Ford Motors Gain Ground In Fight For Auto Market

DETROIT (AP) - During a recent interlude in Detroit's spectacular battle of the big wheels, the phone rang in the office of Ernest B. Breech, executive vice-president of Ford Motor Company. "Yes, Ben," Breech answered. "What? That's fine, Ben. Fine." Breech turned back to the reporter. "That was Benson Ford. He said we delivered over 10,000 Mercuries in the first 10 days of the month - 50 per cent more than you'd ordinarily expect this time of the year."

The figures assumed a new importance as seen against the background of the struggle of the giants now shaking one of the biggest, richest, most powerful American industries - the manufacture of automobiles.

Who's winning so far this fight for the auto market? INDEPENDENTS LOSING. Ford clearly has gained the most ground. Who's losing? Not General Motors. The losers have been Chrysler and the independents - Studebaker Packard, Hudson, Nash and Kaiser-Willys.

For most of 14 years - from 1938 through 1949 - General Motors, Chrysler and Ford ranked one, two and three in their share of the car market. Toward the end of that period, Ford was staggering. In 1949, when Breech was hired away from a former GM affiliate by Henry Ford II, Ford was reported losing as much as \$9,000,000 a month.

By 1951-52 Ford had elbowed Chrysler out of second place and had been widening the gap ever since. Last year sales in its three divisions gave Ford more than 25 per cent of the market. Chrysler had almost 21. This year, as indicated by five-month sales figures, Ford has 30 per cent and Chrysler 14. GM climbed from 45 to more than 49 per cent.

HOLD MOST OF MARKET. The Big Three are now slicing up about 95 per cent of all new-car sales. The independent's can't live long on the remaining five per cent, and they know it. They're trying to fight back with various tactics: mergers, Kaiser-Willys, Hudson-Nash and Studebaker-Packard, reduced production costs, increased advertising budgets and most important - what they hope will be better, more distinctive products.

When the second World War ended, the auto companies could produce enough to meet the pent-up demand. The independents prospered on the overflow from the Big Three. By 1948 their share of the market had climbed to almost 20 per cent.

By 1950, the industry as a whole was able to meet the demand and in that all-time record year turned out more than 6,658,000 cars. Then came the Korean War and production controls. Last year the controls were lifted, the industry was ready to go all out again. But now there was a difference - the customer had to be sold.

THE FORD BLITZ. Ford set out to sell in roaring campaign now known as the "Ford blitz." Its announced goal was to make Ford the best seller on

when Congress quit included statehood for Hawaii, a government health reinsurance plan, the vote for 18 year olds, a wire-tapping bill and postal rate increases. A box score put out by the White House said that of 65 separate Eisenhower proposals, only 11 had been defeated. However, the White House "won" and "lost" columns included many minor measures and the rivers and harbors authorization measure which Congress usually passes as a routine matter.

Democrats could claim credit, for supplying some of the votes needed for passage of a tax revision measure, excise tax revisions, a foreign aid program cut \$800,000,000 under presidential requests and the St. Lawrence seaway authorization.

The Democrats also gave Eisenhower a victory in helping kill off in the Senate a proposal by Senator John Bricker (Rep. Ohio) to limit treaty-making power.

BOTH SUPPORT. Majorities in both parties were behind such measures as social security expansion, unemployment compensation increase, a compromise increase in the national debt limit, emergency drought loans, cotton acreage adjustment, expansion of commodity credit borrowing power, and a hospital construction program.

Both parties joined in support of bills to provide peacetime death sentences for espionage, to state away citizenship rights of persons who join in espionage conspiracies and a measure to give immunity to certain witnesses before congressional investigations.

Chairman Alexander Wiley (Rep. Wis.) of the Senate foreign relations committee said in a statement that the degree of political agreement on foreign policy issues "is impressive."

Wiley said: "Our military programs have been put on a basis that can be sustained over a period of years without undue strain on our economy and in the Mutual Security Act of 1954 Congress decreed that economic development assistance would end June 30, 1955."

Callow Coach Visits Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP) - The Walter Callow wheelchair coach arrived in the capital in time to participate in the parade opening the 61st annual Ottawa exhibition Saturday. The coach, driver and hostess headed west again with its ultimate destination, LeChidre, Alta.

The coach, designed by Walter Callow, a Halifax invalid bedridden for 24 years, is the fourth such vehicle built to give bedridden and wheelchair-confined invalids an outing. Three are operated in the Maritimes by the Callow Veterans and Invalids Welfare League, a non-profit service organization.

Miss Uli Green, hostess on the coach, said at LeChidre the coach will be turned over to a new branch of the league.

