### President Of Y. P. C.'s Is Guest Speaker At S' Side

Impressions as a young, newly elected Member of Parliament were interestingly told last evening by Douglas Jung, re-nominated Conservative candidate for Vancouver Center, speaking to a public meeting of approximately 300 persons in Kensington High School auditorium.

His election last June was unique in Canadian history because he became the first Canadian of Chinese origin to be elected to the House of Commons.

In that election he defeated Mr. Campney, a cabinet minister in the St. Laurent Government. Mr. Jung, a member of the legal profession, described the development of his interest in politics and his observations of government while a member of the last Parliament.

He urged young men and women to take a greater interest in the affairs of Canada, and cited the increased participation in the Young Progressive Conservative Association across Canada.

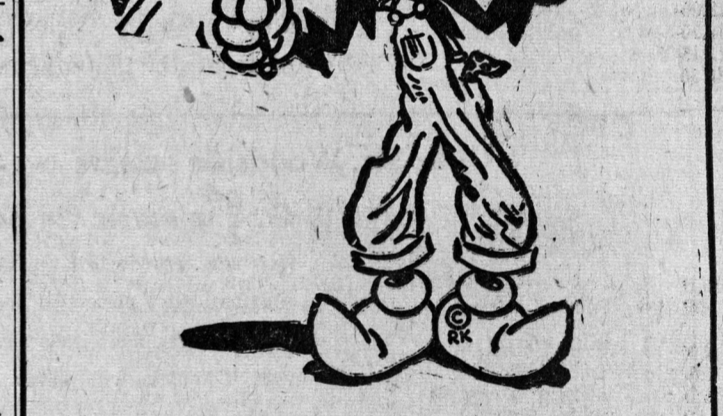

Scald 3/4 c. milk, 1/2 c. granulated sugar, 1 1/2 tps. salt and 1/4 c. shortening; cool to lukewarm. Meantime, measure into a large bowl 1/2 c. lukewarm water; crumble and add 1 cake Best Yeast—or stir in 1 tsp. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 1 envelope Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. Add cooled milk mixture and stir in 1 well-beaten egg and 1 tsp. grated lemon rind. Stir in 2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour; beat until smooth. Work in 2 c. (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on lightly-floured board until smooth and elastic.

Place in greased bowl and grease top of dough. Cover and set in warm place, free from draft. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch down dough and roll out into an oblong about 9" wide and 24" long; loosen dough. Combine 1/2 c. lightly-packed brown sugar and 1/2 c. liquid honey; spread over dough and sprinkle with 3/4 c. broken walnuts. Beginning at a long side, loosely roll up like a jelly roll. Lift carefully into a greased 8 1/2" tube pan and join ends of dough to form a ring. Brush top with melted butter. Cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 45-50 minutes. Brush top with honey and sprinkle with chopped walnuts.
