## Prince County Exports for 1885.

The following is a statement of the Shipping and Exports for the port of Summerside, including the outports under its survey, from the opening until the close of navigation, for the year 1885. During the year 15 vessels arrived from and 45 cleared for British and foreign ports. Of the former, 15 were in cargo and 3 in ballast, and of the latter all were laden. During the same period 392 vessels entered from, and 418 cleared to ports within the Dominion. Of these arrivals and clearances, some were laden and some in ballast. In addition to this, the mail steamers made 195 round trips to Point du Chene, and 28 to Charlottetown.

It is almost impossible to give what might be termed an accurate statement of the Exports from any one of the Counties of this Province, as some of the products of each frequently pass into another for shipment to foreign ports, and of course will be credited as Exports of the County whence they are finally shipped. During the year large quantities of produce not included in this report, both of the farm and fishery, have been shipped from this to the other Counties of the Island, and in return we take credit for some of the products of these Counties shipped from this port.

## Cape Traverse Items.

First mail boats of the season crossed from this side to-day; four boats under Capt. Howatt and his noble crews. There was an extra large mail and a number of passengers, among whom were Hon. Messrs. Sullivan and Ferguson en route for England; also a number of braves for Fredericton Militia School.

In the boat house this morning previous to starting, the order and decorum was all that could be expected. In the boat house is stationed Mr. Eliphlet Nuttall, as keeper; as is also Mr. T. C. Muncey, who by his sterling abilities, fills the offices of A. A. Telegraph Operator and Government Ticket Agent of Her Majesty's mail supervisor.

The contractors, Messrs. Strang and Howatt, for conveying mails and boatmen to and from board ice, appeared on this morning well equipped. The boatmen felt quite a change this morning. Instead of walking a couple of miles, they were driven to their work by teams well suited for the business.

The Lansdowne Hotel presented a lively appearance this morning, about an hour before the departure of the boats. Mr. Strang, with his usual jolly way, could not do enough to make every one of his guests comfortable.

Although mail boats are not allowed to carry heavy luggage, there are some two or three boats fitted out under Captains Ball and George Allen.
