Contract Let For Souris Breakwater

The tender of \$88,869 of H. J. Phillips and Son for the completion of work on the breakwater at Souris has been accepted. It was revealed yesterday. It involves the construction of the outer 405 feet adjoining the main block. The breakwater is designed to form an artificial barrier to give protection to shipping in the Souris Harbour. The outer section was first built in 1914 and is of creosoted piles. The head block, 40 feet wide and 70 feet long, was reconstructed last year. It is not expected that the present contract, which will be started immediately, will be completed this year due to difficulty in obtaining the creosoted timbers in sufficient quantities at one time.

There will be so many lonely moments, many heart-sick ones, but you will always have the comfort of your small son and, in time, perhaps you will have the home you long for. MAY MAKE HAPPY MARRIAGE. Many, many girls in situations similar to yours have made happy marriages, and there is no reason to doubt that you may be able to, also. Obviously, and as you already realize, you would need a much firmer foundation than would be necessary under ordinary circumstances. A man who will overlook your one mistake and assume the responsibility of bringing up your son needs a more than ample supply of charity, kindness, generosity and consideration. There is no reason why you should announce to every man who takes you out that you have a child, but certainly, if you see signs of approaching seriousness the intentions of one of them, he must be told. This will not be an easy task for you, since it will mean no more dates from almost all men. However, you can always hope and pray for the one man who will make allowances for human frailty. Don't wait until mutual affections become too strong. It will be much better if you devote the next few years to caring for and bringing up your baby. You will find much joy in this work. Since it was your own decision to keep the baby, he deserves, and is entitled to every bit of personal care you can give him. Don't compound an error by neglecting him. He is your first obligation. For the time being, at least, outside pleasures are decidedly secondary. You must be first, and always, a good mother to your son.
