TRINITY Y. P. U.—The Trinity United Church Y. P. U. held its regular meeting on Tuesday even-

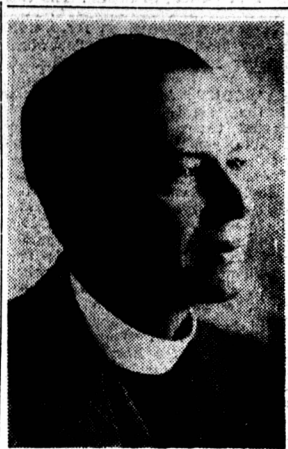

Canon Malone Describes Visit To Victoria, B.C.

The Rev'd. Canon and Mrs. Malone returned recently from a visit to Victoria, B. C. Canon Malone was a member of the Electoral College appointed to choose the new Primate of all Canada. He also attended the meetings of the General Synod Committees held in Victoria. Hot summer weather was experienced everywhere; the only rain that fell was on the afternoon of their arrival at Banff, where they stayed at Banff Springs Hotel. They went on a tour up the mountains, on to the Cascade Gardens and to the Sulphur Springs; and enjoyed the beautiful scenery of the Bow River Valley and the majestic snow-capped mountains which surround Banff. Travelling through the Rockies by C.P.R. is a thrilling experience. The magnificent masses of mountain ranges, the breath-taking descent through the passes, the tumbling cascades of mighty rivers, the dizzy depths of canyons, the rushing of rapids, the towering forest trees can hardly be described in words, Canon Malone states. They must be seen to form a true idea of them. In contrast to all this might and majesty of nature is the peaceful Fraser Valley through which they passed on their way to Vancouver.

All through the West and on the coast they met with Prince Edward Islanders or their descendants.

In Vancouver, a cousin who had not been seen for over fifty years, met them and drove them all over the city, through lovely Stanley Park and around the sea front past the five buildings of the University of British Columbia. Their stay was made most pleasant and they were enabled to call on former members of St. Peter's Cathedral congregation now resident there.

A boat trip of four or five hours on a splendid C. P. R. steamer, winding through the narrow channels between many beautiful islands with their magnificent scenery, brought them to Victoria, a city of lovely gardens and emerald green lawns sweeping down to the coast line. The famous Bukhard Gardens are a dream of beauty, and Hatley Castle, now Royal Roads, is a bit of the old country transplanted to the new world. Again they met Prince Edward Islanders whose welcome was warm and whose kindness was marvellous. The newspapers have described the splendid service of the installation of the Primate and the magnificent service of witness at the Arena; but Christ Church Cathedral itself, not yet completed, is an imposing structure which is a credit to Victoria. "To the vision and imagination of Bishop Schofield this fine Cathedral owes its magnificence," Canon Malone says; "and we may be proud of the fact that the Bishop was brought up at St. Peter's Cathedral at what was the Clergy House in the days of the first incumbent, the Rev.
