J.J. Connolly States Views

Interviewed today, following the announcement by L-Col. E. W. Johnstone of Burlington, of training courses for waitresses, J.J. Connolly, Chairman of the Charlottetown Employment Advisory Committee, expressed his great pleasure that the Tourist agreed to request such courses from the Provincial Vocational Institute.

Mr. Connolly said that although the original request of the Employment Advisory Committee was broader in its aspect than the presently scheduled courses, they will form an excellent base for further expansion of training. The original intent was not merely the improvement of services offered to tourists, but the upgrading of the waitress service in all the restaurants on P.E.I.

George W. Cheverie, manager of the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service, expressing his pleasure that the NES could be of service in helping provide such out-of-the-ordinary training, said he particularly wished to praise the female members of the Employment Advisory Committee, Sister Mary Henry and Elizabeth Torrey of the Welfare Bureau, Mrs. Stewart MacDonald of the Home and School Association and Mrs. Ireta Sutherland of the Business and Professional Women's Club. These ladies, he said, have made outstanding representations on behalf of training and retraining courses for female employees of all classes.

The Queen Charlotte High School Drama Society and school library presented The Adventures of Tom Sawyer in three acts, directed by Mrs. K. McAulay, at the school auditorium last night. Master of ceremonies was Frank Likely.

Tom Sawyer is a product of the "composite order of architecture," an odd superstition prevalent among children and slaves in the west during the period of the author, Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain). That is to say, he is an invented character as is Huckleberry Finn however he contains characteristics of mortals. In this case Tom Sawyer was invented by Mr. Clemens however it is said by the author he has the charac-

teristics of two or three boys with whom he was associated. He added that Huck Finn was a character taken from the air.

Tom Sawyer was written for the entertainment of children but it also written to remind the adults "of what they were once themselves." It is said that his adventures are true and a couple were his personal experiences.

In last night's presentation, Tom Sawyer, portrayed by J. Rowan Fitzgerald, is a young adventurous schoolboy who finds more delight in going fishing or swimming with Huckleberry Finn. 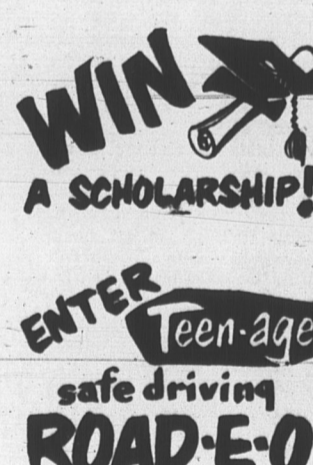

Probe Planned Of Prisoners

MONTREAL (CP) — Claude Wagner, Quebec's justice minister, has advised the bar of the province of Quebec that an "immediate inquiry" is being held into the treatment of prisoners, the bar said Tuesday.

Robert Leveque, secretary-treasurer of the bar, said in a statement it was brought to the group's attention "that prisoners have been prevented from exercising fully their rights to retain counsel." "The bar also has been informed that certain prisoners may have been mishandled," said Mr. Leveque, speaking for the organization's general council.
