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Star's Pride Captures Cup

GOSHEN, N. Y., July 5—(AP)—Star's Pride won the \$10,000 Historic Dickerson Cup today in two straight heats at Historic Track to establish himself the top favorite for the Hambletonian trotting classic Aug. 9.

The three-year-old brown son of Worthy Boy-Stradford, owned jointly by L. B. Sheppard of Hanover, Pa., and E. R. Harriman of Goshen, equalled the track record of 2:05 for the mile in the final heat.

In the process, Star's Pride whipped Lusty Song and Florian, the No. 1 and 2 winter book favorites for the Hambletonian to be raced at nearby Good Time Park.

Demon Hanover won this race in 1948 and went on to capture the Hambletonian.

Johnny Simpson, from Chester, S.C., one of the leading drivers on the Grand Circuit, whipped Star's Pride under the wire by about half a length margin over Lusty Song in the deciding second heat, which was raced in a light shower.

This was the first victory of the year for Star's Pride after finishing second three times. It also was the first meeting this year between Star's Pride, Lusty Song and Florian, who battled for two-year-old supremacy in 1949.

Lusty Song is owned by the Hayes Fair Acres stable of Duquoin, Ill., while Florian is from Harriman's Arden Homestead stable.

Eight colts contended in the two-heat affair, seven of them eligible for the Hambletonian, harness racing's Kentucky Derby.

Chet-Lynn Lad, only non-Hambletonian horse, was third in the second heat while Florian was fourth.

Budge Patty And Frank Sedgman In Tennis Finals

(By The Associated Press)
WIMBLEDON, England, July 5—Budge Patty and never-said Frank Sedgman won the men's singles semi-finals in the all-England lawn tennis tournament today before a wildly clapping centre-court crowd of 15,000.

Both played brilliantly but Sedgman's hectic five-set duel with Jaroslav Drobný stood head and shoulders above Patty's always certain triumph over fellow American Vic Seixas.

For the second straight day the 22-year-old top-seeded Sedgman got up off the floor after he didn't seem to have even a prayer left. He lost the first two sets in short order to the self-exiled Czech. But this young Australian never quit and at the end of almost three nerve-racking hours he came out on top, 3-6, 3-6, 6-3, 7-5, 6-2.

Sedgman and Patty, a native of Los Angeles who now lives in Paris, will meet in the best-of-five set final Friday afternoon for the most coveted title in world tennis.

Rain Stops Races At Montague After Single Heat In Each Class

Although called off after four complete heats had been run, some very keen and exciting racing was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators at the Montague Raceway in their opening program of the season yesterday afternoon.

The 12-heat program was rained out after the first heat in each of the four classified events had been completed, as the result of a freak cloudburst that was centered over that area that hadn't even affected areas within five and six miles of Montague.

But while the racing lasted, it was a stellar program that saw every heat a close battle from start to finish.

In the opening heat of the day, Tiny Budlong trotted the fastest mile of the day in winning the event with a mark of 2:14 over a strong seven-horse field. Tiny went out in front at the first turn and although challenged by both Prince Budlong and Dale B., was never headed over the full course.

Feather Duster was a close winner over Lusticia in the No. 2 classified trot. Taking the lead early in the race and being forced closely by Lusticia and Prince Marine, it was a tight race all the way, with Lusticia making a strong drive around the upper turn to come close to nipping the winner at the wire. Bonnie Dale also came down the stretch hard for a narrow third place.

In the No. 3 classified, it was a terrific drive from the backstretch on the second trip round that brought Valley Long in a winner in a regular blanket finish. Leia Budlong was the top entry over nearly the complete course with Dorothy Won't Tell and Valley Long next, followed by the rest of the field closely. But the trailing horses made their drives in the backstretch with Valley Long and O. U. Volo making it a real race at the finish, with the former topping out Leia on the stretch and O. U. finishing a close third that called for a photo finish.

In what turned out to be the last heat of the day, Lily Marlene took top honors in the No. 4 classified event with a driving finish from back in fifth horse position

to nose out a really closely packed 10-horse field. Putting on powerful drives from well back, Bell Budlong and Direct Volo topped off the second and third place honors in a finish that was the prettiest and most exciting of the meet.

Isner Edges Dowling For N.B.-P.E.I. Golf Title In Close Contest

MONCTON, July 5—(CP)—Golf history was repeated here today when B. W. (Ben) Isner, Moncton, Golf and Country Club, won the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island golf tournament for the first time.

Isner tonight outstroked M. J. (Mousie) Dowling of Charlottetown in a three hole playoff for the championship after the pair had tied with strong 229's in the tournament's regular 54 holes of play.

In adding the N. B. - P. E. I. crown to his list of laurels which includes the 1949 Maritime championship, Isner won tonight's championship in the same manner that he took the tri-province crown a year ago—by defeating Dowling in a three hole playoff.

Dowling who came behind a four way tie for second place in Monday's opening round to dead-lock Eugene Mealey of Westfield Country Club for first position yesterday, almost had the title stacked away going into the 54th hole, but landed in a sand trap to the left of the 18th green, and needed an extra stroke to hole out, allowing Isner to tie him.

In a dramatic downturn that left only the rain soaked player's and their caddies on the fairways despite sudden interest by a previously quiet gallery, Isner won the title on the 55th hole. He took a four to Dowling's five and they halved the next two.

Three other N. B.-P. E. I. titles were held by new champions tonight. Don Sinclair, Riverside Golf and Country Club, picked up the professional and open crown by a single stroke to tie him.

It was much better than the 54 hole totals of Isner and Dowling, and also one ahead of his nearest professional competitor, Wilf MacPherson of Moncton Golf and Country Club.

L. F. Rushton, Moncton Golf and Country Club, won the seniors title vacated by R. C. McInerney of Riverside Golf and Country Club by scoring a 260, also good enough to give him the third division title.

Thane Cody, young Riverside Golf and Country Club player, successfully defended the N. B.-P. E. I. Association's junior title by scoring a sparkling 236 for a strong position in the first division lineup. Cody will represent the

SYDNEY, N. S., July 5—(CP)—Rohan C. Duchemin of Sydney stroking a one over par 73, moved into a first place tie with Bud Carter of Dartmouth in the second day of the Nova Scotia golf championship tournament at the nearby Lingan course today.
