BRACKENBURY ADVANCES.

Troops in Good Health and Spirits.

TROOPS EN ROUTE.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

Troops en route to the Soudan will go direct to Trinkitat, a few miles south of Suakin, which place will be made the base for an advance to Barber.

FRIENDLY NATIVES.

The natives in the vicinity of Korti are very friendly. They freely furnish the British with supplies. They express no fear that the Mahdi will advance to the north.

UNFRIENDLY NATIVES.

The rebels about Suakin often destroy many hours work on the new forts being constructed by the British troops after the latter have withdrawn for the night.

THE KAMISIN WINDS.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

A despatch says the dreaded kamsin winds, which do not generally begin before March, have already begun to blow over the Soudan. The wind is hot, and accompanied by blinding clouds of sand. It is supposed the kamsin winds will prevail about a month.

AN ADVANCE.

KORTI, Feb. 25.

Gen. Brackenbury is to advance on Abu Hamed. He starts at once. The health and spirits of the troops are excellent.

GLADSTONE'S RETIREMENT.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

Henry Labouchere, in giving the reasons why he believes Gladstone will soon resign his office, uses the following language: "Gladstone's age is telling on him. He wishes strongly, but he feels feebly. He resorts to temporary expedients now and mistakes a victory in parliament for statesmanship."

THE ITALIAN EXPEDITION.

NAPLES, Feb. 25.

The third Italian expedition to the Red Sea sailed from this port yesterday.

CAUSE OF THE MAHDI'S ADVANCE.

KORTI, Feb. 25.

The rumors that the Mahdi was advancing arises from the Mahdi's making a pilgrimage to his father's tomb at Kerrers with an immense retinue.

MEMORIAL OF GORDON.

There was presented to the Mudir at Durbar yesterday, a gold decoration sent by General Gordon.

Royal Visit to Ireland.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

The majority of the Irish papers hope for a cordial welcome to the Prince of Wales. The Dublin Evening Mail sees political importance in his visit. It expects the lapse of the Crimes Act, and even more will be done to win the cheers of the Dublin mob. The Parnellites will probably hold a meeting to consider what course to advise the Irish people to take on the occasion of the Prince's visit.

Expelling Anarchists.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

A despatch from Berlin to the local news agency, says the Federal Assembly has resolved to expel from Switzerland a large number of anarchists, who have, it is alleged, taken refuge in the country for the purpose of making it a hatching place for plots to be executed abroad. The decree of expulsion affects at least a thousand persons.

The Capes Route.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.

In the Senate to-day Sir Alex. Campbell stated that the Government are now dealing with the question of the transport of passengers and mails between Cape Tormentine and Cape Traverse, and will take the boat service out of the hands of private individuals and make it a Government service.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.

Senator Poirer will reside in Richibucto, and practice law.

There is a deputation here from Richibucto, asking for a subsidy for a line of steamers between Richibucto and West Point, P. E. I.

The Government have promised to use their best endeavors to make the Scott Act more complete this session.

Edmund Yates III.

LONDON, Feb. 25.

Edmund Yates is very ill, and a petition for his release from prison is being signed extensively.

Parliamentary Proceedings.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.

In the House to-day, Kraus moved the House into committee of the whole, to consider the following resolution:—

Resolved, That it is expedient, whenever Parliament decides that a law providing the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes should be enacted, that equitable provision should be made for compensation of brewers, distillers and malsters, so far as respects the diminution in value of real

property, the premises and plant owned and used by them in their business.

Mr. Wells, who seconded the motion, spoke at some length in favor of compensation.

Dr. Oaten followed, favoring the resolution.

Mr. Spruntle also advocated compensation.

Mr. Fisher spoke against the necessity of considering the question at this moment.

Mr. Foster spoke ably against the resolution. While Mr. Foster was speaking a page approached him and handed him a foaming glass of beer which Mr. Foster told him to take back to the donor. The incident caused some amusement to the House. Mr. Foster had the floor when the Speaker left the chair at six o'clock.

After recess several bills were advanced a stage, and then the House, as the attendance was slim, owing to the ball at Rideau Hall, adjourned at 8.30 p. m.

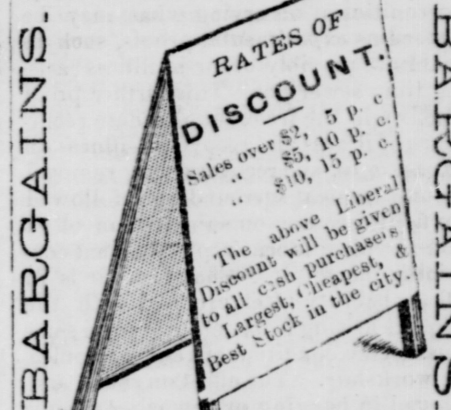
