Miss Anna K. Riley, general secretary gave the report for the P.E.I. Teachers Federation.

Superintendent of schools, J. Albert Gallant addressed the convention on "Reflections of a good teacher".

J. S. Williams, director of curriculum addressed the convention on departmental affairs in the absence of the Malcolm MacKenzie, deputy minister and director of education. Christopher Glehill, provincial director of music spoke on music workshops that will be carried on in the area in the future.

Mrs. W. W. Reid, Junior Red Cross director, spoke on the work carried on by juniors both on the national and international levels. Mr. McQuaid of Charlottetown spoke on the work carried on by the Retarded Children's Association in the province.

During the afternoon session group discussions were held. Workshops will be held during the year, one at Alberton and one at Tignish, it was announced.

Mrs. Walter Hogan, secretary read the minutes of the previous convention, and lunch was served during the convention by the Tignish council of the C.W.L.

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Aberton UC Hall To Be Dedicated

ALBERTON — The new United Church hall at Aberton will be dedicated Tuesday evening by Rev. D. Elton Adams of Souris, chairman of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery, assisted by other members of the church.

Recognizing the need for more accommodation for the Sunday school, the congregation appointed a committee to study the matter a few years ago. Under the leadership of Rev. James H. MacIsaac, the committee studied carefully several proposals for renovating the old hall, but decided that it would be better to erect a new one. This was approved by the congregation and then by presbytery.

In January, 1962, men of the congregation, and other men of the area, went to work in the woods cutting lumber that had been donated by other men of the congregation. With the men was their minister, Mr. MacIsaac, who was an experienced woodsman.

When the trees had been felled and the logs were taken home their power saws and axes, and returned with the 112 tractors, to haul the lumber to the mill. In the spring it was brought to the building site. The old hall had been built just 70 years earlier, was sold and removed.

CONCRETE POURED
Concrete for the new foundation was poured in mid-August, 1962, and a week later the first floor was laid. It is of interest that some of the nails in this floor were driven by two young men from Aberton who were visiting the congregation. Their creation of the hall according to plans designed by Mrs. James H. MacIsaac. The head carpenter was Willard Gordon. When Mr. MacIsaac left the congregation to enter the army chaplaincy service his responsibility as chairman of the building committee were assumed by Perley Harry Erection of the hall developed into the greatest co-operative project ever undertaken by the men of the congregation.

Six hundred man hours were spent in cutting and hauling lumber and this is an infinitesimal fraction of the time donated.

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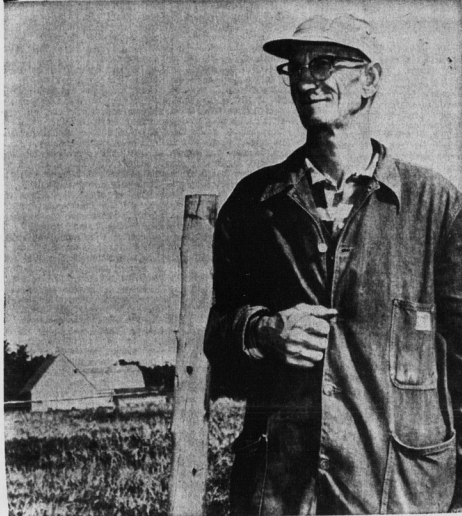
