

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 18.

The Times says the belief that the Government intends to prosecute the agitators has produced a lull in the agitation. The second rate leaders are cowed. The Lund League is unusually quiet. Parnell at Langford uttered an uncertain sound. It may be suspected that he has not yet made up his mind what course to pursue, and that his followers share his hesitation.

CORK, Oct. 18.

Mr. Hutchins, who was shot at, is a justice of the peace. Only one man attacked him. Hutchins and driver were armed with revolvers, but did not use them.

LONDON, Oct. 18.

Fresh outbreaks of pleuro pneumonia occur daily in Lancashire.

PARIS, Oct. 18.

The Carmelite and Barnabite establishments closed on Saturday number sixteen, with two hundred inmates. There were demonstrations of sympathy with the communities at several places. At Montpellier the Bishop, in full pontificals, waited on Prefect, and informed him he was excommunicated.

PARIS, Oct. 18.

Le Temps says an English coal station has been established at New Hebrides, and regards this as the precursor of annexation, and blames the French Government for not taking prior possession.

The imports into France for the nine months ending 30th September show an increase of 253,000,000 francs as compared with the same period last year.

General De Cisay has written to the Minister of War demanding inquiry into his conduct and denying the charges against him.

CASTEL NUOVA, Oct. 18.

Admiral Seymour has informed all the Admirals that the Turks are concentrating a large force in Smyrna.

CANDAHAR, Oct. 18.

It is proposed to send three Bengal regiments to replace the three Bombay regiments here. It is probable that Candahar will be handed over to the Ameer.

BERLIN, Oct. 18.

Prince Hohenlohe is seriously ill with gastric fever.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 18.

It is stated that Turkhar Bay has been appointed ambassador to London.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 18.

The Tekke Turcomans made repeated attacks along the Russian lines but were repulsed with trifling loss.

UNITED STATES.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 18.

Snow fell on Sunday night.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.

A Victoria despatch says on Thursday night a slide, six miles below Cache Creek, completely dammed up Thompson River to the height of a hundred and twenty feet, which the river must surmount before resuming its course. Should the dam break the damage to the railway work and wagon road through the narrow canyon and gorge will be enormous.

GRAND HAVEN, Oct. 18.

The heaviest wind storm ever experienced here has prevailed since Saturday morning. No more disasters are reported here, and as all telegraph lines are down nothing can be heard on this shore. Great anxiety is felt for the safety of the steamers Alpena and Depeva. The Alpena which left here for Chicago Friday was last seen at 1 a. m., Saturday half way over. No tidings been received since.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.

Two serious conflagrations broke out in this city yesterday. Fire first occurred at the corner of Mission and Stevack streets and spread with great rapidity, sweeping away all the hay barns, lodging houses and lumber yards down to the edge of the water, causing heavy loss. Second fire broke out at the foot of Folsom street, and destroyed all buildings of Oregon Steamship Company. Also Dutton's large hay barns adjoining lumber yard, and two schooners loaded with hay lying at wharf.

MEXICO.

CITY OF MEXICO, Oct. 18.

Several important bills have been submitted to Congress. Among them is one that churches and curacies now under charge of foreign priests shall be restored to the dominion of the nation. This is a blow aimed at the Jesuits.
