THE WORLD OF LABOR

ECHOES FROM THE BUSY MILL AND THE WORKSHOP.

News and Happenings of Special Interest in the Various Fields Where Aesthetic and Artistic Hand may be Employed.

The electric bicycle goes. New York has 7,500 saloons. The glass brick gains favor. Lord Bute has a \$3,000,000 house. Tacoma ships strawberries to Alaska.

"Wood pulp cotton" gives satisfaction. California plow weighs 35,000 pounds. The world has \$2,000,000,000 cotton spindles. Niagara Falls is to have an aerial railway.

Great telegraphic cables cost \$1,000 per mile. London cable-makers average 25 per cent. interest on the money borrowed. Charlottetown, Mo., has a breed of chickens, the eggs of which sell for \$3 a dozen.

Mail bags can now be taken on and delivered from trains running at sixty miles an hour. In the United Territory only 175 persons are engaged in manufacturing, their annual output being \$48,922.

The expense of a round trip of a steamer like the Louis averages between \$60,000 and \$70,000, according to the season. A Boist of Mayenne, France, has offered a prize of 500 francs to anyone who can produce a plant on which blueberries will bloom.

The value of foreign timber imported into England annually is not less than \$25,000,000. To export 100 tons of paper manufactured from wood pulp. Under Glasgow harbor a tunnel has just been completed and will be opened in a month, and will become the Clyde. It is 16 feet in diameter and 700 feet long, and is taken five years to build.

A railroad train was recently stopped near Kilmarnock, Fla., by the number of set rails that fell on the railway. The rails grew too rusty and slippery for the wheels, and the engine and cars were thrown on their sides.

The big best sugar factory at Chino, San Bernardino County, California, will use one this season 100,000 tons of fuel oil. The fuel oil is the fuel problem and assures a cheaper production of sugar.

When a ship has a speed of 60 miles an hour, the boat will be 500 feet long and 50 feet wide, with a flat bottom and wedge-shaped ends, and a power of 10,000 horse power, and will carry 10,000 tons of cargo, and will be made of steel, each making 17 revolutions a minute.

The more one studies this question, the more one becomes convinced that cycling's age of steel is passing away, to be succeeded in the future by one of wood, completing the cycle of its evolution by returning, after many years, to the original type of its birth, the wooden one.—Wheel.

Electric cars have been prohibited on the road from Boston to Charlestown. They would have passed by the Imperial Technical Institute, and experiments showed that the current for the propulsion of electric cars is not applicable in the building so as to make delicate scientific observations and experiments impossible.

As a result of the demand for platinum in electrical industries the Russian mines are now exporting about 7,200 pounds a year. The mines in the Ural district of Russia, which have worked as long as Russia could produce platinum as money, but when the coinage was discontinued the price of platinum fell, and the mines were not opened again until recently.

Traveler's Mainey says that a surprising number of the "abandoned farms" of the State have been recently occupied, and that the new tenants appear not to be mere casual residents, who have occupied the places as a tramp might put up with in an empty house, but industrious farmers, who are brightening up the old farms in a manner that indicates they have come there to stay.

Among the latest inventions which Yankee genius has given the world is a door-lock which renders a lathe key perfectly useless by retaining the knob in the same manner as a safe-lock, and the proper combination is secured through a door can be opened. The lock is susceptible of 100,000 combinations, and a person who knows not or has forgotten the proper combination cannot obtain admittance through that door.

A curious railway is to be constructed in Florida. It will consist of a line of vegetable and passenger traffic over the route will pay for regular steel rails. Here are some odd facts about the structure. The total number of separate pieces of steel in the main structure of the ship is not less than 40,000, and the total number of cubic feet of timber used in the construction is more than 100,000. The total number of rivets is 240,000. Another expert has estimated that if the ship were made of steel, it would require a force of 17,000 men continuously at work to develop the same power that the engine of this ship will produce.—St. Louis Republic.

PARTICULARLY FOR WOMEN.

Valuable Suggestions on the Care of the Skin.

It is not the good fortune of every woman to be endowed by nature with well-shaped hands, but every woman, even though her hands are not beautiful in shape or dainty in size, can do much to make them look well. Well kept hands add greatly to any woman's appearance, and quite as much attention should be paid to them as to any other part of the person. However well a woman is dressed, if her hands are neglected and ill-kept they detract a great deal from her appearance.

Hot Water Damages the Skin.
Never use very hot water when washing the hands, as it tends to make the skin too tender and sensitive. Lemon will remove most stains from the nails and skin, and then glycerine and some other emollient applied before retiring. Loose, perforated gloves, should, under these circumstances, be worn at night.

ROUGH AND REDDISH.
Rough, red arms are a source of much annoyance to many women, especially to those who are given to wearing short sleeves; they should be washed every night in very hot water, and scrubbed vigorously until quite red with a coarse Turkish towel. Before drying, rub in a little lemon juice mixed with an equal amount of fine water.

Boasting Hard Skin.
Hard skin, which forms around the ball of the fingers of those who spend the summer in boating can be kept down by softening the cuticle every night with hot water, and rubbing it with pumice stone.

Wear Gloves Around the House.
Gloves should be worn when engaged in any household work which might injure the hands. Dusting and sweeping are especially bad, as the pores become filled up and constant washing increases redness.

The Morning Bath.
In bathing cold water should be used for a morning sponge, if one can stand it; otherwise use tepid, and gradually accustom one's self to the colder.

Blue Hands and Red Circulation.
When the hands look blue it may be attributed to bad circulation. This may be remedied by regular, good, plain, nourishing food of a rather fatty nature. Oil and liver oil, especially, should be taken.

To Soften the Toilet Water.
Oatmeal and bran are often used to soften water, and the best way to do this is to throw in a piece of cheese cloth bag and allow these to remain in water for a few hours. Boiling hard water will also do much to soften it, unless salts are present.

Boiled Bath Water.
One of the most important agents in keeping the hands soft and nice is to have soft bath water in which to bathe them. This is most pleasant to us when it has been boiled for a quarter of an hour and allowed to stand undisturbed for a while.