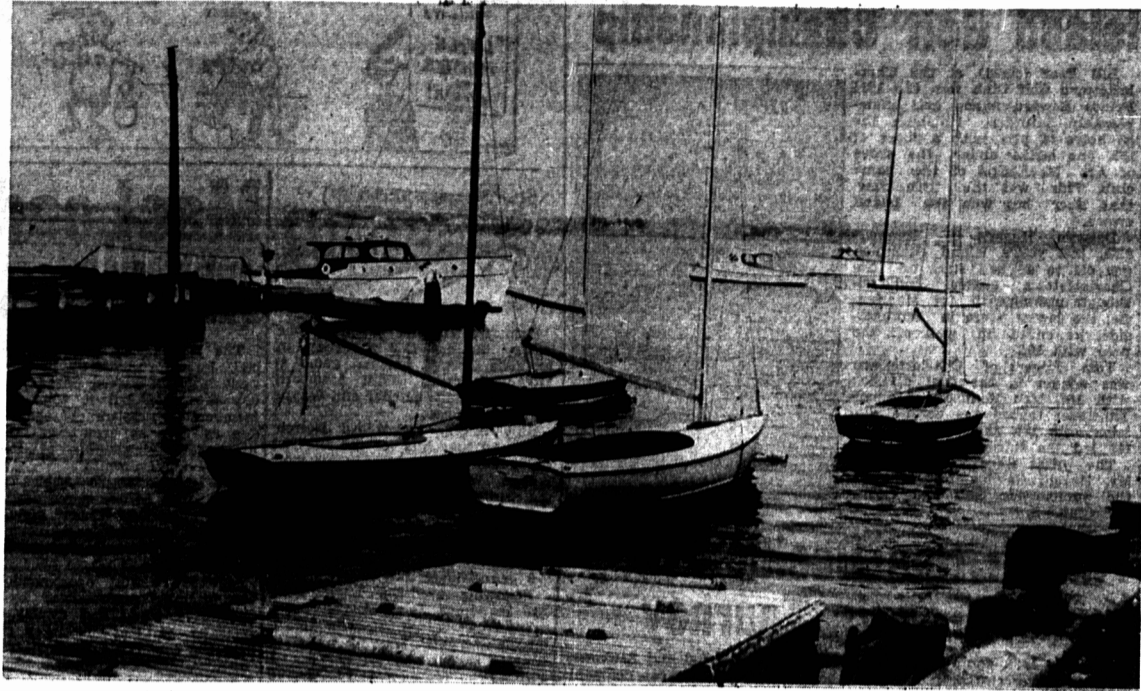
Dealer stocks now are estimated at 455,000 units, compared with 506,000 June 30. The dealer inventory is at its lowest level in about 18 months.

THE LINEUP. In sales Chevrolet is ahead, Ford slightly behind. Buick has moved up to third place and Plymouth has dropped to fourth. Then, in this order, come Oldsmobile, Pontiac, Mercury, Dodge, Chrysler, Cadillac, Studebaker, Nash, Desoto, Packard, Lincoln, Hudson, Willys, Kaiser and Henry.

What does this intensified competition mean to the man who works in the auto factory? Emil Masey, secretary-treasurer of the United Auto Workers CIO, says that since April, 1953, about 192,000 workers have been laid off in U.S. auto factories and supplier plants.

"The answer," says Masey, "does not lie in the problem of competition but in the ability of Americans to buy more. After all, there are still 15,000,000 families in this country who have no car of any kind. There is a great market waiting if only their purchasing power could be increased."

Fear Outbreak of New Gang War In Chicago; Second Slaying Reported

CHICAGO (AP) - Frank Diamond, 61, an intimate of the late Al Capone, was cut down by members of "the Young Bloods" - a group he said had been trying to take over slot machine operations in the Chicago area. He gave their names as Albert Frabatto, Phil Milwaukee, Aldrice, and Marshall Callano.

Both assassinations were accomplished with generous use of ammunition. Diamond was knocked down by two charges of buckshot and two pistol bullets at point-blank range just after he had opened the doors of his private garage preparatory to putting his car away.

His four-year-old son, Frank, Jr., sitting in the car's front seat, was unharmed. Giege was killed four nights earlier by gunmen who left 12 spent shells as he was about to get into his car, parked at a curb on the near northwest side.

Diamond was one of scores of hoodlums known as one-time bodyguards of Al Capone.

negotiations of EDC giving such status rights in proportion to the duties they are willing to assume within European organizations.

