Board Suggests Cartier Pageant

ALBERTON — Suggestions for centennial celebrations were discussed at the regular meeting of Alberton and West Prince Board of Trade last night. These included a pageant depicting the landing in West Prince of Jacques Cartier in 1534, a baroque band concert and dance at or near Jacques Cartier Park, and a play on ground or rink at a permanent memorial of the centennial year.

Cyril Leard, a member of the provincial centennial committee, will present these and other suggestions at a community meeting in Charlottetown tonight.

A proposal for a second highway to West Prince via Free-land, Foxley River and Casumpec has received the support of the Summerside Board of Trade and plans were made to have a delegation meet the minister of highways at a later date in connection with the project.

A letter from the CN Railway advised the board that a flashing light warning signals and a bell will be placed at the railway crossings at Elmdale and St. Louis. More adequate and satisfactory highway direction signs are to be requested as it was thought that many roads are not marked or signs are poorly located in some cases. A dayliner serving the area in the summer was discussed. This is to be taken up with the director of transportation for information. The meeting in Alberton library, was chaired by the president, Frank Bryan.

Island - Born Doctor Awarded Fellowship In Royal College

Dr. W.B. Stewart of 165 Hedgewood Drive, Moncton, an associate radiologist of the X-ray Department of the Moncton Hospital has received the news that he has been successful in the examinations for fellowship to be the first Diagnostic Radiologist in the Atlantic Provinces to receive this honour.

Dr. Stewart was born in Norborne, Prince Edward Island and received his early education at Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown. Following five years service in the Armed Forces he completed his medical training at Dalhousie University graduating in 1952. He established practice in Salisbury, N. B., for the next five years and in 1957 began post-graduate training at Victoria General Hospital, Halifax and Dalhousie University. In 1960 he continued his post-graduate education at Harvard University and the Children's Medical Health Centre and the Peter Bent Brigham

Hospital in Boston. In July, 1961 he returned to Moncton. Dr. Stewart received his certification in Diagnostic Radiology in 1961.

Dr. Stewart is married to Jean Mutari, formerly of Carleton, P.E.I. They have four children.
