N.S. Seeks Better Trained Teachers For High Schools

Mr. Leonard said in the throne speech debate that present weaknesses in the province's teaching system are "generally... found in the junior and senior high school grades."

We Are Missing Educational Deadlines Says Principal

"Failure rates are increasing year by year in Canada," Dr. Frank MacKinnon told the Prince Street Home and School Association, Thursday night. "And we are finding out that the level of achievement in high school work is now several years behind that of other countries. One of the reasons is, I think, that we are neglecting what might be called 'educational deadlines.'"

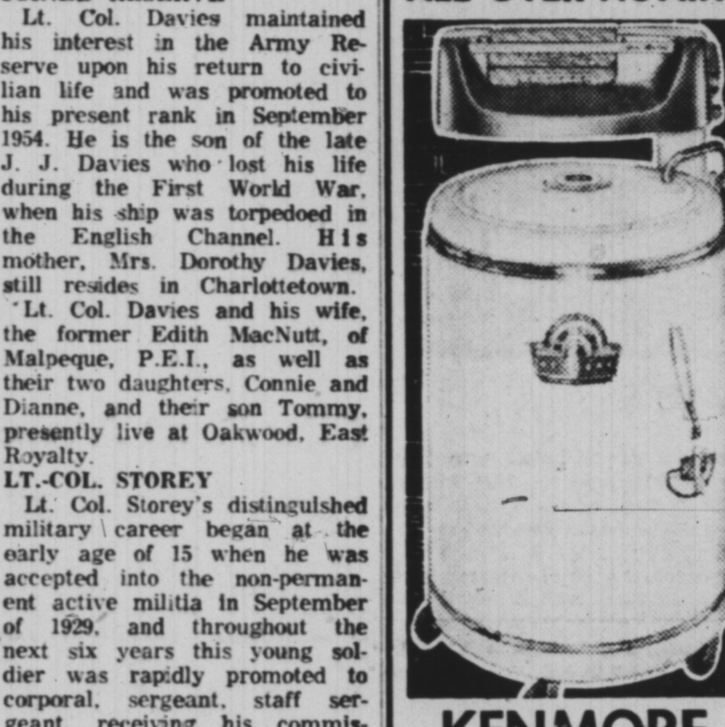
