BAGHDAD DEFENSE PACT

The Baghdad Defence Pact is a mutual assistance agreement between the following member countries: Iraq, Iran, Pakistan, Turkey and the United Kingdom. Representatives of these nations held their 1956 meeting of the Baghdad Pact Council in Teheran, Iran during April. The United States sent observers and reaffirmed its solid support of the Pact and that it would become a full member of the Economic and Counter Subversion Committees. It will also establish a military liaison group, headed by a high ranking officer in Baghdad, the permanent headquarters of the Pact.

Sir Walter Monckton, Britain's Minister of Defence, at the opening session spoke of the work accomplished during the first five months of the Pact's life. He said that an imposing amount of work had been done on military, economic and in other matters and that he was impressed with the quality of this work and with the excellent spirit of co-operation. "This augurs well for the future."

He stressed the great importance that the United Kingdom attached to the work of the Pact's Economic Committee, and urged that quick action be taken on the recommendations of the Economic Committee with reference to the economic development suggested. He spoke of "the atomic training centre in Baghdad to which the British Government has undertaken to contribute both equipment and teaching staff, as well as the initial training course for teachers, which is to start at Harwell, England in May, 1956. There is proposed a regional training centre in the use of agricultural machinery and methods of combating soil erosion."

BRITISH ASSISTANCE

Early in April, Great Britain offered to contribute 250,000 pounds, for technical assistance for countries in the Baghdad Defence Pact in addition to the cost of their contribution to the Atomic Energy Training Centre. Britain has allocated a sum specifically for technical assistance for various joint enterprises covering hydro-electric development, irrigation, afforestation, and industrial development, and will do all in her power to encourage the progress of all these schemes and other development plans, already started in the countries in the Baghdad Pact.

ANGLO-IRAQI AGREEMENT

An agreement was signed in Baghdad in December 1955, by which Britain put at the free disposal of Iraq, as her friend and partner in the Baghdad Pact, all the installations which she had built over the years for the defence of the Middle East, to be used by them for the same purpose. The Government of Iraq, on its part, undertaking to provide certain essential facilities for British Forces, free of charge, and to purchase arms in Great Britain. This agreement was designed to strengthen the close connection between the forces of the two countries and consolidate the mutual assistance for various joint enterprises covering hydro-electric development, irrigation, afforestation, and industrial development, and will do all in her power to encourage the progress of all these schemes and other development plans, already started in the countries in the Baghdad Pact.

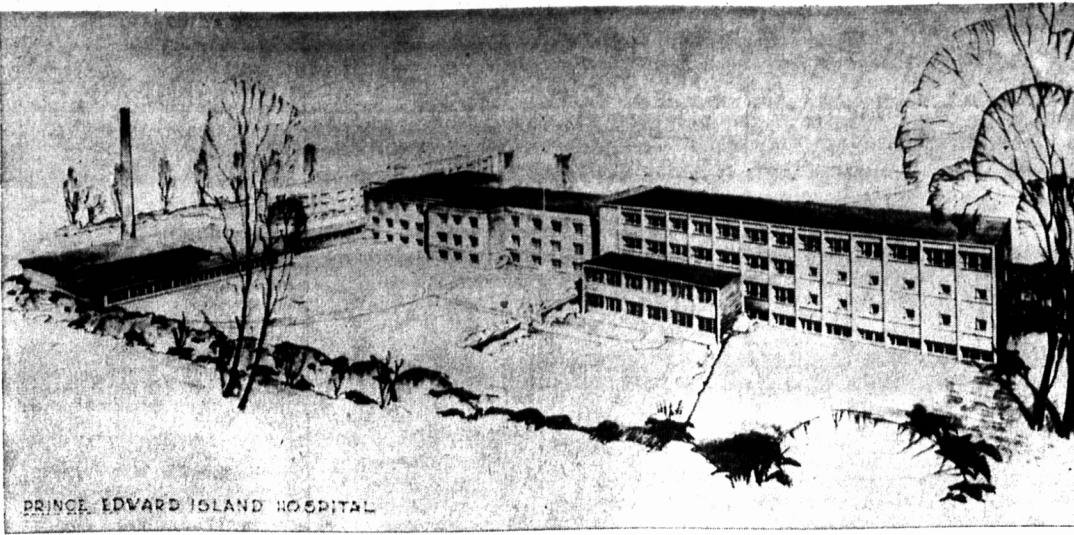

Stresses Importance Of New P.E.I. Hospital Plans

In an interview, yesterday, Mr. J. David Stewart, general chairman of the Prince Edward Island Hospital Campaign, stated that the Advance and Special Gifts phase of the campaign is going forward slowly, and the general organization throughout the rural centres and rural area is being organized satisfactorily. A hearty, enthusiastic response by our people.

Some citizens have readily grasped the magnitude of the project and are already working zealously for the campaign, as well as giving generously of their own material resources.

As the situation concerning the urgency of the need and the detail plan of solution, according to Mr. Stewart, may not be fully appreciated by all of our citizens, he summed up the situation and the solution, as follows:

BASIC SERVICES

"Hospital authorities have pointed out, for some time, that certain basic service departments of the Hospital are inadequate and, in some instances, obsolete. The deficiencies in certain departments, of course, have been well known to our physicians, nurses and technicians who have to cope with difficulties day by day in their efforts to render the best possible care to our sick and injured.

"The most pronounced examples are found in the operating suites, X-ray and Pathological Departments and designs which were built and designed to accommodate a 100 bed hospital instead of the 200 bed hospital we now have. This is also true of the power plant and laundry.

"Our main building was opened on July 4, 1933, as a cottage hospital type of structure. While it was considered well designed and satisfactory for a 100 bed unit, it was at the time, 1929, a compromise plan as sufficient funds were not available and could not be raised for a four storey structure better designed for future expansion. This cottage type of structure, with sky-light, etc., while a good, compact unit in itself, is now being replaced by gradual additions, particularly upwards, and a later plan of expansion involves functional problems because of the distance patients are removed from central, basic facilities.

VETERANS' WING

"In 1947, a new Veterans' Wing was added, with the addition of 100 beds, which has since been serviced by the original operating units, service departments and kitchens. These units are now entirely inadequate and are cramped for space, making it difficult to perform a completely satisfactory service.

"This is true not only because of the increased patient load, but also because of the amount of additional modern equipment that must be added from time to time to keep pace with the rapid growth of medical science. The results are overcrowding and, inevitably, some inefficiency. The situation also makes it more difficult to employ and retain the service of trained key personnel, already a problem in the administration of the Hospital.

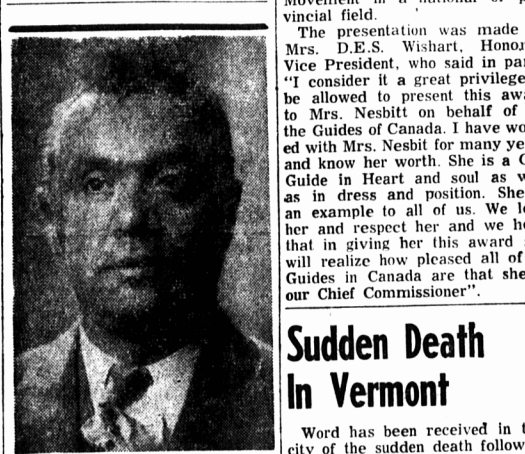
"The patient bed situation is adequate for the immediate needs and for pressing needs in the immediate future chiefly because of the shorter period spent in the Hospital by the individual patient. If and when National Health Insurance comes, patient beds may have to be increased. A solution
