

Island Rink Loses Opening Match In Schoolboy Curling

SASKATOON, (CP)—Saskatchewan, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario and Alberta scored victories in the opening round of the Canadian School Curling Championships Monday.

The highlight of the first draw was an extra-end win for the defending province, represented by the Regina Scott Collegiate rink, skipped by Dennis Cochrane.

The Saskatchewan boys scored two on the 10th to force an extra end against Northern Ontario and then skip Cochrane made a beautiful shot on the 11th for victory. The final score was 9-7.

In the most lopsided game Ontario ran away from British Columbia 19-9 after the West Coast rink had led 4-1 at the end of the second end.

Other matches saw Nova Scotia defeat Manitoba 12-8, New Brunswick defeat Quebec 9-7 and Alberta score an 11-7 victory over Prince Edward Island.

The Quebec-New Brunswick game was a close one with the Saint John curlers protecting a one-

point lead, coming home to finish with a 9-7 victory.

Two fours in a row, on the sixth and seventh ends, broke up a close battle and sent Nova Scotia's rink, skipped by Fred Stephens of Sydney, on the way to victory. The Manitobans never recovered from those two big ends.

A big four count on the third end by Barry Coleman and his Alberta champions from Vulcan was the telling point as they defeated Prince Edward Island 11-7.

The Islanders, under the skipping of Barry Macdonald, came back strongly but could never catch their western opponents.

Russ Meyer Traded To Dodgers After 3 Swaps

NEW YORK, (AP)—Hot-headed Russ Meyer, who won 13 games for Philadelphia last year, was traded to Brooklyn Monday as a series of three swaps involving four clubs scrambled player-talent in half the National League.

Brooklyn, Boston and Philadelphia were the principals in a fast-moving game of "who owns Russ Meyer?" with Cincinnati later joining the party.

At one stage the Dodgers had announced a trade with Boston for Meyer while, as far as everybody knew, Meyer still belonged to the Phillies.

The cleared it up eventually with separate announcements from the four clubs.

Here are the developments:

1. Brooklyn gets Meyer.
2. Philadelphia gets first baseman Earl Torgerson.
3. Boston gets Jim Pendleton and cash.
4. Cincinnati gets infielder Rocky Bridges and a Boston player to be announced later.

Here's the way the deal broke:

1. Brooklyn announced it had traded Bridges and Pendleton to Boston for Meyer.
2. Philadelphia announced it had traded Meyer and "some cash" to Boston for Torgerson.
3. Boston announced it had traded Bridges and a player to be announced later to Cincinnati for Adcock.

"I wonder what happened to that guy who said he would take care of Reardon tonight," cracked a member of the Mount Allison University hockey team in Charlottetown two weeks ago after he had heard that the S.D.U. hoop squad had walloped Mount A. 104-66 at Sackville. The remark was passed off with a hearty laugh by the remainder of the Mount Allison hockey players for they too had heard about the scoring feats of the Saints Jack Reardon and they had likely heard about the plans of their College basketball team to keep Reardon under control. They also knew when they heard the Saints had scored 104 points that Reardon wasn't hampered too much. As it turned out the big S.D.U. centreman scored 37 points.

Such remarks as the one made above by the Mount Allison hockey player are made in tribute to Reardon's great basketball ability. Possibly no other player in the Maritimes ever shot with the same ability and deadliness possessed by the Augusta, Maine born Jack Reardon. Certainly no other player ever scored with such consistency. In the last five games that the Saints have played Reardon has scored 35, 37, 18, 53 and 42 points respectively. The third game in which he scored 18 points was played the night after the Saints had defeated Mount A. at Sackville. The players had not returned from the trip until 3:30 on Saturday morning and they had little chance to rest for the game that night. Reardon was far off his usual form but for anyone else under any conditions 18 points would be considered an excellent night's work.

Agreement On Olson-Turpin Fight In London

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Sid Flaherty, manager of Carl Bobo Olson, San Francisco middleweight, announced Saturday he has agreed to an Olson-Randy Turpin fight in London June 9.

Flaherty said the fight will be in London's White City Stadium for the 160-pound title left vacant by the retirement of Sugar Ray Robinson.

Turpin is former middleweight champion.

Flaherty said he accepted terms for the match offered by Jack Solomons, British promoter, who was in New York Friday.

Solomons telephoned Flaherty he anticipated little or no difficulty in getting Turpin's agreement on the terms offered.

Such a fight would crown with success Flaherty's one-man revolt against the International Boxing Club and the New York boxing commissioner, Robert Christenberry, who have sought to have Olson compete in their elimination tournament to determine a successor to Robinson.

British Boxers Fail To Get Bouts In United States

NEW YORK, (AP)—British boxing promoter Jack Solomons said he has asked the British consul general to "make an inquiry" as to why two British boxers couldn't get fights here.

Solomons referred to John L. Sullivan, a 20-year-old British middleweight, and Duggie Miller, a South African welterweight who has returned to London. Sullivan has had three fights in Toronto.

"I asked Sir Henry Hobson, consul-general, to make an inquiry into why they can't get fights here," Solomons told several fight figures and newspaper men at an informal luncheon discussion. Solomons said he didn't have any connection with the two boxers but was interested "because we treat American boxers and entertainers very well in England."

The promoter said "certain forces" were preventing the two from getting work here and indicated it was the International Boxing Guild, an organization of leading managers.

This was denied by manager Hymie Wallman, an influential member of the I.B.G. who was lunching with Solomons.

Billy Brown, matchmaker for the International Boxing Club, said he had offered to match Sullivan with 21-year-old Willie Troy, an undefeated middleweight, in a main event here but had been turned down by Sullivan's advisers, Jersey Jones handled both Sullivan and Miller for British manager George Dingley.

Jones said Sullivan was just coming along and wasn't ready for Troy. Jones said the I.B.G. blocked a Johnny Saxton-Miller match before the South African went back to London.

Miller is scheduled to fight Randy Turpin, former world middleweight champion, in England next week.

Miller had five fights in the U.S. between Dec. 5, 1951 and Sept. 5, 1952, including two semi-finals in Madison Square Garden. He won three and lost two. Jones said Miller was out 2½ months with a bad back and several weeks with a torn ear, suffered in a technical knock-out loss to Jesse Turner.

Sullivan has had five fights from Nov. 17 through Dec. 29 of last year.

Wallman told Solomons the fighters had "nothing to beef about."

Islanders Lose 2-1 Overtime Decision To Sydney Millionaires

Johnny Horeck's Sydney Millionaires grabbed off their first victory on Charlottetown ice this season when they squeezed out a close 2-1 overtime victory over Murphy Chamberlain's Islanders at the Forum last night before a meager crowd of some 800 cash customers.

Defenceman Don "Whip" Whalen slid the winning tally into the open net at 4:55 of the overtime on a three-way attack with Ronnie Rowe and George Robertson.

Playing scoreless in a somewhat ragged first period, Sydney held a 1-0 margin at the end of the second on a goal by Ronnie Rowe at 12:05 with assists from Fred Hildebrand and Robertson. Ted Powney put the Islanders on even terms with the Moneymen with the only goal of the third period at 8:28 from Wiseman and Gustavson.

Although the game pepped up considerably from the second frame on, both teams played it close to the vest all the way with close checking being the preference over the usual wide open, passing game usually seen when these two clubs meet.

There were only five penalties handed out by referees Mathieu and Perry during the contest, with three going to Sydney and two to the Islanders. Neither team was able to capitalize while having the on-advantage.

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
