Retail Sales

OTTAWA, Sept. 16 (CP) - Canada's retail stores sold goods worth \$965,350,000 during July, 11.5 per cent more than in the corresponding month of 1951 but down from June sales of \$978,263,000.

The Bureau of Statistics reported today the July figure brought to \$6,231,221,000 the total of retail sales in the January-July period this year. That was 6.5 per cent better than the \$5,845,969,000 worth

Claims Protests Were Ignored By Premier Duplessis

By Craig Armstrong Canadian Press Staff Writer HAMILTON, Sept. 16 (CP) - A Quebec minister today charged that Premier Duplessis of Quebec ignored protests by the United Church of Canada that religious freedom was being interfered with in Quebec.

Rev. Ernest E. Long of Outremont, chairman of the committee on civil and religious liberty, made the statement in presenting his report to the General Council of the Church. The council received and extended the list of the committee for another two years.

He said "ugly incidents" had occurred in the province of Quebec "where life was in danger and property destroyed."

Later, Mr. Long told reporters that he was referring to incidents at Longueuil and Shawinigan Falls where French Pentecostal meetings were disturbed.

He said the Montreal Presbytery had written Mr. Duplessis protesting the incidents but had received no response, not even acknowledgment of the letters.

Then, Mr. Long said, the Presbytery wrote Archbishop Emile Leger of Montreal about the incidents asking him to use his influence to stop them but had received no reply.

He told reporters that since the Longueuil and Shawinigan Falls incidents no acts of violence had been reported against any sect.

Rev. G. W. Berry, associate secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Service, said that the report of the committee was largely the work of the Montreal Presbytery. He said he hoped that when the committee reported again in two years, they would be able to give a full report on all Canada.

The report called the Quebec padlock law a "piece of restrictive legislation" which could be used to suppress either criticism of the government or minorities in a manner that would be subject only to slow and costly redress.

The report also said that the practice of determining "guilt by association" in loyalty tests against Communism was a threat to liberty. While a man might be known by the company he kept, the dangers of judging on such a basis were many.

"Guilt or innocence should be determined not by politicians or partisans but by competent judges," the report said.

In the field of racial discrimination, the report said that while there are more glaring instances of such discrimination in South Africa, Canada is not entirely free from guilt. In some districts, it was difficult for Jews to get employment and they were barred from some residential areas. French-Canadian Protestants were finding it difficult to get employment in other than Anglo-Saxon firms, thus forcing them to turn from their heritage and become anglicized.

QUEBEC, Sept. 16 (CP) - Solicitor-General Rivard of Quebec said tonight he had no comment to make on a charge by Rev. Ernest E. Long that Premier Duplessis of Quebec was ignoring protests by the United Church against violations of religious liberty in Quebec.

Mr. Rivard, speaking for the Premier who is away on vacation, said he would have to give more study to the matter before commenting.

Mossadegh Rejects Plan

TEHRAN, Iran, Sept. 16 (Reuters) - Prime Minister Mohammed Mossadegh today tossed out British-United States proposals for settling the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute, and said that if Britain is not prepared to meet his terms it may lead to a rupture of diplomatic relations.

His views were outlined in a long statement read to the Majlis (House of Representatives) and won him an overwhelming vote of confidence. Sixty of the 61 legislators present endorsed his policy of no compromise, only the chairman abstaining.

The Premier, whose government nationalized the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company last year, rejected the British-U.S. plan for a payment of \$100,000,000 if Iran would let the International Court settle Anglo-Iranian claims for compensation, and would make a deal with the company for marketing Iranian oil.

Mossadegh, who did not appear in person, said in his statement he is prepared to let the matter of compensation go to the International Court only if Anglo-Iranian agrees to certain conditions.

These included an immediate payment of \$137,000,000 and the settlement of disputes and claims under terms of the 1933 oil agreement and a supplementary agreement of 1949.

July was really dry with only 2.48 inches of rain, and August was not much better with just 3.34 inches. The same months last year produced 5.82 and 7.00 inches respectively. The first half of this month brought forth only .73 inches compared to the 1.32 inches of the first two weeks of September last year.

To Speak Here On Canada's Economy

One of Canada's most distinguished economists will visit Charlottetown this week in the person of Dr. R. B. Bryce, Assistant Deputy Minister of Finance, Ottawa.

Dr. Bryce is coming to the city to deliver a public address in St. Dunstan's University auditorium on Saturday afternoon to delegates from various Maritime points who will be attending a two day convention of the Atlantic Chapter of the International Association of Personnel in Employment Security. His subject will be Canada's present and future economic outlook.

The Association draws its membership from Government employment offices in every Province of Canada, every state of the Union, the Hawaiian Islands, Japan and Puerto Rico.

The Deputy Minister is a brilliant scholar who received an inspiring grounding in economics in Britain, where he studied under the late world known figure, Maynard Keynes. In addition he has had ten years of delectable practical knowledge in public finance in Canada.

He is one of two men who prepares the Budget each year under the direction of the Finance Minister. At times in Ottawa, Dr. Bryce sits as chairman of the Treasury Board, that mysterious body which acts as watchdog of public funds. In high official circles he is regarded as an eminent authority on financial matters.

He was induced to come to Charlottetown by R. P. Hartley, Superintendent of the Atlantic Region of the Unemployment Insurance Commission, who will be one of the prominent figures at the convention.
