GENERAL BUTLER'S income from fees alone is between \$150,000 and \$200,000 a year. Some time ago he received a retainer of \$100,000 in one case. His liberality is great, and his brother lawyers in Boston say that he does a larger gratuitous practice than any other man in America. He never charges a cent for obtaining a pension, and pays all the incidental fees. His subordinates know that they would be instantly discharged if he discovered that they had ever charged a pensioner a fee. He often takes a trip to Washington purposely to hurry up some poor widow's pension.

SIR JOHN LUBBUCK'S review, at York, of the progress of physical science during the last fifty years was one of the most remarkable and interesting which any president of the British Association has delivered for many years. The jubilee of the foundation of the association was a very fitting occasion for such a review, and Sir John Lubbeck's very catholic interest in all branches of science made him just the man to make it effective. There is no dryness in Sir John Lubbeck's address. He seizes on the picturesque side of all the phenomena he describes, and links in, intellectual marvel to intellectual marvel, till the chain becomes one of almost inconceivable grandeur. In biology, in the evidence of the prehistoric ages of man, in the history of climate changes, in geology, in the study of the physical geography of the earth, in astronomy and the wonderful story of the spectroscopic science, in the explanation of the coloring of the ether and the clouds, and in the story of the correlation of the various physical forces, he follows the history of fifty years' discovery with just enough minuteness to give it interest, and enough generalization and rapidity to warn us of its wonderful rate of progress.

DR. BRADLEY is Dean of Westminster. We do not ask, as an inquisitive paper once did on the morrow of an unexpected choice of a Presidential candidate, "Who is Franklin Pierce?" for Dr. Bradley's name is too well known to all who are interested in the academic success. But we may ask why is Dr. Bradley Dean of Westminster? Daily omniscience has told us that there is to be no breach of continuity between him and Dr. Stanley. This is consoling, but we should like to be quite clear as to what is to be continued. We have spoken of Dr. Stanley, and always with plainness of speech. We have admired his brilliancy, activity, learning and devotion to his view of duty, without shrinking from pointing out the perils into which his eccentricities might have led the Church and himself. Now, we should like to know whether Dr. Bradley is to continue the brilliancy or the eccentricity? On this the world is profoundly ignorant. It has a general idea that Dr. Bradley is a Broad Churchman, as Dean Stanley used also to be called. But when a man has been ticketed a Broad Churchman, with nothing added to the description, the whole definition for practical purposes, has still to be constructed.—London Saturday Review.

Sorrow with the United States.

OFFICIAL ORDER.

FLAGS AT HALF-MAST

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, Sept. 20.

The flags at the Citadel, Quebec, at Fort Henry, Kingston, and all other military posts, and also on all Government buildings and vessels will be hoisted to-day half-mast high, and be so maintained on each day from sunrise to sunset until after the funeral of the late President of the United States, General James Garfield; and it is requested by His Excellency the Governor General that the flags on all public, municipal and private buildings and on all ships be placed and maintained in like manner from sunrise to sunset during the same period, in token of the sorrow felt by Canada and its people for the calamity which has befallen the great nation with whom the Dominion is connected by so many ties of friendship and of kindred.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 20, 11.15 p. m.

The Cabinet has just arrived and gone in a body to Franklyn Cottage. All are here except Blaine and Lincoln. Attorney General McVeagh telegraphed the latter two of the President's death, and they are now on their way to Long Branch. Great excitement prevails here and particulars cannot be obtained. The guards around the cottage have been doubled and no one allowed to approach it. The Government has taken possession of the only telegraph wire which is connected at Elberon. It will be almost impossible to get further details to-night as we are shut off from all communication with the cottage and its inmates.

BOSTON, Sept. 19. Dispatches from all parts of the country show the deepest sorrow and mourning at the President's death. The bells were tolled, the buildings draped and the flags placed at half mast in this city. Crowds gathered around the newspaper offices where the bulletins were read in subdued silence, which was only broken at last by expressions of grief.

LONDON, Sept. 19. Lowell, the American Minister, has received a telegram from the Queen, expressing the grief of herself and family at the discouraging accounts regarding the President, and requesting all intelligence concerning his condition to be forwarded immediately to Balmoral.

PORT TOWNSEND, Sept. 19. The Ship "Olympus," from San Francisco to Seabeck, with a cargo of hay, oakum and oil, was burned on the 14th inst., at sea. The crew and passengers, twenty-six in all, took to the boats, and were picked up the same day by the ship "War Hawk," and taken to Port Discovery.

SARANTON, Pa., Sept. 19. A man named Lenahan with his own family and the family of a man named Harvey, while boating on Little Lake, yesterday, got drunk and capsized the boat. Lenahan's nine-year-old daughter and Wm. Harvey, aged 16, were drowned. The others were rescued.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 19. Fire in Marry County is spreading and has burned over Throckmorton ranch—16,000 acres. The flames on Sunday extended up the northern slope of Mount Tamalpais to the summit, where men are trying to prevent the fire from going down seaward. The town of Saccelito is threatened. If the fire extends over Mount Tamalpais there is nothing to stop it till the ocean is reached, a distance of fifteen miles of heavy timbered country. But few houses are destroyed so far. At the Summit station on the North Pacific Coast Railroad the flames jumped a half mile, or else the fire was started by an incendiary, and another large section is endangered; 60,000 have been burned, a large part of which was valuable timber land.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Sept. 19. The Times says:—"It will be well if the numbers of imprisoned suspects were increased by some Irish Americans who, not out of patriotism but of spite against every thing English, have been at no pains to conceal their advocacy of armed insurrection. If there are soldiers and coercion acts in Ireland, the English people deplore such means of Government; but it is the attitude of a section of the Irish people themselves under unscrupulous leaders which has rendered these things necessary."

BERLIN, Sept. 19. The statement of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows a decrease in specie of 5,300,000 marks.
