

Newfoundlander Arrested For Selling Raisin Bread

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—A man landed in court in Clarenville last year for trying to sell a loaf of raisin bread.

There are strict laws governing the size of raisin bread in Newfoundland, as the shopkeeper discovered. A loaf must weigh no more and no less than 1 1/4 pounds. The offending loaf seized by the RCMP in Clarenville was baked outside the province.

The Raisin Bread Act is one of many strange laws of Newfoundland contained in the revised statutes.

SOUP ON SATURDAY

Another clause requires vessels in the seal hunt to serve soup on Saturdays. The soup must contain onions. If it doesn't, any member of the crew is entitled to sue the owner or captain and collect \$25.

Another law prohibits catching or interfering with the growth of oysters, but oysters don't exist in Newfoundland waters.

Ship's masters may not take pilots to sea against their will unless a storm prevents them from joining their pilot boat. If they can't get off the owners of the vessel must pay them \$16.80 a month for time lost. That applies to outport pilots only. St. John's pilots are entitled to a princely \$3 a day.

There is a \$14 reward for catching deserters from the Royal Navy. You don't need a warrant or special authority. No Newfoundland law governs deserters from the Canadian navy.

NO WOLVES

What looks more promising from a revenue standpoint is the legal provision of a \$12 bounty, from the nearest justice of the peace, for killing a wolf. Trouble is, there are no wolves in Newfoundland. The minister of finance however is required by law to report to the house of assembly each spring the number of wolves caught in the province the previous season.

Donald Campbell Breaks Own Speedboat Record

BOULDER CITY, Nev. (AP)—cockpit of the Bluebird.

Donald Malcolm Campbell, the only man to pilot a speedboat more than 200 miles an hour and live to tell about it, broke his own world record Wednesday by streaking his jet-powered Bluebird over Lake Mead at 216.2 miles an hour.

The speedboat's 1.7 performance cracked the mark of 202.32 m. p. h. which the debonair Briton set at Lake Ullswater in England last July 24.

The 34-year-old speed king's 216.2-ton, all-metal Bluebird was timed officially at 239.5 on the first of two required runs over a measured kilometre distance, and 193.0 on the return run.

The only other man to exceed 200 miles an hour was John Cobb of England, killed when his jet-propelled hydroplane disintegrated at a speed of 206 miles an hour on one run in Scotland in September, 1952.

Bluebird at Lake Ullswater was timed at approximately 215 and 189 miles an hour for the 202.32 record.

HAD CLOSE CALL

Prior to Campbell's July record run, the world mark was 178 miles an hour, set in 1952 by Stanley Sayres' SLoMo Shun IV of Seattle.

Wednesday's record was set over a dangerously short distance of water, about 3 1/2 miles. This meant that Campbell did not have the Bluebird, and not too much to decelerate.

The success ended a series of tests and several disappointments since Campbell arrived at neighboring Las Vegas to set up headquarters. Last Oct. 16 Campbell failed in a record attempt, due primarily to the presence of humdrum days of pleasure boats which stirred up choppy waves.

Bank Of N. S. Record Increase In Deposits

Marking a new high of \$1,192,977,000 in assets, the Bank of Nova Scotia's annual statement for the year ended October 31 shows a record increase of \$167,610,000 in deposits by the public. This growth is reflected on the assets side of the statement by an increase in loans other than call, of \$105,703,000 and in securities of \$44,946,000 over last year's figures.

The balance sheet reflects the increased activity of the bank across Canada during the past fiscal year, which has seen the opening of 34 new branches. Total deposits now stand at \$1,192,977,000 with call loans at \$81,690,000, other loans at \$884,418,000 and securities at \$312,000,000 standing at 15.81 percent of assets standing at 1.81 percent of public liabilities and quick assets at 50.35 percent.

Profits, before depreciation and taxes amounted to \$7,664,000, an increase of \$633,000 over last year. Provision of \$1,362,000 was made for depreciation on bank premises and \$2,200,000 for taxes, leaving a profit of \$3,502,000. Dividends, and extra distributions to shareholders, including one of 20 cents declared October 18 last, amount to \$3,000,000 or \$2.00 a share. The balance of \$502,000, when added to undivided profits, brought this account to a total of \$1,027,000.

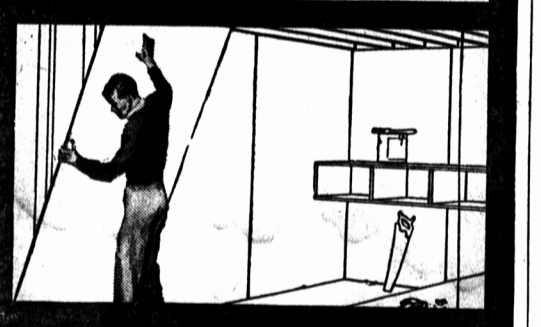
