## Family Takes 4 Prizes In Hereford Field Day

The Clifford Holmes family of Kingston took four of the top judging prizes Saturday afternoon at the Prince Edward Island Hereford Breeders field day, at Victoria, Maryv. June 19.

Johny Sanderson, York Point, was second and Leith Wrenshaw, Souris River and Mrs. Alton Bled, North Milton were third.

Henry Townsend, Souris River was first in judging a class of four Hereford heifers. His mother, Mrs. Clifford Holmes, tied with James Cudmore, North Winsloe for first place in judging a class of cows. Fred Ramsay, Montrose was second.

Many good dairy heifers have not had because breeders cross breed their good dairy rather than breeding them to sires of their own breed, he said.

"Your Hereford breed is coming along fine but we would like to see it make even greater strides", the minister said.

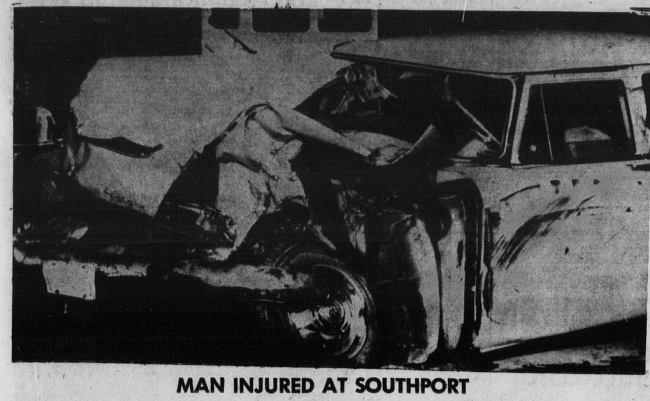
Melvin Earl Murphy, Parkdale, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving without due care and attention.

OTTAWA, June 22.—The federal government's share of the direct payroll costs of labor came to \$280,000. The balance of the cost of the program is divided between the provincial government and the municipalities concerned.

In Canada as a whole, 7,206 projects were approved which employed 163,583 men and 67,000, 660 man-days of work at a cost to the federal government of \$5,741,000.

At Belvedere, 81 projects there were 1,400 men employed and there was a total of 36,176 man-days of work provided. 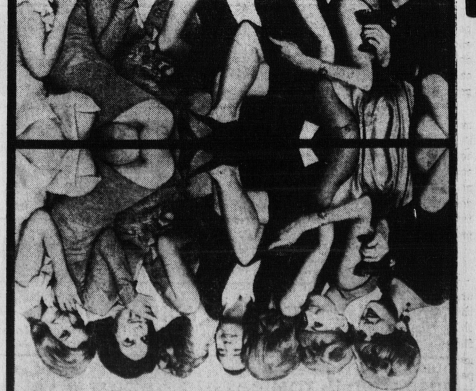
