WILLIAM W. SANDERSON
The people of Church Road and surrounding communities were shocked to hear of the sudden and unexpected passing of William W. Sanderson on April 10, 1955, in his 79th year.

Although not enjoying best of health for the last couple of weeks, having gone down to the pasture to bring home the cattle for the evening; later when he did not return, his son went looking for him. It was found that he had succumbed to a heart attack.

The late Mr. Sanderson was born in Church Road. As a young man he left for United States, where he lived for a few years; later he returned and took up farming on the church road, and became known as a very successful farmer and obliging neighbour.

A short service was held at his late residence on Sunday, April 10th, and at the Marie United Church. The funeral services at the home and church were conducted by his minister, Rev. R. A. MacLeod.

Mr. MacLeod gave a message of hope and comfort to those so sorely and saddened bereaved; the hymns sung: "Safe In The Arms of Jesus" and "Sweet Bye and Bye"; also a choir selection, "The Hugged Cross."

The flowers that banked the casket, and the very large congregation which packed the church, were a tribute of respect to this late friend, comfort to the sorrowing relatives.

He leaves to mourn his widow the former Adella Sanderson. The following sons and daughters: two sons predeceased him, one serving in World War II; Lloyd, North Marshfield, Mass.; Herbert, Ottawa, Port Arthur, Ont.; Ira, Charlottetown; Leith, Hamilton, Sherman and Sheldon at home.

He is also survived by one niece, Mrs. Hans Jorgenson, North Marshfield, Mass., and twenty-one grandchildren.

Interment took place in Marie Cemetery.

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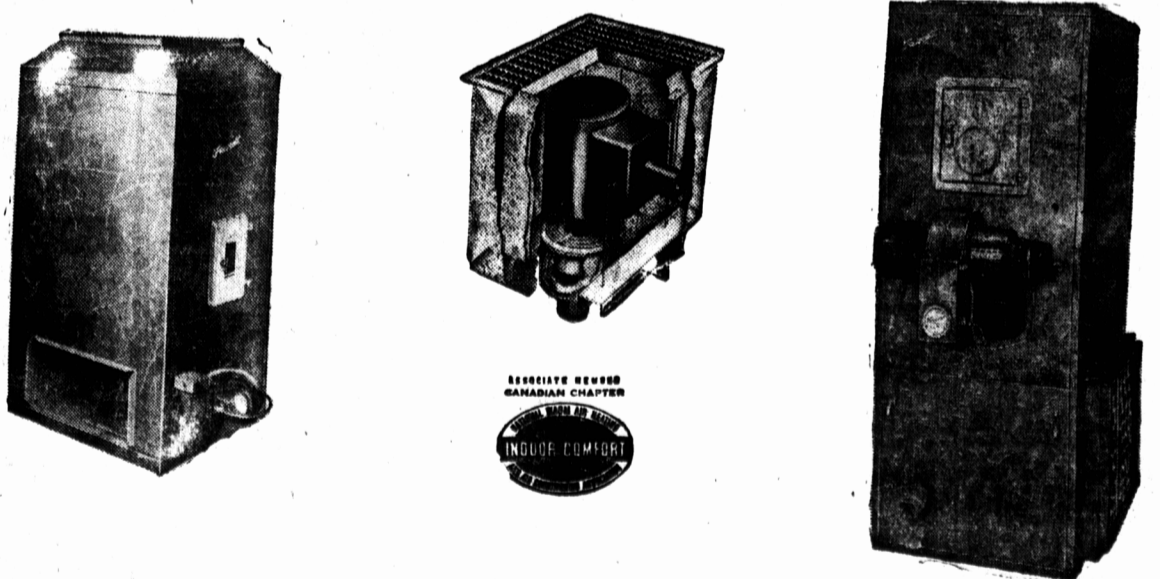
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
