## Murderer Gains Few Hours Respite

RALEIGH, N. C., July 10.—A mad plunge from the third tier of the state prison's death row here today gained for Henry Carter, 43-year-old wife-murderer, only a few painful hours respite from the electric chair.

The negro found a moment's freedom by a ruse as the appointed hour of his legal death approached, flung himself away from the guards, raced up three flights in the death house, and leaped sprawling to the concrete floor 30 feet below.

Prison physicians picked him up and said he suffered fractures of both wrists, lacerated lips and other painful injuries. The only thing he said before the current took his life in the electric chair several hours later was he put back into place. Officials said no other person in the prison's history had attempted suicide on the scheduled day of death.

Carter was convicted in June, 1935, for the slaying of Annie Giles, his common-law wife.

## Prices Up On N.Y. Exchange

(By Frank MacMillan)

(Associated Press Financial Writer) (A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 10.—Buying forces swept through the stock market today and whirled prices up fractions to three or more points. Brokers attributed the show of strength largely to cheering business and industrial news, although fading fears of a near-term steel strike were said to have induced many recent sideline traders to return to the market.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .9 of a point at 64.8, equalling the year's top mark, it was the best day's gain since June 22. The turnover of 1,689,000 shares was the largest since April 30 and compared with 1,291,500 in the preceding session.

While industrialists held the widest gains, the rails and utilities were not far behind. U. S. Steel Corp. shipments in June were down substantially from May, owing to a carry over of much tonnage into July, but steel common got up 1 3/4 points to 61 3/8. Up 2 or so also were Bethlehem at 51 3/8, Youngstown Sheet and Tube at 64 7/8 and National Steel at 63.

The motors were among the star performers. Chrysler at 115 1/8, was up 2 7/8 around its best level since 1930. General Motors was ahead 2 at 70. Talk was revived of a extra dividend for the latter and a generous disbursement and possible split-up of shares for the former.

Earnings forecasts drew attention to numerous stocks, including the rails, utilities and industrial specialties. Merchandising issues were helped by the optimistic survey of Dun and Bradstreet. Oils responded to the improved statistical position this field.

Parkard was one of the three liveliest stocks of the day with a gain of 5-8 at 11 1/8. Among others well out in front were Conoco's dated Edison at 40 5/8, Anaconda at 36 1/4, Standard Oil of New Jersey at 62 1/8, American Telephone at 169 3/4, Johns-Manville at 106, Western Union at 86 7/8, Westinghouse at 126 1/4, Sears Roebuck at 75, Allied Chemical at 206, A. O. Smith at 47 3/4 and Du Pont at 156.

In the Canadian list Deere & Co. dropped three points and McIntyre-Pine more than two. Lake Shore was off about point. Fractional recessions occurred in Canadian Pacific, Distillers-Seagrams, Ford of Canada, Hollinger, International Hydro-Electric preferred, Shawinigan and Quebec Power. Hiram Walker advanced a point and International Nickel a major fraction.

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## Dr. Creelman's Address

Dr. Creelman gave a very informative address on tuberculosis on Prince Edward Island and gave some startling figures on the matter, stating that the Island had the highest death rate from this disease with 90 in every 100,000 deaths. With only 50 beds in the Sanatorium they needed the co-operation of the home and home nursing to combat the disease. There were many things that could be accomplished by home nursing to assist patients. A tuberculosis league was being formed with this object in view. The idea was to have a nurse, whose sole duty would be to instruct people in the home how to care for tubercular patients.

He asked that the Institutes support this League as it would help very considerably in keeping down the disease.
