We hear frequent complaints about the delay in receiving telegrams from points beyond the Anglo-American Company's lines. When in Ottawa a few days ago Mr. W. C. DesBrisay sent two telegrams—one at 11 a. m., and the other at 1 p. m.—on Saturday. The first was received at 6 p. m., and the second not until Monday forenoon. We are satisfied that the fault does not lie with the A. A. Tel. Co., but with the Dominion or Montreal Companies who, we trust, will without delay, remove the grievances.

APPLICATION will be made to Parliament next session for the incorporation of a company to construct a railway from Emerson to the Souris River in the Northwest. This line would, probably, be the means of giving a large supply of fuel to Winnipeg and the villages west of that city, for we learn that Mr. Hugh Sutherland has had a party at work mining coal, which is abundant along the Souris River, and expects to be able to sell it in Winnipeg next summer at six dollars a ton. Three years ago coal retailed in Winnipeg at twenty-five dollars a ton.

Prices were as follows:—Beef (small) from 5 to 12 cents per lb; beef (gr.) from 3 to 7 cents per lb.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; lamb, from 4 to 7 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 7 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cents; geese, from 40 to 55 cents each; ducks, from 20 to 28 cents each; chickens, from 30 to 45 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 16 to 20 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 15 to 16 cents per lb.; eggs, from 20 to 25 per doz.; potatoes, from 16 to 20 cents per bushel; oats, from 32 to 33 cents per bushel; hay, from 35 to 40 cents per 100 lbs.; flour per 100 lbs., from 3.00 to 3.25; oatmeal from 2.25 to 2.50.
