.

The Beavers' win maintained their single-point lead over Amherst Ramblers.

Saint John and Moncton scored one apiece in both the first and third periods but during the middle frame Beavers' outgated the visitors 4-1.

Wally Kullman led the point-getters by tallying three times and helping Frank Kuzma once. Playing coach Steve Brklacich and Sid Puddicombe also scored for Beavers.

Fredericton's Buck Whitlock counted within the first minute of play and assisted Bernie Macdonald in the last period. Bill McDonagh was the other Capital scorer.

HAMILTON (CP)—Two young women have gone to bat for the men's baseball club here.

Just 22, Carol Hodge, an auburn-haired lass from Winston-Salem, N. C., took over last Monday as general manager of Red Wings, Pony League champions.

One year younger, Jean Marini, a dark-haired Hamilton bookkeeper, is the club's chief stockholder and secretary. She sank her savings into the club at the end of last season after two businessmen withdrew.

Though it's Jean's first venture into baseball business, Carol is a veteran. Tured by her father, she has followed league play since she was knee-high to an umpire. She was general manager of a major league club's farm team before her 21st birthday.

Rough Riders Report Loss

OTTAWA (CP)—Ottawa Rough Riders of the Big Four Football Union reported Wednesday a loss on 1955 operations tentatively estimated at between \$30,000 and \$35,000.

A club official said that the exact figures will not be known until the club receives its share of the Big Four playoffs and the Grey Cup final.

It was estimated that the operations of the club cost roughly \$300,000, an increase over the 1954 expenditures of \$287,244. In 1954, the club reported a deficit of \$17,309.

Exact figures on the club's finances now are with the auditors. Breakdown of the club's revenues and expenditures was not available.

AMHERST (CP)—A goal by Jackie Schmidt late in the third period gave the Amherst Ramblers a 5-4 win over Moncton Hawks in the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League Wednesday night.

Moncton flashing improved form came from behind three times to knot the count but were unable to match the final counter although they used six forwards in the final minute.

Both teams played two-way hockey and provided thrilling action. The win enabled the Ramblers to keep pace with league-leading Saint John Beavers who notched a 6-3 win over Fredericton. Only one point separates the two teams.

Urges National Rivalries Be Kept Out Of Olympics

CORTINA D'AMPEZZO, Italy (AP)—Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, asked Wednesday that national rivalries be kept out of the Olympic Games.

Brundage, in a circular letter to national Olympic committees, declared the games were intended to be individual competitions. He urged that no national standings be published.

His letter was made public by Italian officials now preparing for the winter games which open here Jan. 26.

Brundage said the committee which he heads had been "deeply

impressed by articles printed in various countries, alleging that results achieved by athletes would be the product of certain political or social conditions."

He recalled that the Olympic rules described the game as a competition among individuals.

"They are not and must not become competitions among nations," he said.

Brundage said this is the reason that no official point standings of countries are issued in connection with the games. He said "unofficial standings" have no value as they do not take into account many factors, such as the different populations of countries.

Argonauts Sign Players Destined For Edmonton

EDMONTON (CP)—Edmonton Eskimos have first call on players of the Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen of the Ontario Rugby Football Union, two of whom have been reported signed by Toronto Argonauts, a spokesman for the Eskimos said Wednesday.

The Big Four Argos said Tuesday they had signed tackle John Ganelle and end Mat Pagnan. Officials of the Dutchmen said they will retain the CRU cards of the players.

The Eskimo spokesman said:

"So far as we are concerned, our working agreement with the Kitchener-Waterloo club is still in force. This agreement was first made in 1954 when the Eskimos played an exhibition game at Kitchener for the benefit of the Dutchmen.

"The agreement was renewed last season. Under the terms of the agreement, the Eskimos got first call on any K-W players who appear to be good prospects."

The spokesman said the Eskimos might play an exhibition game in Kitchener late next summer and that they might also pay the eastern club for players in the future.

Nashua Leads Handicap List

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Nashua, the world's most valuable race horse, topped a list of 59 thoroughbreds nominated Wednesday for the \$100,000-added Widener Handicap at Hialeah Park Feb. 18.

The list included 14 foreign-breds representing five different countries and 24 winners of 87 major stakes races in 1955.

Nashua, horse of the year and recently sold to a Leslie Combs syndicate for \$1,251,200, is due to arrive here Saturday from Kentucky. If Nashua wins the Widener and the \$50,000 McLennan he can pass the winnings of Citation—\$1,085,700.

Fleet Milkman Scores 2nd Win

MELBOURNE, (AP)—Dave Stephens, Australia's "bare-foot milkman" scored his second victory over Hungary's world record holder, Sandor Iharos, in a special three-mile race here Wednesday.

The flying Aussie won the race in 13 minutes, 37.5 seconds, breaking the tape 4.7 seconds in front of the Hungarian who was clocked in 13:42.3.

Last Saturday Stephens, who got his unusual title from his milk-delivery job and shoeless training methods, beat Iharos and the other Hungarian distance ace, Lasso Tabori, in a 5,000-metre race, clocked in 14:07.2.

Iharos, a member of the touring Hungarian team now on an exhibition tour of this continent, set four world distance running records during the last year.

Joe Louis To Marry Again

NEW YORK (AP)—Joe Louis, former heavyweight boxing champion, and Rose Morgan, a beauty shop owner, obtained a marriage licence Wednesday and said they plan a Christmas Day ceremony.

"I'm very happy," said Louis. "Now I've got somebody to come home to."

Louis, now 41 and no longer active in the ring, listed his occupation as boxer. His bride-to-be, wearing a full-length mink coat, gave her age as 42.

Louis was married twice to Marva Trotter and twice divorced. A previous marriage of Miss Morgan to Peter Coleman ended in divorce in 1945.
