## A LONG LIST OF CHARGES

Made by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper.

REGARDING THE YUKON INVESTIGATION BY SIFTON

Specific Charges Made Against Members of Commission.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 28.—Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper yesterday carried out a promise that he would renew and establish his charges against the Yukon Government.

He compared the unwillingness of the Government to institute the Yukon inquiry with the wonderful zeal displayed in investigating all the sorts of trumped up charges against the officers appointed by the late government.

In the Yukon case Sifton could be got to do no more than appoint his relative to try the charges against Sifton's department.

The evidence showed that Ogilvie had no idea of the duty of a judge.

After further reviewing the evidence of the commission, Sir Hibbert read a series of resolutions reciting the course of the Laurier Government in the Manitoba alleged election frauds and stating that Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper believes that if given some assistance by the Government he can prove that the Minister of the Interior was guilty of scandalous delay and neglect in dealing with the conditions reported to him from the Yukon in 1897; that the commission to Walsh was illegally issued; that Walsh was permitted to unduly delay his departure for the Yukon; that he was not fit for the position of Commissioner; that McGregor and Norwood, appointed mining inspectors, were incompetent men and Norwood an American citizen; that Sifton showed favoritism in giving dredging licenses and liquor permits to men who had been partners of his, some of whom hailed from fictitious residences; that Sifton wrongfully gave Wade permission to traffic in mining licenses; that Muelock was guilty of gross neglect in making postal arrangements; that the neglect of the Government has created insanitary conditions in the Yukon; that Commissioner Walsh was guilty of misbehavior in office, of favoritism, of liaison with Lucille Elliot, and that this Lucille was given a special advantage in locating claims and was allowed to keep her saloon open on Sundays; that Walsh illegally and vindictively interfered with legal permits issued by the Northwest Government, that various officials of the Government in the Yukon were guilty of blackmail, selling information, sidedoor influences and concealment of facts; that Wade while he was the legal adviser of the Commissioner was personally interested in privileges and concessions given by the Commissioner; that the timber inspectors were interested in timber leases; that a timber lease granted and paid for was taken away from the lessee on the excuse that it was needed for the people of Dawson,—after which that timber was sold to private parties who made a net profit of \$5,000 out of it.

Therefore resolved that His Excellency be advised to instruct the Attorney General to take proper action to have these charges heard, and that a Royal Commission of two judges be appointed to enquire into the facts, Parliament clothing them with the requisite powers.

Sir Chas. Hibbert said he made these charges with a full sense of responsibility. He could have done it all under the protection of Parliament, but he realized that he was making charges against persons some of whom were not here to speak for themselves.

If the tribunal were granted he would undertake to make good his accusations, when asked to do so, in British Columbia or in the Yukon, or at Ottawa. If he failed to make them good he would consent to a verdict that he should no longer represent the people in this House

and would retire from the parliament of this country and from public life.

He was therefore, in taking this stand, risking whatever advancement he might be able to attain in the future.

At 11.45, Sir Charles Hibbert moved the adjournment of the debate, having been speaking six hours.

## THE McLEAN MURDER CASE.

Gover Acquitted by the Jury of Murder.

ST. JOHN, N. B., June 28.—The trial of Gover the Stanley farmer, charged with the murder on May 19, of one McLean whom he found in his wife's bedroom, resulted in the jury acquitting Gover of murder and finding him guilty of manslaughter.

The Judge sentenced Gover to 10 days in the county jail.

The verdict and sentence was received with cheers by the crowded court room.

## British Naval Manoeuvres

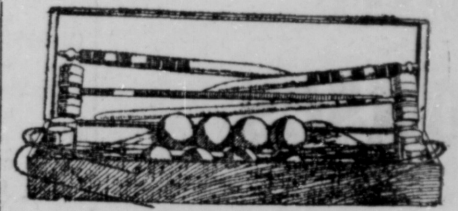
