There were 30 persons participating in the week-long course following the general pattern of morning and afternoon lectures followed by laboratory sessions.

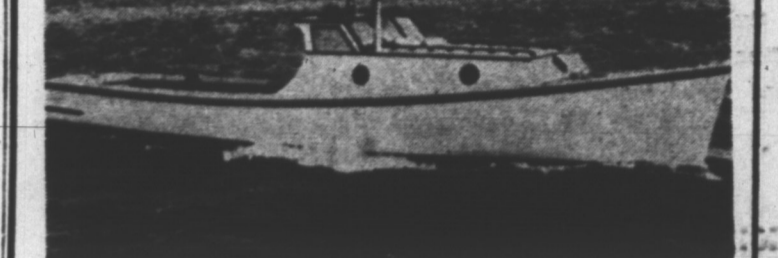

## Liberal Poster Said, 'A Mass Of Untruths'

Statements contained in a Liberal poster being distributed throughout the province were "a mass of untruths unworthy of any party that has any regard for honesty and integrity," Progressive Conservative party leader W.R. Shaw, said in Craupaud last night.

Mr. Shaw denied all allegations made in the poster entitled "These are the Facts."

He said that at no time did he indicate that Ottawa would be asked to finance the payment of teachers' supplements. He denied that the federal government had at any time indicated that it could not afford to give any money to the provinces. The statement that his party had ever made any commitments regarding the imposition of a sales tax for any purpose Mr. Shaw branded as "a deliberate untruth."

**FABRICATIONS**  
The entire sheet is a mass of fabrications from beginning to end," Mr. Shaw said.

Other speakers at the enthusiastic, over-flowing meeting included Frank Myers, Conservative candidate in 1st Queens and Heath Macquarrie, M.P. for Queens. The meeting was chaired by Toff Beaton, New Haven, and the entertainment was provided by the Burke family of Charlottetown.

Mr. Shaw said that he was amazed that the Liberal party of Prince Edward Island had descended to such contemptible tactics in order to deceive the electorate. "Surely the issues in this campaign can be debated in an atmosphere of truth and decency," he said.

**TOURIST CENTRE**  
The PC leader promised the people of Victoria that a Conservative government would build their causeway and tourist promotion centre.

Recalling that Mr. Matheson in a recent TV broadcast had boasted that there was no one in the Province his superior, Mr. Shaw said that he had no intention of taking part in that type of contest. Rather he was willing to let the people decide on September 1.

Mr. Myers said he had observed construction stakes being driven in the French River area. He said that he asked the crew when the pavement would be laid and the foreman replied, "Well, next year maybe." The same thing was happening at both Desable and Argyle Shore, he said.

Why all this frantic road-building on the eve of an election, Mr. Myers inquired. "If they were anxious to do the job they had 24 years in which to do it. Surely they know that the island people can see through this hypocrisy."

Mr. Myers recalled that the PC leader Walter Shaw had been instrumental in getting the potato tariff equalized.

In referring to hospitalization insurance Mr. Myers stated that during the last session of the House, S. S. Hessian, the Liberal member from Georgetown had said that under no circumstances could he support a compulsory plan. With this all Liberal representatives in the House agreed, Mr. Myers noted.

The hospital insurance action of the local government Mr. Myers compared to the Howes-sponsored pipeline issue which led to the destruction of the federal Liberal party on June 10, 1957.

"At that time C. D. Howe said with complete arrogance, if we don't want to do it, who is going to make us?" Mr. Myers said. Because of the Conservative telecast that came on at 10 o'clock Mr. Macquarrie cut his remarks short.

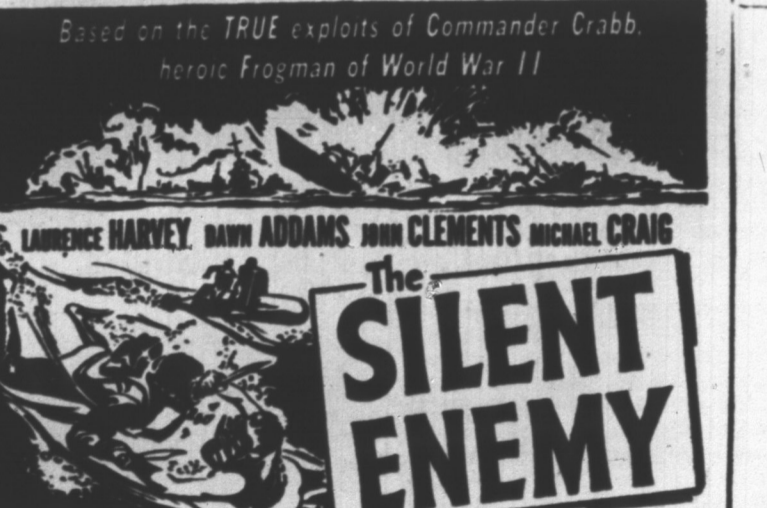

## Blood Clinics Miss Objectives But Donations Are Improving

Yesterday's Red Cross blood donor clinics at Murray River and Montague concluded the third of this year's series with a total of 869 on an objective of 1,152 or a shortage of 283 on the overall expected number.

There were 79 registered at Murray River in the afternoon on a quota of 100, and 167 at Montague last evening on the objective of 239. Both these results were considerably ahead of last year's response when there were just 50 at Murray River, and 149 at Montague.
