THE INCOME TAX.

Sir,—With your permission, I will draw the attention of the public to the injustice of the Peters tax on fire insurance.

As was pointed out by the Opposition members of the Legislature, this tax would fall on the insured entirely, and not on the insurance companies. They know it now with a vengeance. The most objectionable feature of it is that it falls directly and most heavily on property outside of Charlottetown and Summerside. The premium rates on villages are from one to five per cent, while city rates are about one per cent and less. A country store carrying \$10,000 insurance pays annually a premium, on the average, of about \$400, while a like risk in the city is only \$100. Now the addition caused by the Peters tax will be on the country store \$20, and on the city store \$5. Besides, you will observe the country store pays a direct Provincial property tax, while the city store goes scot free. Why this discrimination? Does Peters wish to kill out the country store? It seems like it. The country can now see plainly the advantage of Charlottetown and Summerside of taking their lawyers to represent country districts. They misrepresent the country and work for the justice. In conclusion, I ask, where is the justice of taxing a man secondly on the same property? Every one knows that fire insurance is a terrible burden, but the Peters idea of relief is to add it to it.

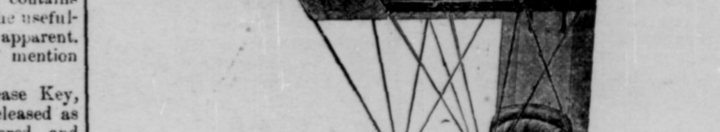
