## Prince Ratepayers Indignant About Roads

TIGNISH—The third annual meeting of the Tignish Regional High School was held in the school auditorium Tuesday evening with representatives from 21 school districts present.

Everett Broderick, chairman of trustees, reported that in the past the trustees would like to see the annual meeting held in the month of August, as the auditors' financial report from the previous year, and this is not satisfactory to the ratepayers, as they would like to have a more up-to-date report.

Robin J. Gallant read the minutes of the last annual meeting. Gerald Handrahan reported for the board of trustees in detail. The report on what was spent on each item to April was also given.

**OPERATION COSTS**  
Questions on the operation cost of the school and buses were answered by the chairman of the board of trustees, the school and buses met with the approval of the meeting, the only items exceeding the budget were fuel, electricity, and the cost of running the buses.

Teachers' supplements will be paid to see if they compare with other teachers in the area.

Mr. Broderick took the meeting to the only 53 super-4 teachers on the island, Tignish Regional High School, which will have five on staff.

Sister St. Mary Arnold, principal, gave the report on the year. She said 187 pupils attend the high school, an increase over the last two years. Encyclopedias were purchased during the year.

Every pupil has one hour of supervised study that is voluntarily given by the teachers each evening. This will be continued next term only if parents and students agree this is best when school commences in September. This has been carried out with the wish of the students in the past.

**ROAD CONDITIONS**  
Two resolutions will be drafted to the department of highways concerning winter and spring road conditions in the regional area that resulted in a lot of controversy.

One is the great need for a snow plow dispatcher to be stationed in the region; the other that the school board contact the minister of highways to go over the bus routes, and have improvements made to roads that are impassable for bus service.

Some resolutions are now being drawn up in the various districts on this very problem. With roads in such poor condition keeping buses operating will be an even greater expense. It was stated.

Ratepayers in the Kildare Cape, Norway, Sea Cow Pond, St. Felix, and Waterford areas all expressed resentment at the state of the roads.

## O'Leary Advised Of Rate Increase

O'LEARY—The third annual meeting of O'Leary Regional High School comprising 29 school districts with 12 trustees, was held Tuesday evening in the school auditorium.

Claud Jelley, chairman of the board, announced that the board had been advised by the department of education that the tax assessment rate was to be increased from 85 to 810 per thousand of valuation.

The minutes were read by the secretary, Mrs. George Caruthers followed by the interim report.

The 1963-64 budget was accepted by the ratepayers and the following new trustees were appointed, Alban D. Arsenault, replacing Dorice Gallant to represent Howland and Dwyer districts; Harding Boulter, re-elected to represent Glenwood and Hebron; John Lewis, re-elected for Woodstock and Unionville; Willis Bulger, re-elected for Dunblaine and West Point.

A letter from Merritt Callaghan, a supervisor of schools, dealt with improvements over recent years to school property and conditions made available by the ratepayers and the board to pupils and teachers. He also stated the importance of a good library which is of inestimable value to pupils and teachers.

Donald MacKenzie suggested that the school board arrange a meeting with regional trustees from Alberton and Tignish concerning the possibility of setting up a vocational school in West Prince. Following a discussion on the proposal the meeting adjourned.

MONTREAL (CP)—Ring-wisdom Zora Folley evaded Bob Clewous' lumbering rushes and punched Thursday night for a conclusive decision over the square-shouldered Canadian in their 10-round heavyweight bout.

At 200 pounds Folley gave a six-pound weight advantage to Clewous, an eager but crude 25-year-old from suburban C. meadey.

The 30-year-old Folley—his birthday is next Monday—staggered Clewous in the opening round and pummeled him almost at will the rest of the way, exploiting the wild lunges by his man to punish him severely with hooks and crosses to the head.

All three judges gave the fight to the Chandler, Ariz., veteran by decisive margins under the five-point start-up system.
