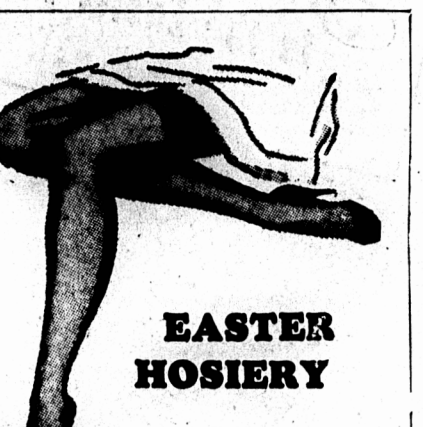
The chairman in reporting for Mr. W. K. Sharpe and Dr. R. H. Barrett indicated that plans for swimming and yachting events were well in hand.
