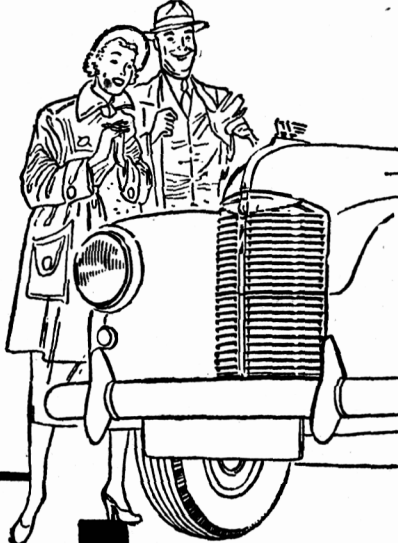
Breadalbane and Vicinity
