

Saints And Nomads Win Saturday Hoop Games

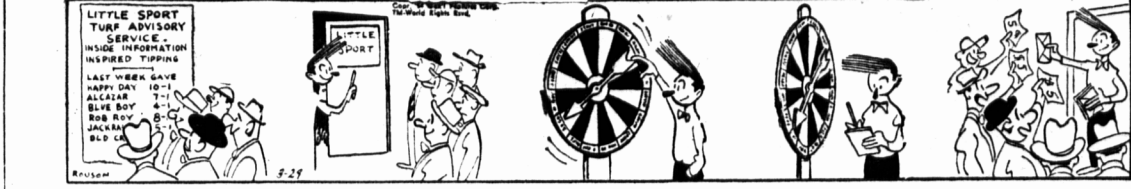
The Nomads led all the way in their game against the Welshmen. They were ahead 22-11 at half time and outscored their opponents by one point 24-23 in the last half.

City Baseball Star Leaves Today For Dodgers Camp At Vero Beach, Florida

Outfielder Brian Lewis (right), who signed a Brooklyn Dodgers baseball contract last fall, will leave here this morning for Vero Beach, Florida to join the Brooklyn Spring training camp.

The young baseball player, the first Island born boy ever to sign with a Major League organization, will report to the camp in fine physical condition. He has been doing road work and holding inside workouts during the past several weeks in preparation for his chance to make good with the Brooklyn organization.

The fleet-footed flycatcher, whose constant practice and ardent desire along with his natural ability, earned him a Brooklyn contract last fall, will unpack his glove at Vero Beach with a burning ambition to impress the Dodger brass.

Young Lewis stated last night on the eve of his departure that he expected plenty of hard work during the weeks ahead at Vero Beach. He knew, he stated, there would be plenty of good players looking for positions in the Dodgers chain and that he would be hustling every second to make the grade.

Brian signed a Brooklyn contract last fall following a very successful season in local baseball circles. Upon completion of the N.B.-P.E.I. Junior playdowns he was recommended to the Dodgers by Bill O'Connor and Johnny Carroll and several weeks later was presented with a Brooklyn contract.

He had been watched closely by Brooklyn representatives throughout the summer and as early as July, Bill O'Connor told a Nova Scotia newspaper that he had a fine big league prospect in Charlottetown in the person of Lewis.

The outfielder's hard hitting in the play-offs evidently clinched the case in his favor. During the Island League play-offs he belted the ball at a 466 clip and many of his hits were extra base blows.

When the Curran and Briggs Juniors went into the N.B.-P.E.I. Junior playdowns against Lewisville they summoned Lewis to help them. He continued his fine play in this series and also in the Maritime Intermediate play-offs against the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick champions.

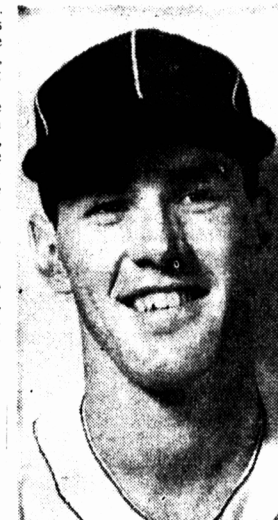
Brian's contract calls for him to play with Shawnee in the Oklahoma State League this season. The coach at Shawnee will be Jack Banta, an ex-Brooklyn pitcher.

Banta, who is only 28 years of age, may be a playing coach at Shawnee. He has had arm trouble for the past year but hopes to return to the game in an active capacity this season.

Lewis expects to get plenty of help at the Dodgers training camp from ex-Major Leaguer Tommy Holmes. The former Boston Braves and Brooklyn outfielder is batting instructor at Vero Beach.

A few weeks ago Brian received a fine letter from Billy Harris, the New Brunswick sensation who has been doing well in the Dodger chain. Harris warned Lewis to keep his neck and arms well covered during the opening days at the training camp otherwise he would suffer severe sunburns.

Lewis will be joined today at either Sackville or Moncton by Keith Bourgeois who played with Lewisville last year. Bourgeois is a young third baseman who also



signed a Brooklyn contract and is on his way to Vero Beach. They will meet Brooklyn scout Bill O'Connor in Saint John this evening.

Lewis, who was 21 on March 12, has been playing baseball for five years. He started in junior ball with the Kingsmen and after two years with them played for a season with the Knights of Columbus Juniors in 1951-52. He played with the Abbots and last season with Maritime Central Airways.

In addition to Lewis and Bourgeois there is another young Canadian ticketed for Shawnee. He is George Arlien of London, Ontario. Arlien is an infielder.

Sport fans will join with the Guardian Sport Department in wishing Brian every success in his bid to make the grade in professional baseball. The same wishes will be extended to Keith Bourgeois, the third baseman who hails from Springfield and George Arlien, the infielder from Ontario.

Brian is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Lewis, Bayfield Street.

The playing of a National Hockey League club certainly demonstrated what a vast difference there is between the type of hockey played in the M. H. L. and that played in the N. H. L. and why it is so difficult for a player to make the big time.

It was a treat to watch the smooth team work of the Rangers; every player seemed to be in the right place when a pass was directed towards him. This became even more apparent when they decided to put on a gangling attack inside their opponent's blue line. It appeared as if they could control the puck indefinitely had they so desired.

Johnny Bower in the Ranger net left no doubt in the minds of the fans as to why he is being considered for the rookie of the year award along with little Comille Henry who, by the way, met one of his old teammates, Guy Gignac who played with him as a junior on the Quebec Citadelles. Veteran forward Pete Wywrot did the hat trick for Halifax. He fired their first three goals, two in the first period and one in the second. He scored first at 8:41 on a pass from Billy Ford, and again at 14:10 assisted by defenceman Dugger McNeil.

Ray Lacroix and Dunc McIntyre tallied for Sydney in the second. Wywrot scored his third after his linemen, Ford and Johnny Morrow, set him up.

Jackie Hollett got Atlantics' insurance marker in the third, and Bob Bowness finished up the scoring at 17:00.

Play Two Title Games Tonight At The Forum

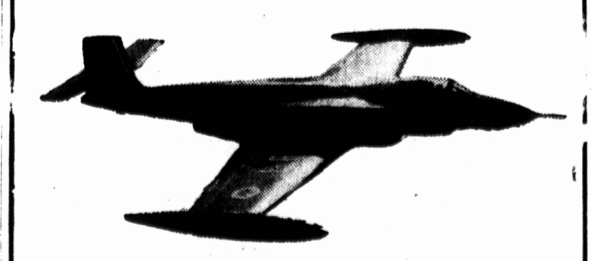
This evening at the Forum, two more provincial hockey titles will be decided and the Enman and Garnum trophies, emblematic of same, will be awarded.
