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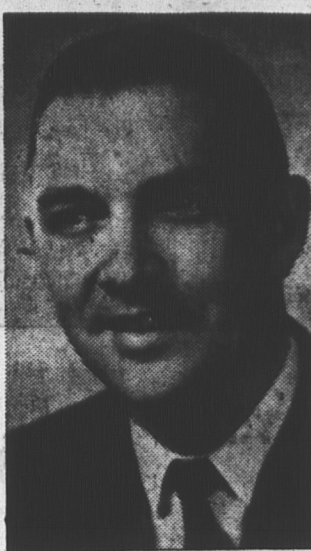
Island Liberal Group Votes On Medicare Issue

The Island delegation voted with the majority of the plenary session of the Liberal convention in Ottawa on the issue of medicare. In doing so the delegation, in concert with the majority of the convention delegates, expressed its disappointment at the decision of the federal cabinet to postpone medicare at all, however the Island delegates were strong in their support of the federal government in its decision founded on the reasons of which this decision was taken.

Following his report to Premier Campbell on this issue, Sigsworth quoted the Premier as stating: "The federal cabinet has been chosen to make decisions such as these and it is encouraging that they received the support of the national party which such decisions merit when the validity of such decisions has been shown as has been the case here in the light of the present economic circumstances in which the country finds itself set against the enormous cost of the whole medicare program."

Premier Campbell expressed a special satisfaction as he stated that among the other financial commitments of the federal government, which may have contributed in no small way to this temporary postponement of the medicare starting date, was the assurance which he has from the federal government that the promised increased pensions to our senior citizens will be paid as scheduled.

ASSURANCE
 On this point, the Premier continued that he has the assurance of the federal ministers that social assistance to meet the needs of our old age pensioners will continue to progress in accordance with the accepted plan and schedule.

Among other matters receiving the attention of the convention, and included in policy chairman, Frank Sigsworth's report to Premier Campbell at this time were the strong support given by the Island delegation to the matter of regional development in any national development program.

Premier Campbell expressed a special satisfaction on the facility with which the resolution concerning free trade was endorsed by the convention.

In expending his thinking in this regard, the premier told Mr. Sigsworth at the conclusion of his report that in supporting the resolution designating free trade areas, he was enthusiastic in his observation that "this resolution, I am sure all will agree, holds exciting and interesting potential for the economic development of the Atlantic provinces generally and of the Island in particular."

ISLAND SUPPORT
 "If for these reasons and no others, such a resolution would merit Island support followed by the provincial government's detailed investigation and study of specialists' views on its far reaching implications," stated the Premier.

Yesterday afternoon the Premier met with several federal cabinet ministers among whom were Mr. Pickersgill, transportation minister, Mr. Robichaud, lands minister and Finance minister Sharp.

Premier Campbell expects to return on Thursday stopping off at Montreal where he will visit and confer with officials of the minimum security prison at Cowansville on the outskirts of Montreal.

OTTAWA (CP) - Canada should refuse to export water to the United States until it completes an assessment of its own needs, delegates to a national Liberal party convention workshop decided.

The recommendation was one of several passed by the workshop on resources. Others called for federal control over water pollution, a tightening of offshore fishing regulations and definition of policy for Northern Canada.

Delegates were divided on water export with one faction seeking to retain all Canada's water resources and another pressing for export.

Bruce Howard of the Penticton, B.C., area, said Canada does not have a water surplus.

Joseph Coyle of Montreal said the export of water would improve Canada's economic position.

The 60 delegates also endorsed a recommendation that a joint federal-provincial advisory board be established to advise on water pollution control, fisheries and irrigation.

WINS - DAMAGES
 NEW YORK (AP) - Violinist Mischa Elman, 75, has won a \$25,000 settlement for injuries received when he fell into a garage grease pit three years ago. Elman sued the garage operator for \$100,000 damages. Lawyers reached the settlement in conference with Justice Harry Frank of the New York State Supreme Court.

Early Water Export To U.S. Is Opposed By Liberals

A recommendation favoring a national and international power grid was watered down to ask the government to stimulate the development of long-distance transmission lines.

Maritime delegates favored national and international power grids as a means of using the abundant supplies of coal in sections of the Maritime Provinces.

Delegates endorsed export of Canadian oil to expand production and improve the Canadian economy. They also called for an oil pipeline from Alberta to Montreal.

Racial Crisis Is Described As Dangerous

OTTAWA (CP) - Newspaper publisher Claude Ryan told the Liberal conference here that major negotiations are needed to solve a dangerous crisis in French-English relations.

More and more French-Canadians regard Quebec as their

trus homeland rather than Canada, because they have not obtained equality of rights outside Quebec.

The publisher of Montreal Le Devoir said the maple leaf flag and the bicentennial royal commission were seen as major concessions by English-speaking Canadians, but came 10 or 15 years too late for French-Canadians.

A much more comprehensive solution is needed.

The future would belong to the party that passed legislation guaranteeing French-language rights across the country and a continued particular role for the Quebec government.

Premier Daniel Johnson of Quebec does not want to take over federal fields of jurisdiction, he said. The province only wanted to recover control over provincial and shared fields of jurisdiction.

U.S. CUTS DRAFT CALL

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. defence department has cut the November draft call by 6,100 men to 37,600 and announced that 12,100 men will be inducted in December, the lowest total since March, 1965. The announcement Wednesday said the draft call was reduced because of "a greater than expected number of enlistments and re-enlistments in recent months."

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
