Why Hon. Mr. McLeod's Administration Should be Sustained by the People.

- 1. Justice and fair play demand that the new Leader be given a fair trial. 2. The personal and political career of the Leader of the new Administration justify the belief that he will prove to be a careful and capable administrator of public affairs. 3. The new administration have announced as their policy: "rigorous economy" and "the collection of the debts due the public," combined with increased aid to our farming interests, the repairs of the wharves, and ample provision for education, roads, bridges, etc. 4. The interests of the province are more likely to be promoted by an administration in harmony with the Federal Government than by one which is opposed to it. 5. The McLeod Administration is made up of and supported by men of ability who are experienced in the conduct of public affairs. 6. Those who are opposed to the new Administration have no Leader to succeed to the Government; and if they obtained a majority in the Legislature the Government will practically fall into the hands of a "junta" of ambitious lawyers, composed of the firms of Davies & Sutherland, Peters & Peters, and John H. Bell. 7. Those who are opposed to the new Administration have submitted no policy to the judgment of the electors. What more likely, then, than that they will, if they obtain a majority, fall back upon the policy and the methods of the Davies Government?

The First District of Queen's.

A correspondent at Lot 29 says: Messrs. Campbell and Haslam, the Government candidates, are steadily gaining ground in the southern end of this district. The farmers here are coming to the conclusion that they do not want too many lawyers to represent them in the Local Legislature. And the prospects are at the present that Campbell and Haslam, representatives of the farmers, will be returned with a good majority on the 30th instant.

The Journal reports that the Fourth District of Prince County will not only return Hon. Mr. Bentley, C. P. W., but will send to Parliament with him Mr. Major Wright, thus redeeming the district from the mistake made at the last election, when Mr. John H. Bell was elected. The country in general, and the Fourth District in particular, could ill afford to dispense with the services of Mr. Bentley, and he will, without any doubt, be returned by a handsome majority, and his colleague, Mr. Major Wright, an able business man, immensely popular with all classes, will bury Mr. Bell so deep politically on polling day, that that verbose and dreary gentleman will imagine that he has been struck by a malignant biliousness.

Mr. Clarke's Candidature.

THE nomination of Mr. John C. Clarke as a third Opposition candidate for the representation of the first district of Queen's County shows that there is a deep feeling of discontent on the part of the better class of the Oppositionists. Mr. Clarke has long been known as a thick and thin supporter of the Liberal Party. But he is now running counter to Opposition candidates for his district. This is a very significant fact.

Supreme Court.

WEDNESDAY, Jan. 22. John M. Nicholson vs. the trustees of the Springton School District. This case was concluded yesterday, when a verdict was found for the plaintiff for \$100 damages. The action was brought on an agreement entered into between the teacher and the trustees by which the teacher agreed to teach the Springton school for the year ending 30th June, 1889, and the trustees agreed to pay a supplemental allowance of \$50. The plaintiff taught the school, but at the end of the year the trustees refused to pay the supplement, alleging as a reason that the district meeting at which the supplement was voted was illegal. This action against the trustees was then brought, not only to receive the amount of the supplement, but also the additional \$50 which the teacher would have received from the Government had he been paid his supplement. At the trial yesterday, before Mr. Justice Hensley, it was held that the regularity of the school meeting could not be impeached before any court; and that the school trustees, having entered into the agreement, and the teacher having performed his part, they were bound to pay the supplement. The jury, under direction of the court, without retiring, found a verdict for the plaintiff for \$100. Hodgson, Q. C., for plaintiff; Peters and Morson for defendant. Court adjourned until the 11th February.