COUNTER-PROPOSALS. The counter-proposals by the other five EDC states contained the following points:

1. EDC is one of the elements of peaceful international policy conforming to the United Nations charter and is integrated in the North Atlantic pact.

2. It provides in case of dissolution of the Atlantic pact or of a diminution of U.S. and British contribution, the possibility of withdrawing from the EDC, but a unanimous decision of the ministers' council would be needed to judge whether the British and U.S. contribution had diminished.

3. Reunification of Germany is not specifically given as permitting withdrawal.

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Fail To. warned France last December that the ditching of EDC might touch off an "agonized reappraisal" of U.S. foreign policies in Europe.

Mendes - France and Adenauer met Sunday for a frank business talk after the conference formally wound up.

They surveyed the whole field of Franco-German relations. German officials said afterwards the two agreed they must work for improved relations and should await a new opportunity for trying to settle the future of the disputed Saarland basin.

The French parliament has set a Saar agreement as one of the preconditions of ratification.

News Briefs. WASHINGTON, (AP) - The United States has agreed to extend emergency assistance to flood-stricken East Pakistan. The agreement will be signed here today between the United States and Pakistan governments.

HALIFAX, (CP) - John V. Hillier, 20, a native of Derbyshire, England, who came to nearby Spryfield three months ago, drowned Sunday when his canoe capsized in the wind-suffed Middle river, about 50 miles from here on the province's south shore. No inquest was ordered.

PARIS, (AP) - Forty French Union guards Sunday fired on 2,500 rioting Vietnam war prisoners protesting their return on a Norwegian cargo vessel to the Communist-led Vietnam government. Agence France-Presse reported from Saigon.

TANKESHAN, China (Reuters) - Two British Labor MP's in the party currently touring Communist China, Aneurin Bevan and Sam Watson, both former miners, went down a 2,100-foot-deep Chinese coal mine here Sunday. Higher pay for miners was said to be 900,000 yuan - about \$36.56 - a month, but the average was 700,000 yuan (slightly more than \$28).

Abandon Schooner After Collision

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - Four Newfoundland fishermen casually abandoned their schooner, the Glemshire, Saturday after it was rammed in heavy fog by the 1,321-ton British freighter Perth off Newfoundland's south coast.

The two-master schooner was bound for Placentia, Nfld., to North Sydney, N.S. with only ballast in her hold. The vessel was still floating when last seen.

Officers of the Perth said the Glemshire "settled a bit" after the collision. "No one was injured or shaken up. The fishermen just took one long look and climbed aboard us."

The Perth, carrying general cargo from Toronto to St. John's, is listed in Lloyd's register as owned by Perth, Dundee and London Shipping Company Ltd., with Dundee, Scotland, as her port of registry.

CLOTH-MAKERS CONFER

MONTREAL (CP) - Some 400 delegates and visitors are expected to attend the fourth Canadian textile seminar at Queen's University, Kingston, Ont., early next month.

The textile technical federation of Canada said the meeting will bring together internationally-known experts on textile technology. Among subjects for study will be new "miracle" fibres - some from such unlikely sources as peanuts, milk, coal, and animal hair.

Police Seek To Curb Rising Tide Of Teen-age Crime In City of New York

NEW YORK (AP) - Police continued Sunday to comb the city in their crackdown on "undesirables" aimed at stemming a rising tide of teen-age crimes capped by the expose of a kill-for-thrill gang.

Another savage torture crime Saturday spurred officers into a stepped-up week-end dragnet which netted in Manhattan alone 326 criminals, zoot-suiters, young toughs and street corner bums.

Night court, operating until early Sunday, slapped jail sentences or fines on 252 defendants and held others for further hearings.

A sadistic attack was made Saturday on a 65-year-old cripple, found nude, burned and beaten in his Harlem tenement flat because he refused to reveal where he kept his money.

The victim, Joseph Scarlata, retired pet show owner who has one leg, said a Negro spent nearly eight hours beating him, burning him with cigarettes and rubbing salt into his injuries. The intruder finally left with \$6.10.

ARREST HOODLUM

Howard Gottenberg of the Bronx, member of the "Young Sinners" gang, was arrested for allegedly trying to shoot Paul Weber, member of the "Imperial Hoodis" outfit.

Teen-age terrorism was climaxed last week by the capture of four Brooklyn youths who police say bragged about their sadistic exploits.

The boys, picked up on an assault charge, admitted a series of "thrill" crimes which authorities say included the fatal beating of Rheinhold Ulrichson, 43, a steeplejack.

All four allegedly confessed taking part in the park beating of 34-year-old Willard Menter, burning him with cigarettes, and then dumping him in the East river to drown.
