Any person who wishes to read an interesting chapter in geology can do so if he will just take the trouble of visiting the gravel pit on Mr. Donald McKenzie's farm, Springton. The pit unmistakably relates the fact that it was once part of the ocean bed. It consists of strata of sand and gravel the former having the appearance of clear shore sand and in the interstices between the strata is sea weed. Of course scarcely what is now dry land has been under the sea at one time and in most cases many times perhaps, but not every day can proof so incontrovertible be found.

The startling account of war in this place which appeared in your last issue came upon the quiet unobtrusive and peaceful inhabitants of Rose Valley like a thunderbolt out of the blue. There was no war here such as described. It is pure fiction and if the writer has a penchant for that style of composition, which he apparently must have, it would be well for him not to sail under false colours, and accordingly inform the public when he writes fiction that it is fiction. A cry of righteous indignation went up from everybody when the so-called "journal" was seen. One would suppose from reading it that Rose Valley and Hartsville were two armed camps opposed to each other in deadly animosity. It is not so, however, and there is no spirit of militarism among them at all. If there is any ecclesiastical broil it has not become so serious as to lead to a declaration of war—with swords. There may be a war of words, but that is a very different matter. The writer has taken too much liberty with this section of the country and it is to be hoped he will not repeat the offence. But might it not be a burlesque after all and conceived in a purely frolicsome spirit. If so criticism should not be too harsh, and we would only remind the writer that there is danger in going too far, even in burlesque, especially if not executed with the skill of a master mind.

The crops will be fully up to the average this season, possibly above it, and this is most fortunate as a repetition of last season's failure would be most trying to farmers and to the public at large.

Sir Richard Cartwright's blatant boast that the exodus has ceased is the veriest unbecome; it has by no means ceased. On the contrary the tide of immigration is as great as it ever was, so far as this province is concerned, and hundreds are leaving our shores every day for the United States.

It is not improbable that a general election will be sprung this autumn, seeing that a "machine budget," as the Montreal Star puts it, has been passed. At all times, but more especially on the eve of an election, the Conservative party, should be well organized and steps should immediately be taken to more thoroughly consolidate it.

**The First Vessel to Arrive at the Bridge—Dredge Wanted.**

Mr George Smith's schooner Klondike arrived at New Glasgow Bridge on Friday, with a cargo of coal. She came through the draw bridge at Rustico. Although the channel is narrow Mr Smith piloted her safely.

The residents of that district intend asking the Government to have the dredge put to work to widen the channel. Wood in New Glasgow is becoming very scarce and it is of the greatest importance that means should be provided whereby the people of that district should be at least partially relieved of the expenditures of the dredge. What Queen's wants it and it is just as much required as the Belfast railway. Let the Government Engineer go and make his survey and see if the project is not feasible. We have every confidence in whatever report he may make, and it will settle the matter for at least years. Mr Smith, one of our most reliable pilots as well as farmers, knows this want and will bear me out in what I say.

It is even considered probable that if the Imperial Parliament were to be dissolved now, the Liberals would come in, when they would be faced with the embarrassment of having to choose a set of leaders and a definite policy.

**THE PHILIPPINES**

**Return of Two More Members of Commission Ordered.**

Washington, D. C., Sept 17.—It is said at the War Department that the return of the two members of the Philippine commission remaining in Manila, Messrs Denby and Worcester, is in order to advise the President respecting the very latest aspect of affairs, so that he may use the information in his message to Congress. There is an intimation conveyed that the advices brought by President Schurman and Senator Beveridge and other persons recently returned from Manila, are not at all points in strict accord, though the items of divergence are not known beyond the White House. It is said that as Admiral Dewey is nearing the United States the opportunity to have a meeting of the full commission, of which he is a member, is one that should not be lost, and the report that he expected to sum up their work will be indispensable to Congress in its efforts at legislation for the islands, at least not without a considerable change in personnel. The recall of Messrs Denby and Worcester will leave General Otis the sole representative of the United States in the Philippines.
