K. S. Rogers by the Canadian General Electric Company.

"I believe the future of the tourist industry lies in the motel line not in the construction of cabins as has been the custom during the past five years," stated Premier A. W. Matheson yesterday afternoon during the discussion on tourist accommodations in the Legislature.

The Premier outlined his views on the controversial tourist industry as the Legislature was giving a second reading to a bill entitled "An Act to Provide Loans for the Establishment and Improvement of Tourist Accommodation within the Province."

Three Maritime Central Airways huge Douglas DC-3's took off from Charlottetown yesterday to participate in the airlift that will move hundreds of passengers from the Queen Mary to Boston and New York.

The giant steamship was diverted to Halifax as a result of the

longshoremen's strike in New York. It is expected that the aircraft will stay in Maritime Central Airways' Halifax base until movement of passengers is completed.

Maritime Central Airways is preparing more aircraft for the airlift if they are required. Senior Captains H. C. Trainor, R. F. Murnaghan and C. E. Blair will pilot the aircraft.

Mrs. J. T. Davies, Regent of Royal Edward Chapter, I. O. O. E., was chosen to represent the chapter as official delegate at the national annual meeting to be held in Saint John, N. B., on May 29-June 2.

The sharpest exchange of the 1950 session of the Legislature occurred yesterday afternoon between Premier A. W. Matheson and Mr. R. Bell, Leader of the Opposition over the matter of the tourists loans administration.

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor, chairman of the Public Utilities Commission, was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday, which was presided over by Jim Burden, with Jim Cery as co-chairman.

The possibility of operating a summer school for Gaelic and other subjects was discussed at a meeting of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island last evening and a committee was appointed to investigate the matter.

A net debt reduction of \$156,134 and a surplus on ordinary account of \$1,975,577 for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1954, was reported by Hon. W. E. Darby, Attorney General and Provincial Treasurer, in his budget presentation in the Legislature last night.

On several occasions I have stated that it had been my ambition as Treasurer of this Province to halt the succession of debt increases and to achieve an overall surplus which could be applied in the reduction of provincial debt," the Minister said.

A sum of \$500,000 will be made available by the Provincial Government for the purpose of assisting in the establishment of Industrial Plants in the Province, according to the Industrial Estab-

lishment Promotion Act which was given a second reading in the Legislature yesterday afternoon.

The bill is entitled "An Act to Provide Assistance Towards the Establishment of Industrial Plants for the Processing of Agricultural, Horticultural and Fisheries Products within the Province."

Firms, persons or corporations erecting or extending plant facilities may be eligible to obtain assistance either in the form of outright grants, loans or through Government guarantee of bank loans or securities.

The belief that people were not going outside the city to Parkdale and Spring Park to avoid taxes, but to obtain available building sites was expressed last night by former City Councillor Frank Storey as he briefly addressed a reorganization meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Community Planning Association.

The addition of four men to the local postal service makes it possible to continue the service to the public on the same level as heretofore enjoyed, and in respect to the deliveries by carrier, the situation is somewhat improved," said Postmaster, Capt. J. J. Connolly yesterday when questioned about the shift in the Postal Department to a 40 hour week which becomes effective tomorrow.

Two additional clerks in the main Post Office make it possible to cover the various wickets, receive and despatch mail exactly as in the past.

The Legislative committee on education yesterday concluded its hearings with its final session in the Legislative Chamber. Mr. C. Mercer, principal of the Summerside High School, who was expected to be a witness could not appear due to the heavy storm and condition of the roads.

The very brief session consisted mostly of questions by Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan and answers by Dr. MacKinnon. Mainly the questions dealt with the handling of the Massey Grant from the Federal Government. The principal inquiry was that it had come direct to the College and that by order-in-council the money had been put in a special fund in the hands of the Provincial Treasurer.

Dr. Gilbert Gallant was elected president of No. 200 Summerside Wing R. C. A. F. Chapter at its annual meeting last evening. Other officers elected were as follows: 1st vice - president, Bill Hickey; 2nd vice - president, Russel Phaneuf; secretary, Derek Hughes; treasurer, Norman Hogg; directors: John Leuty, Errol Laughlin, Ernie Moore, and Wendell Muttart.

There was a good attendance at both the afternoon and evening sessions of school administration short courses held in the Albert Women's Institute hall yesterday, sponsored by the Department of Education. Mr. H. B. Chandler, M.A., B.L.S., superintendent of libraries and director of adult education presided at both the afternoon and evening meetings assisted by Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, chief superintendent of schools, Jack Martin and Stan McManis of the National Film Board.

Strong criticisms of the under-estimating of taxes by the Government and the under-spending of the estimates in the Agricultural, Educational and Health and Welfare Departments were made in the Legislature last night by Mr. John A. MacDonald, financial critic of the Progressive Conservative party, who spoke on the Budget Debate.

Mr. MacDonald, who represents the Third Kings District, scored what he termed the Government's consistent policy during the past two years of under-spending in vital departments and over-spending in others that are of less importance to the Province.

Mr. William Agnew of the Department of Industry and Natural Resources was the guest speaker last evening at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held in the civic building. He was introduced to the members by Mr. John Mungall, vice-president of the Board.

Mr. Agnew chose as his subject the development of trade with the Province of Newfoundland and he also dealt with the possibility of having a boat call at this

port on regular scheduled trips throughout the summer to take produce to Newfoundland and bring back products to Prince Edward Island.

An up-to-date report on the 1954 Prince County Red Cross campaign from Judge L. G. Lewis, county chairman, shows that splendid results are being obtained in the districts which have already appointed canvassers.

The areas around Tignish, under the chairmanship of Miss Ann Gaudet, Tignish, Mr. Sylvère Chailson of Peter Road, Mr. Gerald Handrahan, Tignish and Mr. Emmett Callaghan of St. Louis are making satisfactory progress and the following have already made returns.

Mr. Redverse Stewart of New Wilshire was the winner of the Grand Championship at the third Prince Edward Island 1st stock show and sale which was held yesterday with a huge crowd in attendance.

Mr. Stewart's award and nine month old Aberdeen Angus steer weighed 969 lbs., and was purchased by T. Eaton Co. Moncton, for a record breaking price of 99 cents a lb., netting the owner \$979.11. An average of 26.44 cents per lb., was realized on the \$15,600 sale.

Yesterday's show was one of the finest ever held in Canada and the judge, Mr. Frank Wolff who is agricultural representative of the Canadian Pacific Railway, stated that the type and quality of the animals was outstanding. Mr. Wolff was high in his praise for the culling committee whom he said left a splendid group of animals for him to judge thus making his task easier.

The official remarked that he did not favor the long-legged type of animal for beef purposes and pointed out that these were not popular with the buyers either.
