

City Hopeful Of Winter Work Plan

Hopes that the City may be able to participate of the Federal-Provincial winter works program were expressed yesterday by J.E. Arsenault, chairman of the sewer and water committee of the City Council.

At the present time the Council is awaiting a package tender from the firm of W.H. Crandall in Moncton for the laying of an interceptor pipe at Brighton Shore from Brighton Road to Kirkwood Drive West.

Preliminary estimates of the job run around \$7,000 but it is not known what percentage of this is labor and what portion is material. These figures are expected to be ready when the Council meets on the 9th of November.

OTHER JOBS CONSIDERED Other winter work that might possibly be done by the city, includes the placing of storm sewers by the street committee and park clearing by the public property committee.

In the meantime Charlottetown's sewerage system, like the sprawling tentacles of an octopus, has spread throughout the former village of Spring Park, servicing most of the area north of Kirkwood drive between Malpeque Road and North River Road.

The new interceptor pipe will provide an outlet for the properties west of North River when the connecting outlets are hooked up. This should be completed by mid-summer or early fall, Mr. Arsenault predicted.

Further additions to the sewerage outlets of the city are nearing completion through Government Pond and past the Naval barracks.

Another very important but smaller job is the laying of a sewer line to service the houses on Park and Beach streets. This line will be connected to a CNR culvert which runs from Grafton street east in a line out to the harbor.

Previously the people of Park and Beach streets were at a lower level than the main city line and the possibility of providing sewerage for them has been a source of debate for some years. This work is expected to be completed this fall.

During the year, a half mile of sidewalks have been laid in Ward Six and a mile of streets are being made ready for paving next year.

completely any such project employing a labor force. Under the terms of the winter works program, the federal government pays 50 per cent of the costs of labor performed between December 1 and the end of April and the provincial government pays 25 per cent.

Decanal Conference Hears Discussion Of Laymen's Role

The rural Decanal Conference held in St. Paul's Parish Hall, Charlottetown on Thursday night, brought together the church warden, vestrymen, laymen and Anglican clergy of the province under the chairmanship of Rev. Eric Ingraham, rural dean of P. E. Island.

The conference was designed to develop an awareness of the part of laymen in respect to their responsibilities as men of the church.

Speaking from a priest's viewpoint, Rev. Canon Malone said: "A good layman is a good churchman." Membership is composed of those who are baptised. While we may exclude ourselves as members, we are still members. There is no second baptism. All bodies have rules and regulations and members are required to observe them. There is no difference when it comes to church affairs.

"The church is generally judged by the bad members," he said. "We do not carry out this practice in the professions," he declared.

"To many, he stated," religion is a hobby that should be the most important aspect in our lives." Grace, Truth and Fellowship were described by the Canon as the three treasures. "We as humans need Fellowship," and went on to stress the importance of prayer and public worship.

"The church requires of the clergy personal conviction, belief in the doctrines of the church, obedience and witness. The pastor requires of the laymen, dependability, willingness, educated laymen and wise advice," he said.

"The laymen of the Church should be more active in the service of Jesus Christ," Dr. G. C. Fisher said. "Those who try to run away from life and those who run with the tide, miss life's objective in facing life, which produces a fuller life, a life with many rewards and the knowledge that they are contributing to the happiness of their fellow men."
