Editorial Notes

—The improvement in the coal trade of Nova Scotia is very marked. For the three quarters of the present year the sales were 872,769 tons—an increase of 134,000 tons over the sales for the first nine months of 1881, and nearly 90,000 tons in excess of the total sales for the whole year of 1879!

—Nicholas Flood Davin has been visiting Winnipeg and Regina; and on the 4th inst penned the following for the Toronto Mail:—

"Yesterday, when I left Winnipeg, there must have been six inches of snow on the ground. It was, in fact, a splendid, bracing winter's day. My intention was to pass one day here, drive to see some land south of the reserve, and then return to Winnipeg. To carry a light overcoat, or a waterproof, or heavy shoes for mud, seemed to me unnecessary. I therefore donned my fur and warm overshoes. I little anticipated finding the weather in Regina quite warm, so that I have been able to go about without discomfort in a tweed autumn suit. Scarcely any snow to be seen. On awaking this morning and looking out of the sleeper I recognized Regina as you recognize an infant to be the same infant you had seen six months before. No doubt it was the same Regina I had seen two weeks ago, but she had decidedly grown. From six to twelve large buildings had been put up since then. The fronts of these buildings are square and not triangular. You begin to catch a hint of how the streets will run. Everybody is astonished at the progress. The line of houses along the street nearest the railway is now very long. I spoke with many of the new comers since my last visit, and found them enthusiastic and full of hope."

—The "National Liberal Union," with headquarters at Toronto, has adopted the following platform:

The advocacy and promotion of all Canadian interests and the maintenance of all Canadian industries.  
The right to negotiate our own commercial treaties.  
The maintenance of an election law, pure, stringent and uniform.

The re-adjustment of the franchise and the establishment of a method of representation by which a more correct expression of the political convictions of electors may be maintained.

The preservation inviolate of Provincial rights as guaranteed by the Act of Confederation.

A reformation of the Senate so as to bring it into harmony with the principles of representative institutions.

The upholding of the independence of Parliament, having a due regard to its responsibility to the people and the true principles of representative government.

A determined hostility to the creation by legislative enactments of railway or land monopolies.

The promotion of a system of immigration for the settlement of our public lands and the development of our resources; with lading Government aid in the importation of skilled artisans and cheap labor, and with the determined object of protecting Canadian workmen against unnecessary and unfair competition.

That the principal positions in our military system be filled by officers trained in Canada.

The reduction of the cost of Government by the abolition of superfluous offices.

The dissemination of a knowledge on all subjects tending to the promotion of good government and the fostering of a truly national sentiment, in all matters pertaining to the well-being of the Dominion.

**The Markets.**

**OATS.**  
Oats are still steady in the English markets. Good sound cargoes are required. The price quoted is 18s. 6d. to 19s per quarter of 304 lbs., for delivery at ports in France. Oats are coming slowly into Charlottetown. The price is at present from 32 to 34 cents per bushel.

**POTATOES.**  
Potatoes have a fair market in Boston. Prolifics and Early Rose sell at 72 cents per bushel, and Chenauges at 60 cents. The The Steamer Carroll which sailed yesterday evening had a cargo of nearly 7,000 bushels. In Charlottetown stock is coming slow. The price paid for Prolifics is 18 cents, Early Rose 23 cents, and Chenauges 16 to 18 cents.

**EGGS.**  
are in good demand in Boston. Fresh stock is active and commands from 28 to 30 cents per dozen, wholesale.

**PORK.**  
The price of Pork is declining in Chicago and New York. In the latter city, on the 14th inst., new mess on the spot, sold for \$22 per barrel. Pork is coming briskly into Charlottetown. The price paid is from 8 to 9 cents per pound.

The Montreal Gazette of the 13th inst., says:—Although business is quiet, a slightly better feeling was noticed in the flour market owing in the first place to the reduction of 8,531 barrels in store during the week, and secondly to the improved tenor of foreign advices. Compared with this time last year, the stocks in store show the large decrease of 23,118 barrels. The quotations are:—

The Shipping of the World.

The last volumes of Bureau Veritas give some interesting statistics of the shipping of the great maritime nations, from which it will be seen that the shipping under the British flag is still far in excess of that of any other nation, and, with respect to its capabilities for carrying the world's commerce, greater than the shipping of all the rest of the world besides. These statistics also develop the important fact that already the tonnage of steam vessels afloat is nearly two-thirds of the tonnage of sailing vessels, while in point of freight-carrying ability, the steam vessels are to the sailing vessels as 16 is to 13. So that steam vessels may be said to have easily the lead in the world's commerce. To come to a fuller demonstration of this fact we give the following figures:—

Total sailing tonnage of the world. 13,739,970  
Total steam tonnage (gross)..... 8,404,932  
The net steam tonnage, which deducts engine space, etc., is 5,497,441. Estimating one ton net in a steam vessel to be equal to three tons in a sailing vessel, which is certainly not beyond the truth, we have the following result:—

Total steam tonnage (equalized)..... 16,492,323  
Total sailing tonnage..... 13,739,970  
The total sailing tonnage under the British flag is 5,319,872; the total steam tonnage under the same flag is 5,352,549 gross, or 3,462,877 net. Bringing the steam and sailing tonnage under the British flag to the standard of sailing tonnage alone, we have the following result:—

Total tonnage of the world..... 30,177,993  
Total British tonnage..... 15,768,403

The following table shows the sailing tonnage of the seven principal maritime nations:—

These figures show how immeasurably in advance of all other nations Great Britain now is in respect to tonnage, more especially steam tonnage. These figures also show that Canada with her 1,350,000 tons of shipping still holds her place as the fourth maritime country, coming between Norway with her 1,447,590 tons and Germany with her 1,217,223 tons. This is a proud position for the Dominion to occupy, having a larger tonnage than such great nations as Germany, France and Russia, and nearly three times the tonnage of Spain, the land that sent out the "Invincible Armada."

**Personal and Gossip.**

Archbishop Tschereau, of Quebec, has issued a pastoral, in which he condemns the excessive extravagance that prevails in the province. He also reprobates intemperance and living beyond one's means. The Archbishop gives sound advice. There is always noticeable extravagance amongst all classes in periods of good times.

Mr Eddy must have a queer lot of managers in his employ. We have heard of people who didn't know enough to come in when it rained, but this is the first case on record where the manager of a manufacturing concern did not know enough, in the proprietor's absence, to put out a fire without first telegraphing for instructions. A report of the big fire at Hull, Mr Eddy was sent in Boston when the fire occurred. Immediately on its breaking out, one of the managers telegraphed "Your premises here are all on fire. What shall we do?" Half an hour later the laconic reply came, "Put it out."—Monetary Times.

A Baptist pastor in Wisconsin has recently been tried for the offence of attending a performance given by a company of negro minstrels. He pleaded guilty to the charge, explaining that he was on his way to a temperance meeting, but got into the wrong hall, and when the performance began his sense of fun overcame his moral scruples. He got off with a mild rebuke, as it is to be regretted that there were not among his judges some who were honest enough to say that they were glad their pastor had found his way under the influence of harmless fun, and that they hoped he would do it again and often. There is no greater humbug or hypocrisy than the current pretence, in some religious circles, that pastors and preachers are better able than other people to get along without diversion. A man whose time is spent almost entirely in contemplating the sins of the world and hearing of humanity's sins and troubles is the last one who should be called to account for enjoying anything that is funny yet not improper.

Those who possess neither property nor principle are not over zealous in support of laws that protect those who do. In times of civil disorder reliance on such by those in authority is evidence of weakness.
