

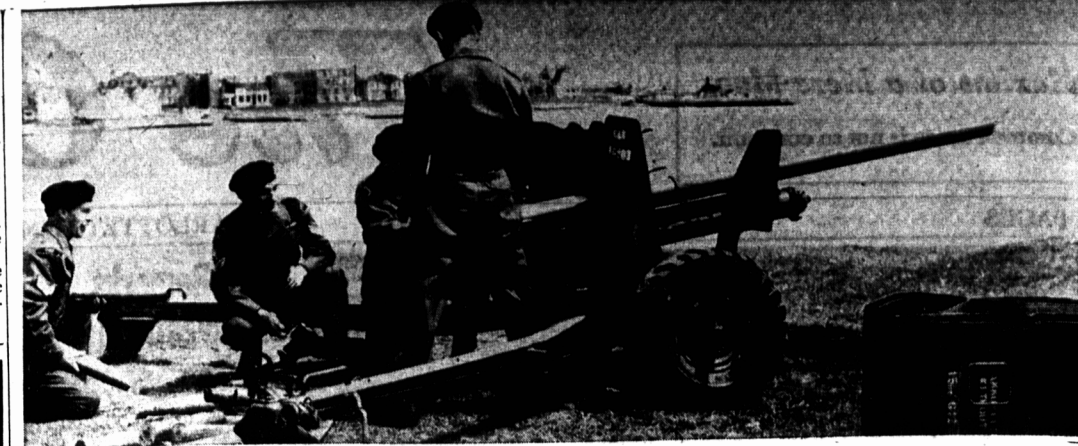

Fear Cypriots May Strike At London

LONDON (Reuters) — Scotland Yard Monday took the extraordinary precaution of issuing arms to a number of uniformed policemen for fear that Cypriot terrorists might strike in London. This is the first time since the Irish Republican Army's terrorist activities in the late 1920s. Normally uniformed police are armed only with a nightstick. The weapons issued to police are nine-millimetre automatic pistols—a small gun easily concealed in a shoulder holster.

have to be used a total of four times if the June 7 deadline for the bill's passage is to be met.

Mr. Harris said the decision on the pipeline loan was made in the light of the application before the U.S. Federal Power Commission for approval of Trans-Canada's export of surplus gas at Emerson, Man. That approval apparently had been necessary for Trans-Canada to arrange private financing of its project.

"Our policy means we are not waiting for the FPC at all."

He said another factor is the \$30,000,000 or \$40,000,000 investment in 34-inch pipe for the line on which Trans-Canada holds an option. If the government let the company wait for FPC approval which did not come until next year, it was unlikely that those who ordered the pipe would hold it unused for a year. In that event, pipe for the Canadian project would not be available until 1958.

CANT UNDERSTAND

Mr. Harris said he can't understand why Conservative opponents of the measure are disregarding the position of Ontario's Conservative government which wanted gas brought to Ontario as soon as possible.

A. J. Brooks (PC—Royal) said that Trans-Canada, incorporated after promises it could build the line without government help, now had come running to the government for aid.

"They have climbed on the backs of the Canadian government. They have their hands, I believe, very close to the throat of the Canadian government and people. I feel the people of Canada will feel we have been blackmailed into doing something Trans-Canada said years ago it could do without any assistance."

Mr. Brooks said the Maritimes and British Columbia will get no benefit and Quebec will benefit very little. There now was no excuse for the government refusing aid to the Maritimes.

Mr. Harris said that statement sounded like "The very smallest little Canadianism I've ever heard." It was saying that a pro-

ject which would be to the credit of all Canadians should be held up because it was not possible for the government to do something else in another part of the country.

SHORT OF POWER

Henry Hosking (L — Wellington South) said Ontario is fast becoming short of power. It had developed three-quarters of all its potential hydro power, of all its pipeline would bring to Ontario six times the power available at Niagara Falls.

J. W. Murphy (PC — Lambton West) said it appears some members of the government "are captives of Trans-Canada."

René Juras (L — Provencher) said Conservative drivers are blaming all Canada's troubles on American investment in Canada. But Americans invested their money in this country according to Canadian laws and "if they come it is because we invite them."
